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# INTRODUCTION

# PUBLIC ARTS & CULTURE COMMISSION

The City of Sandusky Public Art & Placemaking Plan was adopted in 2018. The plan calls for the Public Arts & Culture Commission to create an annual work plan to set goals and projects each year.

#### Implementing the Public Art Plan

The Public Art & Placemaking Plan calls for the utilization of attributes within Sandusky to develop projects that will stand the test of time and create memorable experiences. These projects should be highly viable, add to the geographic diversity of the city's public art collection, and maximize interactive opportunities and vantage points.

The projects proposed within this work plan follow the guidance of the goals and principles set forth within the City of Sandusky Public Art & Placemaking Plan.

#### **Annual Approval**

The Public Art Work Plan outlines all projects that will be initiated or in progress within the coming fiscal year. The Work Plan is developed annually by the Public Arts & Culture Commission in partnership with the Sandusky Planning Division and submitted to the City Commission as part of the budget for review and approval.

# DEVELOPMENT

# CREATING THE 2022 WORK PLAN

The 2022 Work Plan was created in September – December, 2021, within four regularly-scheduled meetings of the Public Arts & Culture Commission. The four steps to creating the work plan are outlined below.

#### **Session One: Brainstorm**

Planning staff facilitated two exercises to brainstorm as many ideas for the work plan as commission members could think of. A timer was set and each member wrote as many ideas as possible, one per page of a sticky note. Commissioners read each of their ideas out loud to the group while staff displayed them on a poster board. Ideas that were the same or very similar were grouped together. Next, the commission evaluated ideas and placed them on a second poster board, depending on how much impact those ideas would have and how easy they would be to implement.

#### **Session Two: Prioritize**

The commission members took the highest impact and most popular ideas from session one and began to prioritize them. Questions were raised for staff to research in order to create the draft work plan.

#### **Session Three: Draft Work Plan**

Each of the priority projects were assigned a budget to decide what would go into the draft work plan. Staff drafted this work plan document after session three.

#### **Session Four: Finalize**

Commissioners provided final comments and edits to the work plan document and moved to adopt the plan.

# **SUMMARY**

The Public Arts & Culture Commission Work Plan Budget is funded by the Public and Cultural Art and Acquisition Fund (PCAAF). The PCAAF (ord.18-108) is funded with 1 percent of the total admissions tax collected in the prior year.

# 2022 PROPOSED PROJECTS & PROGRAMS

The 2022 Proposed Projects & Programs are high-impact.
The chosen list includes a balance of longer-term,
complex ideas to work toward, and shorter-term,
less complex projects to implement in 2022.

The 2022 Work Plan includes seven proposed projects. Commission members chose from their list of ideas to a) prioritize projects that had the largest consensus across the group and b) were determined to have the highest impact for elevating the arts in the community. The seven proposed projects are:

- 1. Columbus Avenue Streetscape Art
- 2. City Hall Gallery
- 3. Rotating Mural Program
- 4. Painted Electric Boxes Program
- 5. Artist Led Grant Program
- 6. Lange Trust Sculpture Program
- 7. Sculptures by Jerzy Jotka Kedziora

# PROJECT 1

# COLUMBUS AVENUE STREETSCAPE ART

#### **PROJECT DESCRIPTION:**

In 2022, the city will launch a design process to redesign Columbus Avenue to become Downtown's Most Vibrant Street (see Downtown Master Plan). Public art will be a critical component of the final streetscape. The Arts Commission will participate in the design process and plans to fund a significant public art component as part of the street redesign or as a stand-alone project when the new streetscape is installed.

#### **BUDGET:**

# **PROJECT 2**

# CITY HALL GALLERY

#### PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

In 2021, the Public Arts and Culture Commission created and installed the City Hall Gallery and its inaugural exhibition. The exhibition went on display in September, 2021. In July of 2022, the commission will put out a call for artists for artwork to curate the 2022 gallery. A subcommittee of the commission will act as the selection committee to choose the artwork for display in the gallery from 2022-2023.

#### **BUDGET:**

\$200 budget for maintenance and equipment to install 2022 gallery in Q3 2022

# **PROJECT 3**

# ROTATING MURAL PROGRAM

#### **PROJECT DESCRIPTION:**

Introduction of a mural program that includes installation of up to six vinyl murals on select buildings for a time frame of 2-5 years. Program development will include a detailed plan for identifying mural size and placement, coordination with building owners, selection of art, installation, longevity, maintenance, and removal. Initial project budget is based on research of the *Six in the Short North* mural program administered by the Short North Arts District of Columbus, Ohio.

#### **BUDGET:**

\$25,500

# **PROJECT 4**

# PAINTED ELECTRIC BOXES PROGRAM

#### **PROJECT DESCRIPTION:**

Introduction of a program to paint the large, faded electric boxes along Shoreline Drive—a vibrant, highly visited place in the city. The program will give visibility to the work of local artists and enhance the built environment. Program development will include a detailed plan for painting requirements, location, selection of art, and maintenance. Initial project budget is based on research of the *Powerbox* program administered by the City of Boston, Massachusetts. This program is intended to be a pilot that can expand to other areas in the city, as driven by local interest.

#### **BUDGET:**

\$3,000 total

\$500 each (\$200 to the artist for supplies up front and \$300 at completion) for up to six boxes

# **PROJECT 5**


# ARTIST LED GRANT PROGRAM

#### **PROJECT DESCRIPTION:**

The Public Arts & Culture Commission invites artists to submit a grant application for the design and installation of a piece of artwork(s) to be placed or viewed by the public. Artists who are interested in applying for the Artist Led Grant Program are encouraged to attend a Public Arts & Culture Commission meeting to discuss their idea(s) with the commission. One or more grants may be funded in 2022, within the total program budget of \$10,000. Submissions are not limited to murals or sculptures.

# **PROJECT 6**


# LANGE TRUST SCULPTURE PROGRAM

# SCULPTURES BY JERZY JOTKA KEDZIORA


#### **PROJECT DESCRIPTION:**

Coordinate with Lange Trust on sculpture locations and logistics. The Lange Trust plans to bring a series of sculptures by Jerzy Jotka Kedziora to Sandusky. The series has been on display in Schiller Park in Columbus, Ohio since the pandemic. Each piece has its own green card, and as the pandemic limited international travel, they have remained in Columbus. Lange Trust intents to continue coordinating with Mr. Kedziura's team to bring the sculptures to Sandusky when they are removed from Schiller Park.
