## **REGULAR AGENDA:**

STRATEGIC PLANNING: Matter of conducting a strategic planning work session with JADE Strategies, Inc.

Joscelyn A. Davis, JADE Strategies, opened the session by discussing goals and priorities for the session and subsequent work product.

## Part I Welcome & Introductions

Ms. Davis stated champions would be identified by the end of the work session. She went on to an icebreaker activity. Everyone went around the table and stated who they would love to go to dinner with.

## Part II Objectives, Tactics, Timing & Champions

Ms. Davis gave an example of a community she worked with and why – old guard on Council and issues with change. She stated that Council thought it should be combative.

Ms. Davis went over the definition of effective governance. She said as a trusted community steward, Berkley's City Council practices standards of excellence in government leadership and actively engages in strategies that realize priorities and achieve the City's vision.

Ms. Davis reviewed the Action Planning: SMART Metrics which entailed priorities, objectives, and tactics.

Ms. Davis reviewed preliminary Action Plans for Effective Governance:

- 1. Implement a strategic performance evaluation process
  - a. Complete a comprehensive three-year Strategic Plan (2023-2025) (Manage, review cycle)
  - b. Align Strategic Plan and Master Plan
  - c. Establish clear performance metrics and criteria for the City Manager that align with the Strategic Plan
  - d. Coordinate work of boards and commissions with strategic plan
- 2. Building Public Will
  - a. Increase community outreach as a body vs. individuals. Be present and engaged at community events
  - b. Help residents understand where to direct inquiries and concerns.
  - c. Implement a community feedback strategy
  - d. Build local partnership
- 3. Mitigate challenges and risks
  - a. Perform longer-term (3-7-year) economic forecasting
  - b. Implement a community feedback strategy
  - c. Address infrastructure and municipal facilities need
- 4. Realize a "Think Regional" Strategy
  - a. Coordinate Council's legislative "muscle" to advocate policy changes (proactive/reactive)
  - b. Identify county, state, federal grant-partnership opportunities
  - c. Collaborate and exchange best practices with other regional entities/governments/communities.
- 5. Cultivate a culture of leadership excellence and collaboration
  - a. Engage in ongoing (best-practice) training and development with experts, (e.g., MML, NLC)
  - b. Adopt a conflict resolution process.
  - c. Connect through regular relationship-building activities.
  - d. Onboarding activities for new councilmembers, boards and commissions (mentoring)

Ms. Davis asked everyone to look at the five categories and make notes.

Ms. Davis asked Councilmembers what they thought of the details for each of the five factors above. The consensus was that it looks good.

Councilmembers went back and forth discussing the sub-tactics and which category each subcategory should be placed under. Changes were made.

It was asked and answered that the strategic plan update will be measured and tracked – check-ins. Ms. Davis said there will be measurable check-ins. They discussed meeting rhythms. She said there will be checkpoints and why to have a strategic plan with evaluations.

The group discussed the need to look at what they want to measure. They discussed sub of a sub. Ms. Davis said right now we just need to identify that we need feedback. She stated diversity came up a lot.

Sidebar: Public Service is not personal. There was a discussion regarding public service and the vote of Council is "yes" or "no." Not individual votes. She said when Council is divisive, it creates problems with the community. She said a tip is to find something good about what was decided.

Participants broke into two groups of three to do a dial-down of the tactics lists. A quick conversation about the lists took place and what was established.

The group gathered back together and discussed their ideas to make subcategories to the tactics. They discussed accountability.

## Part III Quarterly Plans & Agenda

Ms. Davis reviewed a City Council Agenda Items monthly FY 2023-2024 worksheet for planning services. She also went over a Strategic Plan Quarterly Worksheet for the fiscal year. Councilmember feedback was provided.

Ms. Davis discussed meeting with directors and boards and commission members.

### Part IV Next Steps

Ms. Davis said to talk about champions for the action plans. For example, have a champion to volunteer and come back to council with how a tactic could work and the timeline. She was looking for a champion for an entire category. It was decided Councilmember Baker -2, Councilmember Patterson -5, Mayor Pro Tem Gavin -4, Councilmember Hennen -3, Councilmember Vilani -1. Councilmember Dooley would partner up with another councilmember.

Councilmember Vilani left at 4:01 p.m.

Discussion took place as to what a reasonable due date would be for councilmembers.

Subject:	2023 Summer Maintenance Agreement between the Road Commission for Oakland County (RCOC) and the City of Berkley.

The City of Berkley has partnered with RCOC to provide summer maintenance activities (street sweeping) on 12 Mile Road between Greenfield and Woodward for several consecutive years. While Oakland County has jurisdiction over this roadway, the City is able to provide a higher level of service including several sweepings per year.

The full agreement is attached and RCOC reimburses the City based upon current bids and the following formula:

\$175.00 per curb mile X 3.2 curb miles X 3 sweepings (maximum) = \$1,680.00

Please note the unit pricing for 2023 is the same as 2022 as a result of current bids.

The reimbursement will be made in two installments, 65% (\$1,092.00) in September 2022 and 35% (\$588.00) upon completion of the last maintenance activity.

RCOC will be provided with updated policies and proof of liability insurance for Berkley personnel and equipment.

As your current Certificate of Membership in the Michigan Municipal Workers Compensation Fund will expire in June, I would appreciate it if you would forward a new certificate at that time. If there are any changes in the coverage during the term of this agreement, we must be notified of these changes.

The Board of County Road Commissioners and I extend our appreciation to you, the City Council and your road employees, for the fine work that has been done in connection with past agreements, and we want to continue to cooperate with you in any way that we can.

## 2023 SUMMER MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT CITY OF BERKLEY

## Under 1951 PA 51, As Amended

This Summer Maintenance Agreement ("Agreement") is made this \_\_\_\_\_day of \_\_\_\_\_, 2023, between the Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Oakland, State of Michigan, a public body corporate, (hereinafter variously referred to as the "Board and as the "Road Commission for Oakland County") and the **City of Berkley**, Oakland County Michigan, a Michigan municipal corporation hereinafter referred to as the "City."

WHEREAS, certain county primary and local roads more specifically set forth in Exhibit A, attached hereto, are under the jurisdiction and control of the Board and are located within or adjacent to the City; and

WHEREAS, The City desires to be responsible for certain maintenance of said roads under the terms of this Agreement and the Board is willing to participate in the cost thereof as provided in Section III of this Agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants set forth herein as provided, it is hereby agreed as follows:

Ι

The City hereby agrees to be responsible for performing Summer Maintenance of certain roads under the terms of this Agreement, and the Board agrees to participate in the cost thereof as provided in Section III of this Agreement. "Summer Maintenance," herein required to be performed by City, shall mean the work and services specified in Exhibit B hereto and this Agreement. All maintenance work and services performed by the City shall be in accordance with the Board's minimum maintenance standards and this Agreement.

Π

The Board has determined and specified the equipment and personnel necessary to provide the Summer Maintenance and the City has acquired the necessary equipment and personnel so specified. The City shall keep accurate and uniform records of all Summer Maintenance work performed pursuant to this Agreement. The Board shall have the right to audit City accounts and records insofar as such documents concern this Agreement and the work and services performed and to be performed hereunder.

III

In consideration of the Summer Maintenance by the City, the Board hereby agrees to pay to the City the sum of \$1,680.00 as set forth in Exhibit A, attached hereto and made a part hereof. Such amounts are to be used by the City for Summer Maintenance. Payments are to be made by the Board to the City as follows:

65% on September 15, 2023 35% upon completion of the last Summer Maintenance activity

The making of said payments shall constitute the Board's entire obligation in reference to Summer Maintenance.

IV

It is specifically understood and agreed by the City and the Board that by undertaking to perform Summer Maintenance of certain county primary roads, the City does not assume the Board's legal duty to

keep said roads in such condition as to be in accordance with MCLA 224.21, reasonably safe and convenient for public travel, other than as may relate to the work and service to be performed as listed in Section I above, and the City hereby agrees to hold harmless, represent, defend with counsel acceptable to the Board, and indemnify the Board; the County of Oakland; the Office of the Oakland County Water Resources Commissioner and any and all applicable drainage districts(s); the Michigan State Department of Transportation and the Transportation Commission; any and all local units(s) of government within which the roads subject to this Agreement are located, and the respective officers, agents and employees of all of the foregoing, against any and all claims, charges, complaints, damages, or causes of action for (a) public or private property damage, (b) injuries to persons, or (c) other claims, charges, complaints, damages or causes of action arising out of the performance or non-performance of the activities which are the subject matter of this Agreement, both known and unknown, whether during the progress or after the completion thereof. However, this hold harmless provision does not apply in so far as any claim or suit is alleged to be, or demonstrated to be, the result of a defect in highway design or condition and not related to the Summer Maintenance activities set out in Section I. Further, since the Board has the statutory responsibility for maintenance of the roads under this Agreement, it is the intent of the parties that the delegation by this Agreement of those maintenance responsibilities to the City provide immunity to the City as an agent of the County. Therefore, the City falls within the governmental immunity protection of the County.

During that part of the year that the City is providing Summer Maintenance under Section I, the City agrees to notify the Board within 30 days, should it become aware of defects or maintenance requirements in the roads set forth in Exhibit A, if said defects or maintenance requirements are not Summer Maintenance subject to this Agreement.

The City shall acquire and maintain, during the term of the Agreement, statutory worker's compensation, employer's liability, automobile and comprehensive general liability insurance coverages, and such other insurance coverages, as described in Exhibit C attached hereto, covering the Board's liability for any and all claims arising out of the City's performance or non-performance of the activities which are the subject matter of this Agreement, and these coverages shall be obtained and maintained in accordance with the requirements set forth in Exhibit C attached hereto and made a part hereof and shall be primary and non-contributory.

VI

The City further agrees to comply with all applicable laws and regulations, including laws and regulations of the State of Michigan for safeguarding the air and waters of the State. In particular, City facilities and operations must meet the provisions of Part 5 (Spillage of Oil and Polluting Materials) rules promulgated pursuant to Part 31, Water Resources Protection, of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, 1994 PA 451, as amended. (Rules R324.2001 through R324.2009 address release prevention planning, secondary containment, surveillance, and release reporting requirements).

## VII

In accordance with Michigan 1976 PA 453, as amended, and 1976 PA 220, as amended, the City covenants not to discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment with respect to hire, tenure, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment, or a matter directly or indirectly related to employment, because of race, color, religion, national origin, age, sex, height, weight, marital status or because of a disability that is unrelated to the individual's ability to perform the duties of the particular job or position, and to require a similar covenant on the part of any subcontractor employed in the performance of the Agreement. A breach of this covenant may be regarded as a material breach of this Agreement.

The City shall utilize the provisions of the Federal E-Verify Program to verify the work authorization status of all newly hired employees; and the Road Commission for Oakland County may terminate the contract for failure of City to so comply with the Federal E-Verify Program.

IX

It is the intention of the parties hereto that this Agreement is not made for the benefit of any third party. It is anticipated that subsequent agreements regarding Summer Maintenance activities will be executed annually by the parties hereto.

The terms and conditions of this Agreement shall become effective as of April 1, 2023 and shall continue in full force and effect until a subsequent Summer Maintenance agreement has been executed by the parties hereto or until this Agreement is terminated, as set forth below.

In the event that a subsequent Summer Maintenance agreement has not been executed by the parties hereto on or before October 15, 2023, either party may terminate this Agreement by providing the other party hereto with written notice of intent to terminate, at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of termination.

## CITY OF BERKLEY

## WORK TO BE PERFORMED:

Sweep all roads listed in Exhibit A, in both directions of travel and around islands, as provided in this Agreement, three (3) times (once between April 15<sup>th</sup> and May 15<sup>th</sup>; once between July 15<sup>th</sup> and August 15<sup>th</sup> and once between September 15<sup>th</sup> and October 15th). The City may at its own expense sweep more frequently, subject to the other terms and conditions of this Agreement, including, without limitation, the indemnification and insurance provisions.

## 2023 SUMMER MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT

## CITY OF BERKLEY

## SPECIAL PROVISION FOR INDEMNIFICATION, DAMAGE LIABILITY AND INSURANCE

## Indemnification and Damage Liability

See provisions of the maintenance agreement to which this Exhibit C is attached.

## Insurance Coverage:

The City, prior to execution of the maintenance agreement, shall file with the Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Oakland ("Board"), copies of completed certificates of insurance as evidence that it carries adequate insurance satisfactory to the Board; and, without the prior written consent of the Board. the City shall not cancel, reduce, or fail to renew the insurance coverage required by this Agreement. The City shall immediately notify the Board and cease operations upon the occurrence of any cancellation, reduction, modification or termination of insurance required hereunder, and shall not resume operations under this Agreement until all insurance as required by this Agreement is in full force and effect. The City shall provide in a form and substance acceptable to the Board an underwriter's endorsement to its comprehensive general liability insurance and auto liability insurance, including any excess umbrella insurance, in the amounts set forth on Exhibit C, naming the Board and the Office of the Oakland County Water Resources Commissioner as an additional named insured. The City shall obtain and deliver to the Board a notice of cancellation and non-renewal endorsement, acceptable to the Board, for the general liability, auto liability, and worker's compensation and employer's liability policies. Prior to commencing the work, the City shall provide to the Board evidence satisfactory to the Board of payment of the current premium for the required insurance and endorsements and shall also obtain certificates of insurance for each policy, providing for thirty (30) days actual (not "endeavor to") prior, written notice to the Board by the insurance carrier of any cancellation, termination reduction or material change of the policy. The City shall make sure that each of its subcontractors. if any, providing any of the work and services under this contract, shall obtain and maintain insurance as set forth in this Agreement.

The City shall provide the following insurance coverages which shall be primary and non-contributory:

- a. Workmen's Compensation Insurance: The insurance shall provide protection for the City's employees, to the statutory limits of the State of Michigan and \$500,000 employer's liability. The indemnification obligation under this section shall not be limited in any ways by any limitation on the amount or type of damages, compensation or benefits payable by or for the City under worker's disability compensation coverage established by law.
- b. Bodily Injury and Property Damage Other than Automobile: The insurance shall provide protection against all claims for damages to public or private property, and injuries to persons arising out of and during the progress and to the completion of the work, and with respect to product and completed operations for one year after completion of the work.

Such insurance shall include: 1) explosion, collapse, and underground damage hazards (x,c,u), which shall include, but not be limited to coverage for (a) underground damage to facilities due to drilling and excavating with mechanical equipment; and (b) collapse or structural injury to structures due to blasting or explosion, excavation, tunneling, pile driving, cofferdam work, or building moving or demolition; (2) products and completed operations; (3) contractual liability; and (4) independent contractors' coverages.

c. Bodily Injury Liability and Property Damage Liability - Automobiles (Comprehensive Auto Liability) The minimum limits of bodily injury liability and property damage liability shall be:

Such insurance shall include coverage for all owned, hired, and non-owned vehicles.

- d. Excess and Umbrellas Insurance The City may substitute corresponding excess and/or umbrella liability insurance for a portion of the above listed requirements in order to meet the specified minimum limits of liability.
- e. The City shall provide for and in behalf of the Board and all agencies specified by the Board, as their interest may appear, Owner's Protective Public Liability Insurance. Such insurance shall provide coverage and limits the same as the City's Public Liability Insurance.

Reports – The City or his insurance carrier shall immediately report all claims received which relate to the Contract, and shall also report claims investigations made, and disposition of claims to the County Highway Engineer.

As part of our participation in the 2023 Oakland County West Nile Virus Reimbursement Program, we are required to provide the attached resolution to the County by mid-June. This resolution authorizes staff to request reimbursement of program supplies.

On April 13<sup>th</sup>, 2023 the DPW submitted a West Nile Project Plan to Oakland County which outlined the planned activities for the calendar year. Our program focuses on the reduction of the Culex mosquito population by limiting breeding sites within the public right-of-way. This is accomplished each spring via the placement of larvicide tablets in approximately 1,500 storm structures (catch basins).

Berkley switches product every few years to reduce the likelihood of material resistance. The current larvicide is Natular XRT as supplied by Clarke Mosquito Control. The extended release tablets have a 150 day residual providing coverage throughout the summer and early fall.

The Oakland County Program provides for a <u>partial</u> reimbursement of our material costs based on population and road mileage. We anticipate a reimbursement of \$1844.72 for calendar year 2023. See table below for a history of reimbursements:

## WHAT IS WEST NILE VIRUS (WNV)?

West Nile virus (WNV) is a seasonal epidemic in North America that flares up in the summer and continues into the fall. It can infect humans, birds, horses, and some other mammals. In a small number of people infected by the virus, the disease can be serious, even fatal.

## **HOW IS WNV SPREAD?**

- WNV is most often spread to humans by the bite of an infected mosquito. The mosquito becomes infected by biting a bird that carries the virus. Horses and other mammals bitten by mosquitoes that carry the virus can also become infected. Whenever mosquitoes are active, there is a risk of getting WNV; however, the risk is highest from late July through September.
- In a very small number of cases, WNV has been spread through blood transfusions, organ transplants, breastfeeding, and during pregnancy from mother to baby.
- WNV is **not** spread through casual contact such as touching or kissing a person with the virus.

## WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS OF WEST NILE VIRUS?

If symptoms develop, they typically appear 3 to 14 days after the bite of an infected mosquito.

- Serious symptoms in a few people. About one in 150 people infected with WNV will develop severe illness. Symptoms can include high fever, headache, neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, convulsions, muscle weakness, vision loss, numbness, and paralysis. These symptoms may last several weeks, and neurological effects may be permanent.
- **Mild symptoms in some people.** Up to 20% of people who become infected display symptoms such as headache, body aches, joint pains, vomiting, diarrhea, rash, and swollen lymph glands. Most people with mild illness recover completely, but fatigue and weakness can last for weeks or months.
- No symptoms in most people. Most people (80%) infected with WNV do not have any symptoms.

## WHAT IS THE TREATMENT FOR WNV?

There is no treatment for WNV infection. Illness may last weeks to months, even in healthy persons. In more severe cases people may need hospital care for supportive treatment such as intravenous fluids, pain medications, and nursing care.

## WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I THINK I HAVE WNV?

Mild WNV illness usually improves without medical attention. Seek medical attention immediately if symptoms of severe WNV illness develop, such as unusually severe headaches or confusion; this may indicate encephalitis (inflammation of the brain) or meningitis (inflammation of the membranes that surround the brain and spinal cord). Severe WNV illness usually requires hospitalization. Pregnant women and nursing mothers who develop symptoms that could be WNV are encouraged to see their health care provider.

## WHO IS AT RISK OF GETTING SICK FROM WNV?

• People over the age of 50 years are more likely to have serious illness with WNV and should take special care to avoid mosquito bites.

- Being outside increases the risk of being bitten by an infected mosquito. Taking steps to avoid mosquito bites when outside working, playing or relaxing will lower your risk of getting sick from WNV.
- The risk of getting WNV through blood transfusions and organ transplants is very small and should not prevent people from having surgery. All donated blood is screened for WNV (and many other viruses) before being used. If you have concerns, talk with your health care provider.
- Pregnancy and nursing do not increase the risk of becoming ill from WNV, and the risk that WNV may pass to a fetus or an infant through breastmilk is still being evaluated. Talk with your health care provider if you have concerns.

## HOW CAN WEST NILE VIRUS BE PREVENTED?

The best way to prevent EEE infection is to prevent mosquitoes from biting you.

- Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellant.
  - All EPA-registered insect repellants are evaluated for safety and effectiveness, and will contain DEET, picaridin, IR3535, Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus or para-menthane-diol as the active ingredient. Repellents containing a higher percentage of the active ingredient typically provide longer-lasting protection. Always follow the product label instructions.
  - Be careful using repellent on the hands of children as it may irritate the eyes and mouth.
- Get rid of mosquito breeding sites by removing standing water around your home:
  - Turn over any type of container that can collect water. Once a week, empty out items that hold water such as tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, pet bowls, flowerpots, and trash containers.
  - Clean clogged roof gutters, particularly if leaves tend to plug up the drains.
- Treat standing water that cannot be eliminated, such as retention ponds or drainage ditches, with a mosquito larvicide. Mosquito larvicide is easy to use and can be purchased at most home improvement stores.
- Wear protective clothing such as long-sleeved shirts and pants.
- Limit outdoor activity from dusk to dawn when mosquitoes are most active.
- Maintain window and door screens to keep mosquitoes out of buildings. Do not prop open doors.

### <u>A PROCLAMATION</u> of the Council of the City of Berkley, Michigan Proclaiming May 14, 2023, as Apraxia Awareness Day

- WHEREAS, May 14<sup>th</sup> marks Childhood Apraxia of Speech Day during which awareness will be raised throughout Michigan about childhood apraxia of speech, an extremely challenging speech disorder that affects 1-in-1,000 children; and
- **WHEREAS,** Childhood apraxia of speech (CAS) causes children to have significant difficulty learning to speak and is among the most severe speech deficits in children; and
- WHEREAS, The act of learning to speak comes effortlessly to most children, those with apraxia require early, appropriate, and intensive speech therapy, often for many years to learn to speak; and
- WHEREAS, Without appropriate speech therapy intervention, children with apraxia will have diminished communication skills, but are also placed at high risk for secondary impacts in reading, writing, spelling, and other school-related skills; and
- **WHEREAS,** Such primary and secondary impacts diminish future independence and employment opportunities and challenge the ability to become productive, contributing citizens if not resolved or improved; and
- **WHEREAS,** Public awareness about childhood apraxia of speech in Michigan is essential for families of children with this neurological disorder and the professionals who support them to achieve the needed services for those learning to use their own voice; and
- WHEREAS, Our highest respect goes to these children, as well as their families, for their effort, determination, and resilience in the face of such obstacles.

### NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BERKLEY HEREBY PROCLAIMS

- **SECTION 1:** That May 14, 2023, shall be recognized as *Apraxia Awareness Day* in the City of Berkley.

Subject:	Wiltshire Rd Water Main and Pavement Replacement Project Coolidge to Woodward Recommendation for Award & Construction Engineering Services

Since the passing of the Berkley Infrastructure Millage in 2018 the City of Berkley has been generating approximately \$1 million each year for infrastructure improvements. During the first two years (2020 & 2021) we chose to use this revenue on Citywide concrete road repairs. This citywide program addressed roughly 200 locations throughout the city. Year three (2022) we chose to combine both mileage revenue along with Water funds to complete a ½ mile of road and water main replacement on Kenmore/Cornwall.

For 2023 we are looking to instead combine Major Road and Water Funds to potentially address the needs of Wiltshire Road from Coolidge to Woodward. This change should the available Infrastructure Millage Funds for future projects.

This project would have two very distinct scopes that could be awarded independently based on cost:

- 1. Woodward to Mortenson: Complete Road and Water Main/service Removal and Replacement
- 2. Mortenson to Coolidge: Mill and overlay of the existing pavement along with minor curb and driveway replacement, as required. Existing water main and services to remain.

As a result of the above, the City Council previously approved moving forward with the design phase of the Wiltshire RD Project. Hubbell, Roth & Clark (HRC) has completed the plans and specifications and the project was publicly bid in late March.

Sealed hard-copy bids were received via BidNet Direct on March 27th from a total of four (6) contractors (see attached bid tab). HRC has reviewed the bids and verified references. We concur with the recommendation of HRC and propose awarding the bid to the lowest-qualified bidder, Springline Excavating, Inc, of Farmington Hills, Mi in an amount of \$3,199,532.66. Please note the low bid was above the engineer's estimate of \$2,810,490.00.

At this time, we also recommend \$284,860.90 be approved for construction engineering services in accordance with the attached detailed proposal from HRC. Construction engineering covers many components including preconstruction/progress meetings, resident assistance and field coordination, shop drawing review and approval, contract alterations, material testing and certification, construction layout/staking, supplemental observation/inspection, pay estimates review and approval, record/as-built drawings and project closeout. HRC has also recommended a 10% construction contingency of \$319,953.27 be added to the low bid amount for any unforeseen construction modifications.

Please note this project will cross fiscal years with a late fall 2023 targeted completion date.

## Gentlemen:

We have reviewed the bids received on Tuesday, March 27, 2022 for the Wiltshire Road Water Main Replacement and Pavement Reconstruction project and have found them to be in order. There were six (6) bids received, and the low bidder was Springline Excavating, Inc. of Farmington Hills, Michigan, with a total base bid of **\$3,199,532.66** and a total alternate bid of **\$3,163,132.66**, both of which are above the Engineer's Preliminary Construction Estimate of **\$2,810,490.00** and **\$2,775,910.00**, respectively. The only difference between the two (2) bids is that the base bid entails the installation of CL 54 DI open cut pipe for the water main, while the alternate bid entails the installation of HDPE SDR 11 open cut/HDD pipe. Although ductile iron is the City's preferred choice for water main pipe material, the alternate bid was offered to provide the City with another option for water main material and installation method in the event ductile iron would not be readily available or substantially higher in unit price. In light of this and after discussion with the City DPW, though the ductile iron was quoted at only a nominally higher unit price, it is our understanding of the preference to award the base bid, or ductile iron water main pipe installation, in lieu of the HDPE pipe because of the DPW's extensive experience with as well as their stocked supplies and appurtenances as it relates to ductile iron pipe.

The scope of works is as follows:

## Mortenson to Woodward – Full Reconstruction (Division 1)

The project includes the complete removal and replacement of existing pavement, curbs, driveway approaches and sidewalks. Improvements include new concrete curb and gutter, HMA pavement, installation of new stormwater drainage structures and structure cover adjustments, concrete driveway approaches, concrete sidewalks, ADA ramps and new landscaping. The existing 6" and 12" water main will be abandoned in place and the new 8" water main will be installed along with new public water services and stop boxes. Existing water services and hydrants will be connected to the new water main. The approximate length of roadway to be installed is 1,850 feet. The total low bid amount for Division I was **\$2,382,959.56**.

## Coolidge Hwy to Mortenson - Mill and Overlay (Division 2)

This section of work includes milling of existing asphalt from Coolidge to Mortenson, replacement of driveway approaches, curb repairs, sidewalk ADA improvements, structure cover adjustments and final restoration. The approximate length of roadway for mill and overlay is 2,300 feet. The total low bid amount for Division II was **\$816,573.10**.

The low bidder has submitted satisfactory references for similar road improvement projects completed for the Cities of Farmington Hills, Huron Township, and Southfield. In addition, this office has administered several other successful projects with Springline Excavating over the years.



Based on the above, this office recommends award of the Contract to Springline Excavating, Inc. of Farmington Hills, Michigan, with a total base bid of **\$3,199,532.66** subject to the submission of the necessary bonds and insurance, which comply with the contract specifications. We also recommend that an additional 10% construction contingency (**\$319,953.27**) be added to the low bid amount. In addition, HRC proposes a not-to-exceed Construction Engineering budget of **\$284,860.90** also be adopted. A breakdown of the construction engineering costs is included in an attachment with this letter.

Based on the above, HRC recommends the City approve the total project construction budget for the Wiltshire Road Water Main Replacement and Pavement Reconstruction of **\$3,804,346.83** (not-to-exceed maximum, including costs for contingencies and construction engineering).

Subject:	Award of Contract for the 2023 Sidewalk/Path Program

The Parks & Recreation Department and Department of Public Works worked together to bid out three separate sidewalk/path projects scheduled to be completed during the Spring and early Summer of 2023. Public Works and Parks & Recreation felt that partnering to bid these projects out would provide the most cost beneficial response.

Four bids were received on March 27, 2023 for the work to be performed. All bids and award of bid were reviewed by both Department Directors, Hubbell, Roth & Clark, Inc. (HRC), the City Manager and City Attorney. The low bidder was Hartwell Cement Company of Oak Park, MI. The low bidder has performed satisfactory work for the City of Berkley and has performed similar work for the Cities of Farmington Hills and Clawson. Due to these factors, it is the recommendation of HRC and the Public Works and Parks & Recreation Departments that award of contract for the 2023 Sidewalk/Path Program be given to Hartwell Cement Company of Oak Park, Michigan for construction costs of \$450,558.00 with additional 10% contingencies of \$45,055.80. The cost for contingencies will be broken into the two construction budget accounts.

The first division of the project consists of sidewalk replacement work on Coolidge Highway. Work to be completed here consists of the removal and removal of an existing 5' wide asphalt path with an 8' wide concrete sidewalk along the east side of Coolidge Highway north of 12 Mile Road to the city limits. The total for this division is \$189,209.50 and will come from account 202-464-975-100.

Division 2 consists of improvements to Jaycee Park pathways to be constructed throughout the park and around the new inclusive playground. The total for this division after modifications is \$142,613.50 and will come from account 614-950-974-000.

Division 3 consists of the construction of an HMA Path Extension to Oxford Road along with additional HMA paths to connect park features. This work continues the development of Oxford Park and totals \$68,735 and will come from account 614-950-974-000. Additionally, a rain garden is included in this division and will be established at Oxford Park at a cost of \$50,000 and from account 592-537-974-000.

The attached memorandum and bid tabulation provided by HRC outlines the work to be performed as well as the costs broken down for each division. The memorandum also includes an engineering budget not to exceed \$40,864.54. \$17,203.73 of that budget will come from account 202-464-821-010 and the remaining \$23,660.81 will come from account 614-950-821-000.

In total, out of the accounts listed both in this memorandum, HRC memorandum and the Council Agenda Item Submission Form, a total not-to exceed amount of \$536,478.34 is to be approved. This includes construction fees, construction contingencies and engineering fees. The total amount to be awarded to Hartwell Cement Company of Oak Park is \$495,613.80 and to be awarded to Hubbell, Roth & Clark, Inc. of Bloomfield Hills is \$40,864.54.

Many of the projects outlined here have been discussed and planned for in the City of Berkley for a number of years. All of the projects focus on an increased need in making Berkley more accessible. What the city may lack in trail space can be improved upon by creating desirable walking paths. Whether in our parks or around the city, increasing accessibility and adding spaces for people to walk, gather and move around positively improves Berkley.

The addition of the rain garden continues the city's goal to remain environmentally progressive in our spaces. There are multiple benefits that rain gardens add to a public space and park. These include helping with water drainage and flooding, increasing wildlife such as song birds and butterflies and beautifying spaces.

The Department of Public Works Director, Shawn Young and I both support award of the work presented in this memorandum. We are available for questions and will be present at the City Council Meeting to answer any questions you may have there.

We have reviewed the bids received on Monday, March 27, 2023, for the 2023 Sidewalk/Path Program and have found them to be in order. There were four (4) bids received and the low bidder was Hartwell Cement Company of Oak Park, Michigan with a total bid of **\$463,943**. The Engineer's Estimate for the project was \$535,357.00. The total bid was comprised of the three (3) Divisions with the associated bid amounts shown below.

<ul> <li>Division I – Coolidge Highway Sidewalk Replacement</li> </ul>	\$189,209.50
<ul> <li>Division II – Jaycee Park Path Improvements</li> </ul>	\$155,998.50
Division III – Oxford Park Path Extension	<u>\$118,735.00</u>
Initial Total Project Construction Costs	\$463,943.00

Division I consists of the removal and replacement of an existing 5' wide concrete sidewalk with a 8' wide concrete sidewalk along the east side of Coolidge Highway north of 12 Mile Road to the City limits. The proposal also included a Division I, Alternate, which specified 8' wide HMA sidewalk in lieu of concrete. Division II consists of the removal and replacement of a 6' wide concrete path in Jaycee Park along with the construction of new ADA-compliant sidewalk ramps. Division III consists of the construction of an HMA Path Extension to Oxford Road along with additional HMA paths to connect park features and a rain garden in Oxford Park.

Following our review of the bids and discussion with the City Parks and Recreation Department, because the bid amount for Division II – Jaycee Park Path Improvements, exceeded the budget for this project, minor modifications had to be made the project which included the reduction of the quantity for the proposed concrete knee walls. The modifications reduced the Division II bid amount to \$142,613.50, thus reducing the total bid amount (of the three (3) Base Divisions) to a **revised value \$450,558**. We understand that the City intends to award all divisions of the Base Bid.

The low bidder has provided satisfactory municipal references for similar work in the Cities of Farmington Hills and Clawson. They have also performed successfully on previous projects for HRC and for the City of Berkley, most recently the 2019 CDBG Sidewalk Replacement Program.

On the basis of the above, this office recommends award of the 2023 Sidewalk/Path Improvement Program to Hartwell Cement Company of Oak Park, Michigan, with a total estimated cost of **\$450,558.00**, subject to the submission of the necessary bonds and insurance. We recommend that an additional 10% contingency (**\$45,055.80**) be added to the low bid amount. Further, the total construction engineering budget would be a not-to-exceed maximum of **\$40,864.54**, please refer to the attached Construction Engineering Services Fees table which breaks this fee down per Division.

Funds were allocated in the 2020-2021 budget for the purchase of a high roof cargo van and buildout. This chassis and other third-party equipment were originally ordered in June of 2021. The originally ordered chassis is both not currently scheduled for production and subject to model year increases which would bring the chassis as ordered price to an amount of \$56,276.00.

We propose to instead utilize both the Macomb County and MITN cooperative bid contract to purchase an in-stock 2023 unit that will accept the third-party equipment that was previously ordered and received at the installer. The base in stock cargo van would be purchased from Lunghammer Ford of Owosso, Michigan in accordance with the Macomb County program for a price of \$53,869.00.

The Installer of the third party equipment, Truck and Trailer Specialties, has indicated that there will be no price increases over the initial amount that was previously approved in June of 2021 of \$27,450.

The vehicle comes with a 36,000 miles or 36 months factory bumper-to-bumper warranty and a 60,000 miles or 60 months powertrain warranty with service handled by any local Ford dealer. All of the body components come with a minimum one-year warranty for parts and labor (no deductible).

We recommend moving forward with the 2023 Ford Transit Cargo Van purchase and previously approved buildout at a total cost of \$81,319 from Signature Ford and Truck & Trailer Specialties utilizing the Macomb County and MITN cooperative bids.

#### ORDINANCE

of the City Council of the City of Berkley, Michigan to Add Sec. 138-199, and to Amend Sec. 138-32, Section 138-387, Sec. 138-388, Sec. 138-418, Sec. 138-427, Sec. 138-428, Sec. 138-442, Sec. 138-443, Sec. 138-457, and Sec. 138-458 of Chapter 138 – Zoning to allow outdoor service areas as a principal permitted use and allow rooftop outdoor eating areas for restaurants and other food serving establishments as a special use.

THE CITY OF BERKLEY ORDAINS:

SECTION 1: Section 138-32 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code must be amended, as follows:

Outdoor service area: A porch, patio, deck, sidewalk, parking lot, parking space, or other public or private land area used for seated dining and beverage service, which is adjacent and accessory to, but not located within the interior building walls of food and/or beverage establishments. Rooftop outdoor eating areas are not considered outdoor service areas.

<u>Rooftop outdoor seating area</u>: A temporary, exterior area, located on the roof of a building at least one story above grade, that is used for seated consumption of food and/or beverages, is operated by and is accessory to a food and/or beverage establishment within the building.

**SECTION 2:** Section 138-199 must be added to Division 6 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code, as follows:

#### Sec. 138-199. – Outdoor service areas.

Outdoor service areas are permitted when in compliance with the following regulations:

(a) <u>Permit.</u> An outdoor service area may be permitted only upon the approval of an outdoor service permit by the Zoning Administrator. All outdoor service area permits will expire on December 31st of the current year unless another time frame is specified in the permit or by the requirements of this Section. Outdoor service area permits are required to be renewed annually, subject to administrative review.

<u>All applications for an outdoor service area permit or permit renewal must include the</u> following:

- (1) Sketch Plan: A sketch plan (top-view drawing of the outdoor service area) with:
  - The location of an outdoor service area in relation to the business it will serve; the entrance to the business; adjacent properties (include addresses) and their building entrances; and existing landscaping, road, trees, catch basins, fire hydrants, and other utilities.
  - b. <u>The dimensions of the outdoor service area footprint.</u>
  - c. The location of the access ramps, platforms, and enclosures.

- d. <u>Details of any hardware such as fasteners to be used in the construction of ramps</u> <u>and platforms.</u>
- e. <u>The location and dimensions of all street furniture and furnishings, including, but</u> not limited to tables, chairs, trash receptacles, benches, and sun shading.
- f. <u>The location of outdoor lighting fixtures, if proposed, as well as the location of</u> <u>wiring and a description of how the wiring will be secured to prevent tripping or</u> <u>electrical hazards.</u>
- g. Location of on-site driveways and adjacent alleys.
- h. If using on-site parking spaces, the setback dimensions of the enclosure from traffic lanes, vehicle circulation aisles, alleys, and adjacent parking spaces not used in the outdoor service area.
- (2) <u>Photographs, drawings, or manufacturer's brochures fully describing the appearance of all proposed tables, chairs, umbrellas, awnings, canopies, lighting, or other furnishings/fixtures related to the outdoor service area, including but not limited to portable heaters, and other fixtures used during colder weather.</u>
- (3) <u>A signed Hold Harmless Agreement as provided by the City.</u>
- (4) For an outdoor service area proposed in a public right-of-way or on other public property, a Certificate of Liability Insurance, in an amount acceptable to the City, and naming the City as an additionally insured.
- (5) For an outdoor service area in which alcohol is served, a liquor liability policy or certificate of insurance naming the City as an additionally insured.
- (6) <u>If outdoor lighting is proposed, the Zoning Administrator may require a photometric plan.</u>
- (7) <u>If temporary shelters are proposed, a separate sketch plan must be submitted with the following:</u>
  - a. <u>The location and dimensions of all temporary shelters within the permitted outdoor</u> <u>service area.</u>
  - b. <u>A dimensioned interior seating layout.</u>
  - c. The materials of which the shelters are fabricated.
  - d. <u>The type, size and location of portable heating elements, fuel tanks, and decorative lighting.</u>
  - e. The type and location of lighting to be used.
  - f. <u>The power source for portable heating elements and lighting, with description of how the wiring will be secured to prevent tripping or electrical hazards.</u>

- (b) *Location.* Outdoor service areas are allowed in on-site parking spaces or lots, sidewalks, and similar areas, with the following limitations:
  - (1) When located in the side or rear yard of a site, an outdoor service area must be a minimum 50 feet from the property line of any single-family or multiple-family zoning district.
  - (2) <u>Outdoor service areas must be setback at least 2 feet from adjacent vehicle traffic</u> lanes, vehicle circulation aisles, or alleys.
  - (3) <u>Outdoor service areas must be at least 3 feet from adjacent parking spaces not used as</u> <u>an outdoor service area.</u>
  - (4) Outdoor service areas only may be allowed in on-site parking spaces or parking lots when parking provided without the spaces to be used for the outdoor service area still meets the minimum parking requirements for the principal building on-site as well as for any existing parking agreements.
- (c) <u>Time of Operation</u>. Permitted outdoor service areas may be operated all year. However, outdoor service areas in the public right-of-way are limited to April 1<sup>st</sup> through October 31<sup>st</sup>.
- (d) <u>Temporary Shelters</u>. Outdoor service area permittees may be allowed to erect temporary shelters, such as tents, igloos, bubbles, garden sheds, or similar type when in compliance with the following regulations:
  - (1) <u>Non-electric heating elements are prohibited inside any temporary shelters.</u>
  - (2) <u>The location of all non-electric portable heating elements must be a minimum of ten</u> (10) feet from temporary shelters.
- (e) Access. All outdoor services areas, whether located on a sidewalk or accessed from a sidewalk, must allow a minimum of five (5) feet of unobstructed pedestrian access along the sidewalk, as well as ingress/egress to the principal use for which the outdoor service area is accessory. Unobstructed pedestrian access along the sidewalk may be reduced to no less than three (3) feet when street furnishings, such as but not limited to street trees, fire hydrants, benches or trash receptacles, are present and dedicated passing areas are immediately adjacent.

Outdoor service areas must comply with Michigan Barrier Free Code, including but not limited to the following:

- (1) Entrances must be a minimum of 48 inches wide.
- (2) <u>Connections between platforms, ramps, sidewalks, or parking spaces must be flush, and</u> <u>must not leave a horizontal gap greater than 1/2 inch, or a vertical separation greater</u> <u>than a quarter inch. 1:4 bevels are required for vertical differences that exceed a</u> <u>quarter inch.</u>
- (3) <u>For outdoor service areas proposed on parking spaces with grades that exceed 5%, level</u> platforms must be provided.

#### **Outdoor Seating Amendments**

- (4) <u>Ramps must be provided for parking space outdoor service areas that are accessed</u> <u>from curbed sidewalks.</u>
- (f) <u>Ramps and Platforms</u>. Ramps and platforms for outdoor service areas must comply with the <u>following regulations</u>:
  - Bolting of ramps and platforms into the road or penetrating the surface of the road/parking space is prohibited. Ramps and platforms may be bolted to the existing curb, but curbs must be restored to the satisfaction of the City of Berkley DPW.
  - (2) <u>Ramps and platforms must be designed and constructed to maintain unobstructed</u> <u>drainage flow along the gutter.</u>
  - (3) <u>Platform and ramp substructures must be made of quality materials: i.e., wood, treated</u> wood or composite materials. Platform and ramp surfaces must be of a non-slip, <u>composite material</u>.
- (g) <u>Enclosures.</u> Enclosures are required for outdoor service areas in the following circumstances: when alcohol is served, when outdoor service areas on the sidewalk are within one foot of the back of the curb, and when using parking spaces. Enclosures must comply with the following regulations:
  - (1) <u>The enclosures must be clearly marked, using railings, planters, fencing, or similar</u> <u>materials.</u>
  - (2) Enclosures must not block the view of traffic, including pedestrian traffic, or block the view of traffic control devices such as traffic signs, traffic signals, and other traffic warning devices.
  - (3) The minimum height of an enclosure is 36 inches and maximum height is 42 inches.
  - (4) For outdoor service areas serving alcohol, the enclosure must define and secure the outdoor service area for alcohol consumption.
  - (5) <u>For sidewalk outdoor service areas within one foot of the back of the curb, the enclosure must be located along the curb separating the outdoor service area from the roadway.</u>
  - (6) For outdoor service areas using parking spaces, the enclosure must be a continuous, rigid physical separation with a height of 42 inches on all sides of the outdoor service area adjacent to vehicle traffic lanes, vehicle circulation aisles, alleys, and parking spaces not used as an outdoor service area.
- (h) <u>Alcohol service</u>. Alcoholic beverages may be served in an outdoor service area, as licensed by the State, for consumption by customers of the licensee.
- (i) <u>Street furniture and furnishings.</u> Street furniture and furnishings are allowed in outdoor service areas when the following regulations are met:

- (1) <u>Outdoor service area street furniture/fixtures must not block the view of traffic,</u> <u>including pedestrian traffic, or block the view of traffic control devices such as traffic</u> <u>signs, traffic signals, and other traffic warning devices.</u>
- (2) <u>All outdoor service area street furniture/fixtures must be of substantial weight so that</u> <u>at no time could the outdoor service area furniture present an obstruction or risk to</u> <u>public safety, especially during inclement weather. All umbrellas must be closed or</u> <u>removed each evening.</u>
- (3) <u>Hanging or overhead objects, including umbrellas, must have a minimum clearance of at least 7 feet.</u>
- (4) <u>All outdoor service area furniture/fixtures must be maintained in a state of good repair.</u> <u>Any outdoor service area furniture/fixtures having broken, peeling, or rusting features</u> <u>or are showing other signs of disrepair must be promptly removed and replaced.</u>
- (5) All sun shading must be constructed of fire-retardant materials.
- (j) <u>Lighting.</u> Temporary, decorative outdoor lighting, such as string lights or electric candles, may be permitted in outdoor services areas when such lighting is limited to the hours of operation of the outdoor service area, does not create glare that negatively impacts public safety or adjacent properties, and is secured in a manner to prevent trip or electrical hazard. All other lighting must meet the requirements in Section 138-143(b).
- (k) <u>Heating elements.</u> Electric and non-electric heating elements may be permitted in outdoor services areas. Non-electric heating elements must be placed a minimum of 10 feet from all permanent or temporary structures. Electric heating elements must be secured in a manner to prevent tripping or electrical hazard.
- Maintenance. The maintenance of an outdoor service area is the responsibility of the establishment. Maintenance includes, but is not limited to surface treatment and cleaning, litter control, sweeping, and snow and ice removal. Any sidewalk or public property permitted to be used as an outdoor service area must be kept neat and clean at all times and free from any substance that may cause pedestrian injury or damage to the sidewalk or public property.

#### SECTION 4: Section 138-387 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code must be amended, as follows:

#### Sec. 138-387. – Principal Uses permitted.

Principal uses permitted in the LB district are as follows:

(1) Any generally recognized retail business whose principal activity is the sale of commodities on the premises, in a completely enclosed building including, but not limited to, the sale of groceries, meats, dairy products, baked goods and other food items dispensed for consumption off the site, drugs, pharmaceutical, apothecary items, flowers, dry goods, furnishings, jewelry, clothing millinery, shoes, books and periodicals, stationery and office supplies and hardware.

- (2) Specialty shops such as, but not limited to, antique shops, craft shops and shops for the sale of gifts and notions.
- (3) Personal service establishments which perform services on the premises directly for the consumer such as, but not limited to, repair shops (shoes, watches, jewelry, radios, televisions, small appliances, vacuum and sewing machines, etc.), beauty salons, hair salons, barber shops, manicuring studios, tanning salons, massage facilities, spa service facilities, self-service laundries, reproduction/copy centers, printing, mailing/shipping centers, while prohibiting service facilities of package shipping providers, but which may require a retail adjunct.
- Any service establishments including a showroom or workshop of an electrician, decorator, caterer, baker, painter, upholsterer, tailor, seamstress/dressmaker, photography studios and similar service establishments that require a retail adjunct.
- (5) Dry cleaning establishments of a retail nature. Strictly wholesale dry cleaning establishments must be prohibited.
- (6) Business establishments which perform services on the premises such as, but not limited to, banks, credit unions, savings and loan associations, loan companies, insurance offices, travel services, and real estate offices. Bank, savings and loan associations and credit unions may include drive-up facilities only as an accessory use subject to the required provisions for stacking or waiting space, apart from required off street parking areas, at the rate of 4 car spaces for each service window or pedestal, in addition to providing a full car length space at the window or pedestal.
- (7) Offices for any of the following occupations: executive, administrative, manufacturer representatives, building/construction company or contract sales headquarters, professional, accounting, writing, clerical, stenographic, drafting and real estate sales, subject to the limitations contained in section 138-390.
- (8) Professional offices for medical (doctors, osteopaths, chiropractors, psychologists, and psychiatrists) dental and optical, including clinics (outpatient service only); and other similar or allied professions subject to the limitations contained in section 138-390.
- (9) Professional offices for lawyers, architects, landscape architects, urban planners, engineers and other similar or allied professions, subject to the limitations contained in section 138-390.
- (10) Theaters, assembly halls, concert halls or similar places of assembly when conducted completely within enclosed buildings.
- (11) Places of worship.
- (12) Commercial recreational uses such as bowling alleys, billiard halls, indoor archery ranges, indoor skating rinks, indoor tennis courts, athletic or health clubs, schools of dance, schools of martial arts, or similar forms of indoor commercial recreation.
- (13) Restaurants, bars, lounges or other places serving food or beverage within enclosed buildings, not including drive-in <u>or</u>, drive-through <del>or outdoor service</del> eating establishments.

- (14) Single-family, two-family and multiple-family dwellings when located on the second floor or above a first floor permitted or special use. Single-family detached dwellings and first floor dwelling units are prohibited.
- (15) Accessory structures and uses customarily incidental to the above permitted uses.
- (16) Marihuana retailers and medical marihuana provisioning centers.

**SECTION 5:** Section 138-388 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code must be amended, as follows:

#### Sec. 138-388. Special uses.

The following special uses must be permitted in the LB local business district, subject to the regulations in article VI, division 6, Special Uses, of this chapter:

- (1) Automobile service stations, subject to the requirements of section 138-389.
- (2) Drive-in and drive-through eating establishments.
- (3) Drive-through retail/service establishments.
- (4) Open air business uses when developed as uses accessory to primary uses and structures in the LB local business district as follows:
  - a. <u>Rooftop</u> outdoor seating areas for restaurants or other food serving establishments.
  - b. Outdoor retail sales of fruits, vegetables and plant materials not grown on site and sales of lawn furniture, playground equipment, hardware supplies and other home garden supplies.
  - c. Businesses in the character of open store fronts.

(5) Commercial amusement device centers.

- (6) Nursery schools, day nurseries and child care centers, provided:
  - a. Applicants are licensed through the Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs (LARA). Proof of licensing must be provided to the city when submitting an application for a business license.

  - c. Facilities meet screening requirements as deemed reasonable by the planning commission, including masonry walls up to six feet in height, decorative fencing or landscaping.
  - d. Applicants, staff, and facilities meet the minimum standards established by the Michigan Child Care Organizations, MCL 722.111 et seq., as amended.

**SECTION 6:** Section 138-418 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code must be amended, as follows:

#### Sec. 138-418. Special uses.

The following special uses must be permitted in the downtown district, subject to the regulations in article VI administration and enforcement, division 6 special uses, of this chapter:

- (1) Offices or agencies, when located on the first floor.
- (2) Banks.
- (3) Convenience stores.
- (4) Outdoor sales or <u>rooftop outdoor</u> eating areas, when developed as accessory to primary uses and structures.
- (5) Repair shops or workshops such as, but not limited to, clothing, shoes, watches, televisions, small appliances, electrician, painter, and upholstery.
- (6) Resale shops.

**SECTION 7:** Section 138-427 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code must be amended, as follows:

SECTION 12: Section 138-458 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code must be amended, as follows:

#### Sec. 138-458. Special uses.

The following special uses must be permitted in the twelve mile district, subject to the regulations in article VI, division 6, special uses, of this chapter:

(1) Automobile service stations, subject to the requirements of section 138-409.

- (2) Drive-in and drive-through eating establishments.
- (3) Open air business uses when developed as uses accessory to primary uses and structures in the twelve mile district as follows:
  - a. <u>Rooftop</u> outdoor seating areas for restaurants or other food serving establishments.
  - b. Outdoor retail sales of fruits, vegetables and plant materials not grown on site and sales of lawn furniture, playground equipment, hardware supplies and other home garden supplies.
  - c. Businesses in the character of open store fronts.

#### SECTION 13: Severability Clause

Should any word, phrase, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance be held invalid or unconstitutional, the remaining provisions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

#### SECTION 14: Penalty

All violations of this ordinance shall be municipal civil infractions and upon determination of responsibility therefore shall be punishable by a civil fine of not more than \$500, and/or such other sanctions and remedies as prescribed in Article IX of Chapter 82 of the Code of Ordinances.

#### **SECTION 15:** Effective Date

This Ordinance shall become effective 30 days following the date of adoption.

#### SECTION 16: Publication

The City Council directs the City Clerk to publish a summary of this ordinance in compliance with Public Act 182 of 1991, as amended, and Section 6.5 of the Berkley City Charter.

Over the past several months, the Planning Commission has been working with the City's planning consultant Carlisle Wortman to develop a zoning ordinance amendment to allow outdoor seating primarily as a principal permitted use with specific requirements and regulations and to allow rooftop outdoor seating as a special land use.

Detailed requirements provide businesses with a clear expectation of the information they will need to provide and the standards they will need to meet as part of the administrative approval process and for continued maintenance and upkeep. This would be subject to a yearly renewal, expiring at the end of each calendar year. Standards have been provided for the following:

- Application requirements;
- Hold Harmless Agreement;
- Certificate of Liability Insurance;
- Photometrics (if lighting is proposed);
- Temporary shelters (i.e. cabanas, igloos, etc.);
- Permitted locations;
- Access;
- Enclosures (i.e. moveable fencing);
- Street furniture and furnishings; and
- Maintenance

The Planning Commission held the required public hearing and recommended approval of the amendment at the April 25, 2023 regular meeting.
