**Rutherford County Airport** is the only public airport in Rutherford County. There are, however, several independently owned private airstrips.

Benfield says he believes use of the airport will pick up this year, even though fuel sales have dipped slightly over the past couple of months.

"Winter is usually a good time to fly," he said. "I expect activity will pick back up. I think people were probably cutting back a bit with some uncertainty around inflation."

The airport, Benfield and other officials say, is an important component of the Rutherford County economy. It is used by not only those who fly for pleasure, but also by business people.

"Local industry executives use the airport. And industry folks who may be looking to relocate to Rutherford County," Benfield said. "This airport is an asset to our community."

There are typically 45 to 50 aircraft at the Rutherford County Airport on a typical day. Like at other small airports, there is also a growing demand for hanger space.

More hangers are being constructed

at the county airport, and more are being planned.

The airport was recently awarded a \$1.24 million grant by the N.C. Department of Transportation for safety improvements. Lights, signs, and navigational aids will be replaced this year.

The Rutherford County Extension & Community Association (ECA) held its annual Achievement Program January 18, 2023 at Cooperative Extension. During 2022, ECA members participated in community service projects including a book collection for children, sewing dignity clothing protectors for nursing home residents, and creating handmade cards for the Boys & Girls Home of N.C. The group donated food and cooking supplies to Rutherford County families in need, awarded a \$500 college scholarship to a local high school student, and recycled over 5,000 pounds of recyclable material. Activities also included hosting educa-

tional programs and district meetings and assisting Cooperative Extension agents with programs.

ECA is an outreach of Family & Consumer Sciences through N.C. State Extension. Its mission is to strengthen families through leadership development, community action, and educational programs. During the coming year, ECA members will continue working on the National Project in Common: BEE-cause Pollinators Feed the World. Programs and workshops will be presented to various groups in the county about the importance of pollinators such as bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds, and ways to protect their survival.


#### Community Art Project at RC Library


This project began in January 2023 and will continue throughout the year, or until we are out of supplies or space to hang the finished piece.







#### TRANSIT

Winter definitely came in with a roar in December with single digit low temperatures during the Christmas holidays. Even though the temperatures have stayed mostly higher since, it is still important to remember that colder night temperatures, along with the wetter conditions, can lead to potential slippery situations, not only on roads and highways, but around steps and walkways that tend to not receive a lot of sun. Please remain vigilant in going about your daily routines with safety and those around you in mind.

Our total trip numbers have continued to remain stable even though we did see the numbers dip during the latter part of November and December due to the holidays. We continue to be thankful for this. As a result, we are still in need of additional part-time drivers. If you know of anyone looking for a part-time job (that continually gives back to others), please have them fill out an driver application for Transit. Applications can be filled out several ways: 1. At the County Office; 2. Transit office; or 3. County website and submit electronically. If you or someone you know are retiring and would like a part-time job, please apply. We would love to have you or them.

Operations Manager and Transit Specialist attended our regular monthly conference call with ModivCare vendor rep to discuss how things are going and any issues. Staff also attended monthly conference calls with NCDOT and NCPTA to stay updated on the state's Public Transportation System and be advised of any changes approved to pass down to local agencies along with new opportunities that are available. Transit held its quarterly TAB meeting in November. We moved to a lunchtime meeting with lunch provided by Transit to help alleviate any scheduling conflicts with our TAB members. Transit conducted several interviews for our Transit Assistant position that was vacated by Shannon Patrick upon her retirement. We are very pleased to announce that we hired Candace McDonald to fill the position. Candace began her employment journey with Transit on December 12<sup>th</sup>, 2022. She has come in ready to go and has done a great job adapting to her duties and continues to learn daily. She will be our backup trip scheduler to Mark as part of her job duties.

Transit held its Safety Training for November, December and January. Topics covered during this training were: Defensive Driving, Distracted Driving, ADA Sensitivity, BloodBorne Pathogen Exposure, and Customer Service. Operations Manager also conducted mandatory ride-a-longs with all drivers during the month of December. Transit also conducted two random drug and alcohol tests since last report. Transit provided a van and driver for the EDC ribbon cutting for the new Love's Truckstop that will be constructed this year. Operations Manager and Director met with Senior Center Director Tammy Aldridge to discuss placement location of the planned bus shelter. It was decided to place the shelter at the drive-thru area between the Senior Center and the Health Department to give passengers better access to the Health Department and the Library. This has allowed Transit to determine the three locations for bus shelters. A covered bus shelter will be placed at ICC at The Foundation, DSS on Fairground Rd, and between Health Department and Senior Center on Callahan-Koon Rd. Operations Manager also met with a concrete contractor to get a price and installation date for the three concrete pads that will be needed.

Transit was able to have our annual covered dish Thanksgiving meal in November with all employees for the first time in two years due to COVID. We have truly missed this time together just to visit and take a moment to be thankful for all we have and what we are able to provide for our county with our services. This is our favorite day of the year by far. The food is ALWAYS wonderful since employees bring their favorite recipe for the dish they volunteered to bring **(pictured below)**. We also held our Christmas Goody Day in December where employees bring their favorite sweet treat for others to enjoy. We also played a little Dirty Santa during this time which is always fun and entertaining.

# TEN THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT HPV AND CERVICAL CANCER

#### **HPV IS COMMON**

Most sexually active individuals have HPV at some point. At any time there are approximately 79 million people in the U.S. with HPV.

#### **DIFFERENT TYPES**

Some types of HPV can cause genital warts while some other, different types are linked to cervical cell changes that, if not detected early, can increase a woman's risk for cervical cancer. HPV also causes some cancers of the penis, anus, vagina, vulva, and throat. HPV infections are usually harmless, though, and most are cleared naturally by the body in a year or two.

#### VACCINATION

HPV vaccines can help prevent infection from both high risk HPV types that can lead to cervical cancer and low risk types that cause genital warts. The CDC recommends all boys and girls get the HPV vaccine at age 11 or 12. The vaccine produces a stronger immune response when taken during the preteen years. For this reason, up until age 14, only two doses are the vaccine are required. Women and men can get the vaccine up to age 45, but for those 15 and older, a full three-dose series is needed.

#### TRANSMISSION

HPV is usually passed by genital-to-genital and genital-toanal contact (even without penetration). The virus can also be transmitted by oral to genital contact, although this probably occurs less often. Studies show that male condoms can reduce HPV transmission to females, although condoms only protect the skin they cover.

#### TESTING

A Pap test can find cell changes to the cervix caused by HPV. HPV tests find the virus and help healthcare providers know which women are at highest risk for cervical cancer. A Pap/HPV co-test is recommended for women 30 and over. One HPV test has been approved for use as primary cervical cancer screening for women age 25 and older, followed by a Pap test for women with certain results.

#### TREATMENT

There's no treatment for the virus itself, but healthcare providers have plenty of options to treat diseases caused by HPV.

#### RELATIONSHIPS

It can take weeks, months, or even years after exposure to HPV before symptoms develop or the virus is detected. This is why it is usually impossible to determine when or from whom HPV may have been contracted. A recent diagnosis of HPV does not necessarily mean anyone has been unfaithful, even in a long-term relationship spanning years.

#### PREGNANCY


Pregnant women with HPV almost always have natural deliveries and healthy babies — it's very rare for a newborn to get HPV from the mother.

#### THE EMOTIONAL SIDE

It can be upsetting when HPV is first diagnosed, but remember that having HPV is normal! It doesn 't mean that anyone did something wrong, just that like most others they were exposed to a common infection. There are 14 million new HPV infections in the U.S. each year alone!

The American Sexual Health Association and the National Cervical Cancer Coalition have online support communities at Inspire.com that connect patients, partners, and caregivers. These are safe places where thousands of users find the information and support they need.


