# **PUBLIC COMMENT**

Wendi Zabramski, Berkley, spoke regarding the parking study and Amici's. She said the community development director is allowing the continued use of the outdoor spaces that were allowed during COVID. Her understanding is that they were all to end this month. Said there is not enough parking on Gardner for Amici's old seating area, let alone the expansion. She said many people use parking on Gardner and walk across; cars also park on residential streets. She said with the warm weather lately, people are in the way and in the alley, etc. She went over specific laws regarding municipal parking use. She said Amici's is the biggest offender.

Joseph Fisher, Royal Oak, stated he was stopped by Berkley police while driving for Uber. He stated police said it was a rolling stop, although he and his passengers disagreed. He said he requested an informal hearing. He completed the driver's improvement course; it's a sometimes a bird poops on your head situation. He said since the ticket, he's been stopping at yield signs and intersections where he has the right of way and now has been rear-ended twice, once resulting in a trip to the hospital. This has significantly impacted his life. He discussed other drivers' tendency towards aggressive driving. He has sent videos to Oakland County but hasn't received a response.

Councilmember Baker read P-10-23 in its entirety.

Councilmember Patterson read P-12-23 in its entirety.

**PRESENTATION:** Matter of receiving an introduction from 44<sup>th</sup> District Court Judge Andrew Kowalkowski.

Judge Andrew Kowalkowski introduced himself. He was recently appointed to the 44<sup>th</sup> District. He said he has lived in Royal Oak since 2006; he Is married and has two children. He provided his legal background. He said he is thrilled to have the opportunity to serve the citizens of Royal Oak and Berkley. He said he is aware of the court's reputation and knows he is filling a large seat with Judge Wittenberg. He said he is aware of not only Jamie's professional career but also his commitment to the community. He stated Judge Wittenberg had the approach that he aspires to. He thanked everyone for welcoming him.

Councilmember Baker thanked Judge Kowalkowski for taking the time to come out and introduce himself. He said that he appreciates the professionalism Kowalkowski brings to the bench. He looks forward to working together and helping ensure that our communities become even more safe and prosperous over time.

Councilmember Vilani thanked Judge Kowalkowski for serving. She said as he knows, he has big shoes to fill but she looks forward to seeing what he does to make it his own.

Mayor Dean thanked Judge Kowalkowski for his time on the phone. She said she is confident that he will fill the role and make it his own but that he will also continue some of Jamie's legacy. She said she is grateful to have a good person in this role and she looks forward to this journey. She thanked him for attending the meeting and introducing himself.

**PRESENTATION**: Matter of receiving a presentation from DTE's governmental relations representative.

Jennifer Whitaker presented on behalf of DTE regarding the response to the recent February ice storm. She said residents deserve better. She went over a slide of Michigan's weather patterns that had significantly shifted in recent years, creating conditions in which once-in-a-lifetime storms are occurring more and more often.

She said the conditions of the ice storm Berkley experienced in February hadn't been seen in 50 years. She said it was the worst case in history; Michigan was in the epicenter of the storm. She said there were .65 inches of ice. She said .5 inch is like a baby grand piano hanging on the lines.

She said they mobilized the largest field team ever with the primary goal of getting everyone's power back on as quickly and safely as possible. Sometimes that is by doing a temporary fix. She reviewed the storm power restoration priorities and process, including prioritizing substations that impact the most residents first. She showed photos of damage in Berkley. She said of customers who experienced an outage, nearly 81 percent of impacted customers were restored within 72 hours. The remaining customers were smaller outages or more severe damage.

She said they know they need to make more grid investments for improved reliability. She went over the areas in need of improvement. They have already put in \$5 billion. There are four areas of investment that are needed:

- 1. Continued investment in enhanced tree trimming
- 2. Continued preventative maintenance and hardening of the system
- 3. Drive for System Automation in the next 5-6 years
- 4. Accelerate rebuilding our older infrastructure and pursue strategic undergrounding where it makes sense.

She said it will require a \$20B investment just for grid reliability. She went over specific Berkley investments and the four substations that serve Berkley. She said more than 70 percent of outages are due to falling trees or limbs. She said Berkley is 66 percent on cycle (on cycle means trimmed every 5 years). She hopes they will be done by June and showed where they will be trimming.

She went over the System Improvement Update in Berkley. She said continuous work is underway, collaboratively with state and local stakeholders, as they make needed investments to improve reliability and provide the service customers expect. She said they understand the importance power plays in people's lives and their performance has been unacceptable.

Councilmember Vilani thanked Whitaker for the presentation. She said we are a city with a lot of trees. She said her personal experience with a tree entangled in lines hadn't gone as they had hoped. Whitaker said they plan for a substation area to be trimmed and have their arborist go and examine the trees in question. If trees need to be removed or trimmed they contact the homeowner. They never remove a tree without homeowners' consent and signatures. She said they follow trimming guidelines; the service drop is the property owners' responsibility. Vilani asked if lines outside of the service drop area are an issue, what should a resident's expectations be. Whitaker said if it's outside of their trimming schedule, there is a form the resident could fill out online (Tree Trim Inquiry) and said she could work with Matt regarding residents' specific concerns. She explained 'weed' trees that are hitting other cables, and said they are unable to trim if those lines are affected.

Mayor Dean said she heard from residents that DTE came to their doors to address an outage and they already had power; there seemed to be confusion. Whitaker said they are working on the outage map. She explained the older map and said they changed it in January thinking they would have four months to figure out the bugs and then they were faced with one of the worst storms only two weeks later. She said

she heard a lot of frustration, including the feedback that the map doesn't show what the customers need to see. They are working on those issues currently.

Mayor Pro Tem Gavin said everyone agrees grid modernization is important. He said reliability seems to still be an issue despite increased investment. He asked how that \$20 billion is slated to be spent considering these high-impact storms are not going away. She said they will work out the right formulas with regulators. She said they have to balance improvements with affordability as they have to be mindful of what people can afford.

Dean thanked her again and said residents could always reach out to City Manager Matt Baumgarten and he will forward concerns to Whitaker.

# **Public Comment**

Lauren Delega, Franklin, Policy Leader with HSUS and active member of the rescue community. She thanked Council for taking the first step toward banning puppy sales and pet stores. She did ask that they move forward quickly with a permanent ban on the sale of puppies. She said her rescue is overwhelmed right now and she said they are puppies from puppy mills or breeders that have a hard time selling after they are past 8-9 weeks old.

Tiffany Perkins, Royal Oak, founder of a nonprofit for disabled dogs. She spoke to dogs in small spaces – glass display boxes – and merle bulldogs. She said from looking at photos of merle bulldogs you can see that they have physical abnormalities. Merle bulldogs are out of breed standard. She has one herself. She partnered with a vet to conduct a case study on her dog and concluded she will live a short tough life because of her merle coloring and physical issues. She said unexpected and hefty vet bills await families who adopt these dogs. She ended by encouraging Council to work closely with veterinarians and veterinary physical therapists.

Alexis Helton, Berkley, per the ASPCA website, 6.3 million animals enter shelters annually. Only 7.7 percent returned to their homes. She said if you look at the records available at Michigan.gov under 2021 Shelter Reports, you will find these numbers closely align with shelters here in Michigan. For example, Detroit Dog Rescue returned 2.6 percent of dogs to owners, out of 311 dogs; Detroit Animal Control: 16.9 percent returned out of 3,608 dogs; Genesee County Animal Control: 26.8 percent out

of 1762 dogs; Humane Society of Genesee County: 7.1 percent out of 543 dogs; I Heart Dogs: 3.6 percent out of 699 dogs; Oakland County: 34.1 percent of 1728; Rochester Hills Center for Animal Care: 0.4 percent of 1647. She said the point is over 8,000 dogs were displaced in the shelter system this year. Will businesses selling animals take responsibility for these thousands of dogs? Royal Oak is one of the few cities that have banned the sale of retail dogs. She would like to see Berkley as a front-runner and leading by example.

Miles Handy, Puppygram, said Council is doing a great job by doing the research and said Puppygram has made a large investment and wants to be involved in the local community. He said there are some misconceptions regarding what they do. He said they have placed several dogs with residents in Berkley. He said puppies come at eight weeks old. He said they come from a holding facility with 72 hours of vet care, then they are vet-checked both there and here by a licensed vet. He said they are fed natural pet food wet and dry. He said they are fed separately. He said their habitats were designed by veterinarians. He said those puppies get played with consistently throughout the day. He went over the feeding and playing schedule. He said they are trying to make family pets. He said the blue merle bulldogs in the store are his personal dogs. He explained he is very passionate about his merle bulldogs.

the city has enjoyed with current Judge Meinecke and late Judge Wittenberg.

#### **MAYOR DEAN:**

- Commended the Public Safety Department for assisting in what was thought to be an active shooter situation at Great Lakes Crossing, but thankfully turned out to be a taser deployment. She said it means a lot to her that we have such dedication in the city of Berkley. She said they know they have this reciprocity with other communities, and it truly speaks to a broader definition of public safety. Fortunately, no one was hurt and it wasn't an active shooter situation.
- Budget work sessions are happening soon. May 8<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, and 10<sup>th</sup> (if needed). It is a line-by-line exploration of all the 'asks' in the city and where each dollar goes. She said they will see the priorities of each director, which is the exciting part for her. She thanked Laurie Fielder for all of her hard work.
- Berkley Days is coming up, where we'll be celebrating 100 years since Berkley became a village.
  It's a few days of great fun and there is something for everyone to do. May 11-14<sup>th</sup>, so come get a
  corn dog or elephant ear and wash it down with a beer. She said there is music and great food so
  keep that in mind. She said most of the council leaves tonight to go to the Michigan Municipal
  League conference, where council members will be able to network with elected officials from other
  communities and bring back best practices.

# AN ORDINANCE

of the City Council of the City of Berkley, Michigan to Add Article XVII, Retail Dog and Cat Sales Temporary Moratorium, in Chapter 30, Businesses, of the Berkley City Code to Establish a Temporary Moratorium on New Businesses, or Expansion of Existing Businesses, that engage in the Retail Sale of Dogs or Cats.

# THE CITY OF BERKLEY ORDAINS:

**SECTION 1:** New Article XVII shall be added to Chapter 30, Businesses, of the Berkley Code of Ordinances, as follows:

# ARTICLE XVII. RETAIL DOG AND CAT SALES TEMPORARY MORATORIUM

# Sec. 30-910. Purpose.

The purpose of this Article is to lessen and discourage the inhumane treatment of animals. Some commercial animal breeders operate unsanitary and inhumane breeding facilities for dogs and cats in which the health of the animals is disregarded. Some retail pet sales establishments purchase animals from commercial breeders that operate unsanitary and inhumane breeding facilities. For these reasons jurisdictions in Michigan and other states have in recent years adopted regulations and prohibitions applicable to the retail sale of dogs and cats.

The Berkley City Council is in the process of examining options appropriate to the City of Berkley to regulate retail pet sales in the City. While examining this issue, the City Council finds that it is in the best interest of the City, and the life, health, safety, and welfare of residents, animals, and potentially impacted businesses, to avoid the potential expansion of commercial establishments engaging in the retail sale of dogs or cats. For this reason, the Berkley City Council finds that it is appropriate to institute a 6 month moratorium on the permitting or approval of additional or expanded retail sale of dogs and cats in the City of Berkley. This temporary moratorium is needed to prevent the increase and sale of potentially unhealthy or inhumanely bred animals while the Berkley City Council considers policy options related to pet sales in the City of Berkley.

# Sec. 30-911. Moratorium

(a) A temporary moratorium on the addition or expansion of commercial locations engaging, or intending to engage, in the retail sale of dogs or cats in the City is established. This moratorium will go into effect on the effective date of this Article and will continue in effect for a period of 6 calendar months. During the moratorium period the City of Berkley will not approve any permits or business licenses for new businesses engaging or intending to engage in the retail sale of dogs or cats in the City and will not approve any revisions to existing permits that would change or increase the permitted locations for such sales. Any existing commercial pet store that is lawfully operating on or before the effective date of this moratorium is permitted to continue the retail sale of dogs or cats. As a condition of continued operation during the moratorium period, a commercial pet store is prohibited from increasing or enlarging the square-footage dedicated to

the retail sale of dogs or cats and is prohibited from opening any new locations in the City of Berkley.

- (b) City of Berkley Staff will engage in fact-finding related to potential regulations to ensure that pet sales in the City of Berkley are well structured to ensure transparency, adherence to humane practices, and protection of consumers.
- (c) The moratorium may be shortened prior to the end of the 6 month period with the adoption of regulations pertaining to the sale of pets in the City of Berkley.

#### Sec. 30-912. Violation.

A violation of this article is a municipal civil infraction, and upon determination of responsibility shall be punishable by a civil fine of not more than \$500, and/or such other sanctions and remedies as authorized in Article IX of Chapter 82 of the Code of Ordinances.

# **SECTION 2:** Severability Clause

Should any word, phrase, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance be held invalid or unconstitutional, the remaining provisions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

#### **SECTION 3:** Effective Date

This Ordinance shall become effective 30 days following the date of adoption.

# **SECTION 4:** Publication

The City Council directs the City Clerk to publish a summary of this ordinance in compliance with Public Act 182 of 1991, as amended, and Section 6.5 of the Berkley City Charter.

# AN ORDINANCE

of the City Council of the City of Berkley, Michigan to Add Sec. 138-199, and to Amend Sec. 138-32, Section 138-387, Sec. 138-388, Sec. 138-418, Sec. 138-427, Sec. 138-428, Sec. 138-442, Sec. 138-443, Sec. 138-457, and Sec. 138-458 of Chapter 138 – Zoning to allow outdoor service areas as a principal permitted use and allow rooftop outdoor eating areas for restaurants and other food serving establishments as a special use.

THE CITY OF BERKLEY ORDAINS:

**SECTION 1:** Section 138-32 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code must be amended, as follows:

Outdoor service area: A porch, patio, deck, sidewalk, parking lot, parking space, or other public or private land area used for seated dining and/or beverage service, which is adjacent and accessory to, but not located within the interior building walls of food and/or beverage establishments. Rooftop outdoor eating areas are not considered outdoor service areas.

<u>Rooftop outdoor seating area</u>: An exterior area, located on the roof of a building at least one story above grade, that is used for seated consumption of food and/or beverages, is operated by and is accessory to a food and/or beverage establishment within the building.

**SECTION 2:** Section 138-199 must be added to Division 6 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code, as follows:

Sec. 138-199. – Outdoor service areas.

Outdoor service areas are permitted when in compliance with the following regulations:

(a) Permit. An outdoor service area may be permitted only upon the approval of an outdoor service permit by the Zoning Administrator. All outdoor service area permits will expire on December 31st of the current year unless another time frame is specified in the permit or by the requirements of this Section. Outdoor service area permits are required to be renewed annually, subject to administrative review.

All applications for an outdoor service area permit or permit renewal must include the following:

- (1) Sketch Plan: A sketch plan (top-view drawing of the outdoor service area) with:
  - a. The location of an outdoor service area in relation to the business it will serve; the entrance to the business; adjacent properties (include addresses) and their building entrances; and existing landscaping, road, trees, catch basins, fire hydrants, and other utilities.
  - b. The dimensions of the outdoor service area footprint.
  - c. The location of the access ramps, platforms, and enclosures.

- d. <u>Details of any hardware such as fasteners to be used in the construction of ramps and platforms.</u>
- e. <u>The location and dimensions of all street furniture and furnishings, including, but</u> not limited to tables, chairs, trash receptacles, benches, and sun shading.
- f. The location of outdoor lighting fixtures, if proposed, as well as the location of wiring and a description of how the wiring will be secured to prevent tripping or electrical hazards.
- g. Location of on-site driveways and adjacent alleys.
- h. <u>If using on-site parking spaces</u>, the setback dimensions of the enclosure from traffic lanes, vehicle circulation aisles, alleys, and adjacent parking spaces not used in the outdoor service area.
- (2) Photographs, drawings, or manufacturer's brochures fully describing the appearance of all proposed tables, chairs, umbrellas, awnings, canopies, lighting, or other furnishings/fixtures related to the outdoor service area, including but not limited to portable heaters, and other fixtures used during colder weather.
- (3) A signed Hold Harmless Agreement as provided by the City.
- (4) For an outdoor service area proposed in a public right-of-way or on other public property, a Certificate of Liability Insurance, in an amount acceptable to the City, and naming the City as an additionally insured.
- (5) For an outdoor service area in which alcohol is served, a liquor liability policy or certificate of insurance naming the City as an additionally insured.
- (6) <u>If outdoor lighting is proposed, the Zoning Administrator may require a photometric plan.</u>
- (7) <u>If temporary shelters are proposed, a separate sketch plan must be submitted with the following:</u>
  - a. The location and dimensions of all temporary shelters within the permitted outdoor service area.
  - b. A dimensioned interior seating layout.
  - c. The materials of which the shelters are fabricated.
  - d. The type, size and location of portable heating elements, fuel tanks, and decorative lighting.
  - e. The type and location of lighting to be used.
  - f. The power source for portable heating elements and lighting, with description of how the wiring will be secured to prevent tripping or electrical hazards.

- (b) <u>Location</u>. Outdoor service areas are allowed in on-site parking spaces or lots, sidewalks, and similar areas, with the following limitations:
  - (1) When located in the side or rear yard of a site, an outdoor service area must be a minimum 50 feet from the property line of any single-family or multiple-family zoning district.
  - (2) Outdoor service areas must be setback at least 2 feet from adjacent vehicle traffic lanes, vehicle circulation aisles, or alleys.
  - (3) Outdoor service areas must be at least 3 feet from adjacent parking spaces not used as an outdoor service area.
  - (4) Outdoor service areas only may be allowed in on-site parking spaces or parking lots when parking provided without the spaces to be used for the outdoor service area still meets the minimum parking requirements for the principal building on-site as well as for any existing parking agreements.
- (c) <u>Time of Operation</u>. Permitted outdoor service areas may be operated all year. However, outdoor service areas in the public right-of-way are limited to April 1<sup>st</sup> through October 31<sup>st</sup>.
- (d) <u>Temporary Shelters</u>. Outdoor service area permittees may be allowed to erect temporary shelters, such as tents, igloos, bubbles, garden sheds, or similar type when in compliance with the following regulations:
  - (1) Non-electric heating elements are prohibited inside any temporary shelters.
  - (2) The location of all non-electric portable heating elements must be a minimum of ten (10) feet from temporary shelters.
- (e) Access. All outdoor services areas, whether located on a sidewalk or accessed from a sidewalk, must allow a minimum of five (5) feet of unobstructed pedestrian access along the sidewalk, as well as ingress/egress to the principal use for which the outdoor service area is accessory.

  Unobstructed pedestrian access along the sidewalk may be reduced to no less than three (3) feet when street furnishings, such as but not limited to street trees, fire hydrants, benches or trash receptacles, are present and dedicated passing areas are immediately adjacent.

Outdoor service areas must comply with Michigan Barrier Free Code, including but not limited to the following:

- (1) Entrances must be a minimum of 48 inches wide.
- (2) Connections between platforms, ramps, sidewalks, or parking spaces must be flush, and must not leave a horizontal gap greater than 1/2 inch, or a vertical separation greater than a quarter inch. 1:4 bevels are required for vertical differences that exceed a quarter inch.
- (3) <u>For outdoor service areas proposed on parking spaces with grades that exceed 5%, level platforms must be provided.</u>

- (4) Ramps must be provided for parking space outdoor service areas that are accessed from curbed sidewalks.
- (f) <u>Ramps and Platforms</u>. Ramps and platforms for outdoor service areas must comply with the <u>following regulations:</u>
  - (1) <u>Bolting of ramps and platforms into the road or penetrating the surface of the road/parking space is prohibited.</u> Ramps and platforms may be bolted to the existing curb, but curbs must be restored to the satisfaction of the City of Berkley DPW.
  - (2) Ramps and platforms must be designed and constructed to maintain unobstructed drainage flow along the gutter.
  - (3) <u>Platform and ramp substructures must be made of quality materials: i.e., wood, treated wood or composite materials. Platform and ramp surfaces must be of a non-slip, composite material.</u>
- (g) Enclosures. Enclosures are required for outdoor service areas in the following circumstances: when alcohol is served, when outdoor service areas on the sidewalk are within one foot of the back of the curb, and when using parking spaces. Enclosures must comply with the following regulations:
  - (1) The enclosures must be clearly marked, using railings, planters, fencing, or similar materials.
  - (2) Enclosures must not block the view of traffic, including pedestrian traffic, or block the view of traffic control devices such as traffic signs, traffic signals, and other traffic warning devices.
  - (3) The minimum height of an enclosure is 36 inches and maximum height is 42 inches.
  - (4) <u>For outdoor service areas serving alcohol, the enclosure must define and secure the</u> outdoor service area for alcohol consumption.
  - (5) For sidewalk outdoor service areas within one foot of the back of the curb, the enclosure must be located along the curb separating the outdoor service area from the roadway.
  - (6) For outdoor service areas using parking spaces, the enclosure must be a continuous, rigid physical separation with a height of 42 inches on all sides of the outdoor service area adjacent to vehicle traffic lanes, vehicle circulation aisles, alleys, and parking spaces not used as an outdoor service area.
- (h) <u>Alcohol service</u>. Alcoholic beverages may be served in an outdoor service area, as licensed by the State, for consumption by customers of the licensee.
- (i) <u>Street furniture and furnishings</u>. Street furniture and furnishings are allowed in outdoor service areas when the following regulations are met:

- (1) Outdoor service area street furniture/fixtures must not block the view of traffic, including pedestrian traffic, or block the view of traffic control devices such as traffic signs, traffic signals, and other traffic warning devices.
- (2) All outdoor service area street furniture/fixtures must be of substantial weight so that at no time could the outdoor service area furniture present an obstruction or risk to public safety, especially during inclement weather. All umbrellas must be closed or removed each evening.
- (3) <u>Hanging or overhead objects, including umbrellas, must have a minimum clearance of</u> at least 7 feet.
- (4) All outdoor service area furniture/fixtures must be maintained in a state of good repair.

  Any outdoor service area furniture/fixtures having broken, peeling, or rusting features or are showing other signs of disrepair must be promptly removed and replaced.
- (5) All sun shading must be constructed of fire-retardant materials.
- (j) <u>Lighting</u>. Temporary, decorative outdoor lighting, such as string lights or electric candles, may be permitted in outdoor services areas when such lighting is limited to the hours of operation of the outdoor service area, does not create glare that negatively impacts public safety or adjacent properties, and is secured in a manner to prevent trip or electrical hazard. All other lighting must meet the requirements in Section 138-143(b).
- (k) <u>Heating elements</u>. Electric and non-electric heating elements may be permitted in outdoor services areas. Non-electric heating elements must be placed a minimum of 10 feet from all permanent or temporary structures. Electric heating elements must be secured in a manner to prevent tripping or electrical hazard.
- (I) Maintenance. The maintenance of an outdoor service area is the responsibility of the establishment. Maintenance includes, but is not limited to surface treatment and cleaning, litter control, sweeping, and snow and ice removal. Any sidewalk or public property permitted to be used as an outdoor service area must be kept neat and clean at all times and free from any substance that may cause pedestrian injury or damage to the sidewalk or public property.

SECTION 4: Section 138-387 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code must be amended, as follows:

# Sec. 138-387. – Principal Uses permitted.

Principal uses permitted in the LB district are as follows:

(1) Any generally recognized retail business whose principal activity is the sale of commodities on the premises, in a completely enclosed building including, but not limited to, the sale of groceries, meats, dairy products, baked goods and other food items dispensed for consumption off the site, drugs, pharmaceutical, apothecary items, flowers, dry goods, furnishings, jewelry, clothing millinery, shoes, books and periodicals, stationery and office supplies and hardware.

- (2) Specialty shops such as, but not limited to, antique shops, craft shops and shops for the sale of gifts and notions.
- (3) Personal service establishments which perform services on the premises directly for the consumer such as, but not limited to, repair shops (shoes, watches, jewelry, radios, televisions, small appliances, vacuum and sewing machines, etc.), beauty salons, hair salons, barber shops, manicuring studios, tanning salons, massage facilities, spa service facilities, self-service laundries, reproduction/copy centers, printing, mailing/shipping centers, while prohibiting service facilities of package shipping providers, but which may require a retail adjunct.
- (4) Any service establishments including a showroom or workshop of an electrician, decorator, caterer, baker, painter, upholsterer, tailor, seamstress/dressmaker, photography studios and similar service establishments that require a retail adjunct.
- (5) Dry cleaning establishments of a retail nature. Strictly wholesale dry cleaning establishments must be prohibited.
- (6) Business establishments which perform services on the premises such as, but not limited to, banks, credit unions, savings and loan associations, loan companies, insurance offices, travel services, and real estate offices. Bank, savings and loan associations and credit unions may include drive-up facilities only as an accessory use subject to the required provisions for stacking or waiting space, apart from required off street parking areas, at the rate of 4 car spaces for each service window or pedestal, in addition to providing a full car length space at the window or pedestal.
- (7) Offices for any of the following occupations: executive, administrative, manufacturer representatives, building/construction company or contract sales headquarters, professional, accounting, writing, clerical, stenographic, drafting and real estate sales, subject to the limitations contained in section 138-390.
- (8) Professional offices for medical (doctors, osteopaths, chiropractors, psychologists, and psychiatrists) dental and optical, including clinics (outpatient service only); and other similar or allied professions subject to the limitations contained in section 138-390.
- (9) Professional offices for lawyers, architects, landscape architects, urban planners, engineers and other similar or allied professions, subject to the limitations contained in section 138-390.
- (10) Theaters, assembly halls, concert halls or similar places of assembly when conducted completely within enclosed buildings.
- (11) Places of worship.
- (12) Commercial recreational uses such as bowling alleys, billiard halls, indoor archery ranges, indoor skating rinks, indoor tennis courts, athletic or health clubs, schools of dance, schools of martial arts, or similar forms of indoor commercial recreation.
- (13) Restaurants, bars, lounges or other places serving food or beverage within enclosed buildings, not including drive-in or, drive-through or outdoor service eating establishments.

- (14) Single-family, two-family and multiple-family dwellings when located on the second floor or above a first floor permitted or special use. Single-family detached dwellings and first floor dwelling units are prohibited.
- (15) Accessory structures and uses customarily incidental to the above permitted uses.
- (16) Marihuana retailers and medical marihuana provisioning centers.

SECTION 5: Section 138-388 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code must be amended, as follows:

# Sec. 138-388. Special uses.

The following special uses must be permitted in the LB local business district, subject to the regulations in article VI, division 6, Special Uses, of this chapter:

- (1) Automobile service stations, subject to the requirements of section 138-389.
- (2) Drive-in and drive-through eating establishments.
- (3) Drive-through retail/service establishments.
- (4) Open air business uses when developed as uses accessory to primary uses and structures in the LB local business district as follows:
  - a. Rooftop outdoor seating areas for restaurants or other food serving establishments.
  - b. Outdoor retail sales of fruits, vegetables and plant materials not grown on site and sales of lawn furniture, playground equipment, hardware supplies and other home garden supplies.
  - c. Businesses in the character of open store fronts.
- (5) Commercial amusement device centers.
- (6) Nursery schools, day nurseries and child care centers, provided:
  - a. Applicants are licensed through the Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs (LARA). Proof of licensing must be provided to the city when submitting an application for a business license.
  - b. Facilities meet the minimum requirements established by the Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs (LARA) and meet the minimum standards of section 138-391 Area and bulk requirements and section 138-392 Building design requirements.
  - Facilities meet screening requirements as deemed reasonable by the planning commission, including masonry walls up to six feet in height, decorative fencing or landscaping.
  - d. Applicants, staff, and facilities meet the minimum standards established by the Michigan Child Care Organizations, MCL 722.111 et seq., as amended.

SECTION 6: Section 138-418 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code must be amended, as follows:

# Sec. 138-418. Special uses.

The following special uses must be permitted in the downtown district, subject to the regulations in article VI administration and enforcement, division 6 special uses, of this chapter:

- (1) Offices or agencies, when located on the first floor.
- (2) Banks.
- (3) Convenience stores.
- (4) Outdoor sales or <u>rooftop outdoor</u> eating areas, when developed as accessory to primary uses and structures.
- (5) Repair shops or workshops such as, but not limited to, clothing, shoes, watches, televisions, small appliances, electrician, painter, and upholstery.
- (6) Resale shops.

SECTION 7: Section 138-427 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code must be amended, as follows:

# Sec. 138-427. Principal uses permitted.

Principal uses permitted in the Gateway district are as follows:

- (1) Any generally recognized retail business whose principal activity is the sale of commodities on the premises, in a completely enclosed building including, but not limited to, the sale of groceries, meats, dairy products, baked goods and other food items dispensed for consumption off the site, drugs, pharmaceutical, apothecary items, flowers, dry goods, furnishings, jewelry, clothing millinery, shoes, books and periodicals, stationery and office supplies and hardware.
- (2) Specialty shops such as, but not limited to, antique shops, craft shops and shops for the sale of gifts and notions.
- (3) Personal service establishments which perform services on the premises directly for the consumer such as, but not limited to, repair shops (shoes, watches, jewelry, radios, televisions, small appliances, vacuum and sewing machines, etc.), beauty salons, hair salons, barber shops, manicuring studios, tanning salons, massage facilities, spa service facilities, selfservice laundries, reproduction/copy centers, printing, mailing/shipping centers, while prohibiting service facilities of package shipping providers, but which may require a retail adjunct.
- (4) Any service establishments including a showroom or workshop of an electrician, decorator, caterer, baker, painter, upholsterer, tailor, seamstress/dressmaker, photography studios and similar service establishments that require a retail adjunct.
- (5) Dry cleaning establishments of a retail nature. Strictly wholesale dry cleaning establishments must be prohibited.

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- (6) Business establishments which perform services on the premises such as, but not limited to, banks, credit unions, savings and loan associations, loan companies, insurance offices, travel services, and real estate offices. Bank, savings and loan associations and credit unions may include drive-up facilities only as an accessory use subject to the required provisions for stacking or waiting space, apart from required off street parking areas, at the rate of 4 car spaces for each service window or pedestal, in addition to providing a full car length space at the window or pedestal.
- (7) Offices for any of the following occupations: executive, administrative, manufacturer representatives, building/construction company or contract sales headquarters, professional, accounting, writing, clerical, stenographic, drafting and real estate sales, subject to the limitations contained in section 138-410.
- (8) Professional offices for medical (doctors, osteopaths, chiropractors, psychologists, and psychiatrists) dental and optical, including clinics (outpatient service only); and other similar or allied professions subject to the limitations contained in section 138-410.
- (9) Professional offices for lawyers, architects, landscape architects, urban planners, engineers and other similar or allied professions, subject to the limitations contained in section 138-410.
- (10) Theaters, assembly halls, concert halls or similar places of assembly when conducted completely within enclosed buildings.
- (11) Places of worship.
- (12) Commercial recreational uses such as bowling alleys, billiard halls, indoor archery ranges, indoor skating rinks, indoor tennis courts, athletic or health clubs, schools of dance, schools of martial arts, or similar forms of indoor commercial recreation.
- (13) Restaurants, bars, lounges or other places serving food or beverage within enclosed buildings, not including drive-in, or drive-through or outdoor service eating establishments.
- (14) Single-family, two-family and multiple-family dwellings when located on the second floor or above a first floor permitted or special use. Single-family detached dwellings and first floor dwelling units are prohibited.
- (15) Accessory structures and uses customarily incidental to the above permitted uses.
- (16) Marihuana retailers and medical marihuana provisioning centers.

SECTION 8: Section 138-428 of Chapter 138 of the Berkley City Code must be amended, as follows:

# Sec. 138-428. Special uses.

The following special uses must be permitted in the Gateway district, subject to the regulations in article IV, division 6, special uses, of this chapter:

- (1) Automobile service stations, subject to the requirements of section 138-429.
- (2) Drive-in and drive-through eating establishments.
- (3) Drive-through retail/service establishments.
- (4) Commercial amusement device centers.

- (5) Open air business uses when developed as uses accessory to primary uses and structures in the Gateway district as follows:

# **SECTION 13:** Severability Clause

Should any word, phrase, sentence, paragraph, or section of this Ordinance be held invalid or unconstitutional, the remaining provisions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

# **SECTION 14:** Penalty

All violations of this ordinance shall be municipal civil infractions and upon determination of responsibility therefore shall be punishable by a civil fine of not more than \$500, and/or such other sanctions and remedies as prescribed in Article IX of Chapter 82 of the Code of Ordinances.

# **SECTION 15:** Effective Date

This Ordinance shall become effective 30 days following the date of adoption.

# **SECTION 16:** Publication

The City Council directs the City Clerk to publish a summary of this ordinance in compliance with Public Act 182 of 1991, as amended, and Section 6.5 of the Berkley City Charter.

Subject: Outdoor Seating Amendments Second Reading

**Date:** May 10, 2023

Over the past several months, the Planning Commission has been working with the City's planning consultant Carlisle Wortman to develop a zoning ordinance amendment to allow outdoor seating primarily as a principal permitted use with specific requirements and regulations and to allow rooftop outdoor seating as a special land use.

Detailed requirements provide businesses with a clear expectation of the information they will need to provide and the standards they will need to meet as part of the administrative approval process and for continued maintenance and upkeep. This would be subject to a yearly renewal, expiring at the end of each calendar year. Standards have been provided for the following:

- Application requirements;
- · Hold Harmless Agreement;
- Certificate of Liability Insurance;
- Photometrics (if lighting is proposed);
- Temporary shelters (i.e. cabanas, igloos, etc.);
- Permitted locations;
- Access;
- Enclosures (i.e. moveable fencing);
- · Street furniture and furnishings; and
- Maintenance

The Planning Commission held the required public hearing and recommended approval of the amendment at the April 25, 2023 regular meeting. City Council approved the first reading at a Special Council meeting on May 10, 2023. As noted at the first reading, "and/or" has been added to the definition of outdoor service area and 'temporary' has been stricken from the definition of rooftop outdoor seating.

- **WHEREAS,** Cities across the nation, including Berkley, are working to end the senseless violence with evidence-based solutions; and
- WHEREAS, Protecting public safety in the communities they serve is the mayors' high responsibility; and
- WHEREAS, Support for the Second Amendment rights of law-abiding citizens goes hand-in-hand with keeping guns away from people with dangerous histories; and
- WHEREAS, Mayors and law enforcement officers know their communities best, are the most familiar with local criminal activity and how to address it and are best positioned to understand how to keep their citizens safe; and
- WHEREAS, Gun violence prevention is more important than ever as the COVID-19 pandemic continues to exacerbate gun violence after more than a year of increased gun sales, increased calls to suicide and domestic violence hotlines, and an increase in city gun violence; and
- WHEREAS, In January 2013, Hadiya Pendleton was tragically shot and killed at age 15; and on June 3, 2022, to recognize the 25<sup>th</sup> birthday of Hadiya Pendleton (born June 2, 1997), people across the United States will recognize National Gun Violence Awareness Day and wear orange in tribute to Hidaya Pendleton and other victims of gun violence, and the loved ones of all victims; and
- WHEREAS, the idea was inspired by a group of Hadiya's friends, who asked their classmates to commemorate her life by wearing orange; they chose this color because hunters wear orange to announce themselves to other hunters when out in the woods and orange is a color that symbolizes the value of human life; and
- WHEREAS, anyone can join this campaign by pledging to wear orange on June 2nd, the first Friday in June 2023, to help raise awareness about gun violence; and
- **WHEREAS,** by wearing orange on June 2, 2023, Americans will raise awareness about gun violence and honor the lives of gun violence victims and survivors.

# A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BERKLEY ESTABLISHING A RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL SERVICE FEE FOR THE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL OF SOLID WASTE EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2023

- WHEREAS, The City of Berkley provides a broad range of residential services in the area of solid waste Collection, recycle and disposal; and
- WHEREAS, The City also provides a commercial refuse pick up and invoicing service for eligible City of Berkley commercial merchants; and
- **WHEREAS:** The Southeastern Oakland County Resource Recovery Authority (SOCRRA) is establishing a single stream recycling program; and
- WHEREAS, The cost to the City for providing solid waste services has diminished its ability to keep pace with expenses in other areas of city services, and threatens the ability of the city to continue these services which contribute to the quality of life of persons living here.

#### NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF BERKLEY RESOLVES:

- **SECTION 1:** An annual residential solid waste collection and disposal fee of \$68.84 per year, per residential dwelling unit in the City is hereby established.
- SECTION 2: The fee herein established shall be collected in quarterly installments of \$17.21 which the City Manager be and hereby is, authorized and directed to cause to appear on the water billing of each residence as each is issued. The same penalty shall apply to unpaid balances of the service fee as apply to unpaid water bills.
- SECTION 3: The fee shall be collected from all residential dwelling units in the city which receive refuse collection and disposal services through the city and its appointed contractors with the exception of those multiple dwelling unit locations which currently are, or in the future may be billed as commercial accounts.
- **SECTION 4:** All dwelling units labeled a commercial account or a commercial or industrial business in the City of Berkley will be billed for said service from the City. The City shall charge the following rates per month:

Container	Weekly	Twice Weekly
Up to 2cy Dumpster	\$41.05	\$82.10

As of July 1, 2023, these rates will now appear on your water bill.

- **SECTION 5:** The annual residential and commercial solid waste collection and disposal service fees shall take effect July 1, 2023, and shall end June 30, 2023, unless readopted, extended or revised by resolution of the Council.
- **SECTION 6:** If total revenues from fees significantly exceed revenue requirements of the Solid Waste Fund it shall be applied to a future year total fee requirement and the cost to residents and commercial customers reduced accordingly.

#### **A RESOLUTION**

# OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BERKLEY, MICHIGAN SETTING THE CHARGES FOR WATER AND SEWER SERVICES EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2023

#### WHEREAS,

City Council has determined that, in order to provide safe, adequate water to the users of the system, and to assure safe transportation and treatment of sewage discharged into the system by all users of the system, the system must receive sufficient total annual revenue to ensure the proper operation and maintenance of the system, the development and perpetuation of the system, and the preservation of the financial integrity of the system. The city council has also determined that the system shall be self-sustaining, supported solely by the revenues of the system and not dependent upon the property tax payers of the city. To meet those ends, City Council shall fix the rates and charges to be imposed on all users of each component of the system in accordance with the principles and standards set forth in the Berkley City Code; and

#### WHEREAS.

the purpose of water and sewer rates is to produce sufficient revenues each year to pay the costs of water and sewer service utilized by the rate payers of the city. The city council has found that annual revenues and expenditures of the system can fluctuate substantially from year to year. City council has determined that, in order to provide adequate, but not excessive, annual adjustments in revenue levels in a timely manner, the city shall develop the estimated costs of service and shall base rates each year on those estimated costs; and

#### WHEREAS,

City Council has received a cost of service study commissioned for the purpose to establish or confirm the current and future cost of providing water, sanitary sewer, and storm water disposal based upon guidelines consistent with the tests for distinguishing a fee from a tax prescribed by the decision in <u>Bolt v City of Lansing</u>; and

#### WHEREAS,

**Section 2.00**: As required by the Great Lakes Water Authority, a high strength surcharge shall be levied against industrial and commercial customers of the Berkley sewer system who contribute sewage to the system with concentrations of pollutants in excess of the levels, and for rates as established for 2023-2024 with a 3% increase which are described as follows:

- 2.10: It is assumed that normal domestic customers do not contribute sewage with concentrations of pollutants exceeding the levels specified in Section 2.0 above, therefore, the high strength surcharge will not apply to domestic customers.
- 2.11: Further, the high strength surcharge will not apply to restaurants pursuant to the order of the U.S. District Court dated July 10, 1981, (C.A. No. 77-71100).
- 2.13: Amounts due for the high strength surcharge shall be calculated either by the Great Lakes Water Authority or by the Oakland County Drain Commissioner's staff. Customers who believe the charges have been improperly assessed shall bring their objections to the agency performing the calculations.
- 2.14: When the City is presented with an invoice or similar document by the Oakland County Water Resources Commissioner or the Great Lakes Water Authority for a high strength surcharge for a customer of the Berkley sewage system, the City shall add the amount of the high strength surcharge to that customer's next regular bill for water and sewer services, and it shall be collected in the same manner as the regular charges for water and sewer services.
- 2.20: As further required by the Great Lakes Water Authority/Oakland County Water Resources Commissioner, a non-residential flow surcharge which shall be added as a flat rate charge to each regular quarterly invoice for water and sewer charges issued by the City to customers that are liable for the charge shall be charged according to the schedule below.

Section 3.00: The rates described herein shall be effective with all bills rendered by the City of Berkley which are due and payable on or after July 1, 2023. Please note that occasionally due to the timing of rate approvals by other bodies, if any of the previous identified rates should need to change prior to 7/1/2023, the Berkley City Council will adopt a new resolution with the corrected rates.

**Section 4.00**: Whenever an overdue amount is transferred to the City tax roll for collection, an overdue administration fee of \$20.00 shall be added to the amount due. The fee shall be waived for property owners who have received a reduction in taxable property value by the Berkley Board of Review for reasons of economic hardship.

#### Section 1.10 DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY TAX

Pursuant to Section 12 of Public Act 197 of 1975 and as may have been further amended to date, generally known as the "Downtown Development Authority Act," the Council of the City of Berkley approves a levy of an ad valorem tax of \$1.8184 per \$1,000 of taxable assessed value on all real and personal property not exempt by law. #### Section 7.00 PUBLIC SAFETY RETIREMENT SYSTEM

Pursuant to Section 9(4) of Public Act 345 of 1937 and as may have been further amended to date, generally known as the "Fire Fighters and Police Officers Retirement Act," the Council of the City of Berkley based upon a recommendation from the Public Safety Retirement System Board determines what the necessary expense for investment consulting, advisory, city and outside management services, legal, fiduciary general liability costs and any other costs incurred by the retirement system. These costs shall be borne from the investment income of the retirement system.

The City Council will levy the necessary tax rate to defray the cost of the annual employer pension contribution and eligible health care costs for public safety retirees. Public approval of the pre-Headlee tax levy was in 1965. Currently, no employee contribution is contractually required or appropriated in fiscal year 2023/2024.

Property taxes are originally collected and appropriated for in the General Fund. The employer pension contribution only is transferred from the General Fund as an expense within the Public Safety Operations department and is credited in the Public Safety Pension System Fund as revenue to the retirement fund.


Corporate Cup Relays

Mr. Joe Baldwin, the President of Midwest Corporate Athletic Association, has submitted an application to conduct the Corporate Cup Relays. The event will take place on Saturday, June 17, 2023, from 7:45 AM (registration begins at 6:30 AM) to 4:30 PM, including a 10K Run and a 5K Run/Walk occurring over an approximately two hour period in the morning beginning at 7:45 AM. The event will begin and end at Hurley Field at Anderson Middle School. The routes will take participants from Hurley Field to the neighborhoods west of Coolidge from Columbia to Beverly (see attached map for specific routes). The remainder of the events will be held at Hurley Field at Anderson Middle School. It should be noted that this event has been held at this location for several years in the past, with the last being in 2019.

The Department of Public Safety has reviewed the application and spoken to Mr. Baldwin. The Midwest Corporate Athletic Association is a Nonprofit Corporation (ID #800810452). All funds raised by the Corporate Cup Relays funds are donated to two designated charities (Michigan Special Olympics (and local chapters) and the Friends for Animals of Detroit). The Midwest Corporate Athletic Association will have numerous volunteers to assist with the event, including adults at all intersections in the routes. Midwest Corporate Athletic Association will also have volunteers go door-to-door the week prior to the event to notify residents of the runs/walk. The application contains all of the necessary accompanying documents.

The last Corporate Cup Relays event (2019) was extremely well planned and executed and there were no issues. Midwest Corporate Athletic Association also reimbursed the City for the overtime of two PSOs to monitor the event. I have confirmed with Mr. Baldwin that his organization will provide all materials and that DPW will not be required for this event.

The Department of Public Safety will assign personnel to the runs/walk and will monitor the remainder of this event. DPS recommends approval of the Corporate Cup Relays, contingent on the approval of other city departments.



# MidWest Corporate Athletic Association

To the City of Berkley, Mi,

The MidWest Corporate Athletic Association (MWCAA) is a non-profit organization that puts on the Corporate Cup Relays (CCR) every June. This year's event will take place on June 17, 2023, at Anderson Middle School, in Berkley, MI. CCR is meant to "promote health in the workplace and competition among corporate athletes." The MWCAA also promotes philanthropy by supporting fundraising by our participating teams to local charities. Teams do their fundraising before the event, and provide the donations they raise directly to the selected charities. There is no fundraising on the day of the event.

With the support of the Berkely HS track team, who volunteer to help put on this event, we've held the track & field portion of this event at Anderson Middle School since 2016. In 2019 we were able to bring our 5K and 10K road races in Berkley, and we look forward to bringing them back to since the Covid pandemic.

Found within the application package sent to the City of Berkley includes verification of MWCAA's non-profit status. Nobody within the MWCAA is paid and no donations are solicited by the MWCAA. Once the all financial obligations of CCR are met a small sum of money remains in the MWCAA account to be used to start the next year's event, and any remaining balance is donated to the two charities supported by the event. I've provided proof of our non-profit status. They 2022 form doesn't require us to update the Board members info if it hasn't changed, so I've also included our 2018 form, with that info. The 2023 certificate of insurance is also included, with exact verbage requested by the city.

Upon approval from the City of Berkley, the MWCAA will provide a letter of notification to all residents and businesses along the race routes, via existing email distributions. In addition, hand delivery of the letter to each affected residence will be completed the weekend prior to the event.


On June 17th, the event team will provide the course barriers for the road events, as agreed to with the Berkley Police Department and DPW. The event team will install and remove all barriers in a reasonable timeframe before and after the event, per the schedule agreed to with the city. During the events, the streets will not be closed to local traffic. Barriers will be placed, and volunteers will help local traffic to navigate in and around the course, to avoid potential injuries, and minimize disruption to residents. The police department will stipulate the number of officers and length of time they're needed.







This is in response to your request for affirmation of your tax exempt status.

Our records show that we issued a determination letter dated February 8, 1950, which recognized your organization as exempt from Federal income tax under section 101(6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1939 which now corresponds to section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986. That determination letter is still in effect.

We classified your organization as a publicly supported organization, and not a private foundation, because it is described in section 509(a)(2) of the Code. This classification was based on the assumption that your organization's operations would continue as stated in the application. If your sources of support, purposes, character, or method of operations have changed, please let us know so we can consider the effect of the change on the organization's exempt status arid foundation status.

You are required to file Form 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Income. Tax, only if your gross receipts each year are normally more than \$25,000. If a return is required, it must be filed by the 15th day of the fifth month after the end of your annual accounting period. The law imposes a penalty of \$10 a day, up to a maximum of \$5,000, when a return is filed late, unless: there is reasonable cause for the delay.

As of January 1, 1984, your organization is liable for taxes under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) on remuneration. of \$100 or more the organization pays to each of its employees during a calendar year.




