

Primary Walking/Bicycling Routes: Buchanan St. to Hayes Ave.

The district provides transportation for resident elementary students in grades kindergarten through six, who live more than 0.5 mile from school; the boundary consists of the railroad tracks to the north and Perkins Ave. to the south.

Due to the congested and potentially dangerous railroad crossing to the north of the Sandusky Intermediate School, students are not able to walk or bike to school for as long of a distance as the other schools. To overcome this obstacle, the Intermediate School offers bussing to an additional 104 students. Bus stops are placed in feasible locations, so that students from several homes can meet safely at a central point for group pickup. Pupils in grades kindergarten through eight may be required to walk up to one-half mile to a designated bus stop.

Do school buses and parent vehicles use the same driveway for arrival and dismissal?

No, there are separate driveways for family vehicles and school buses.

Do all students use the same entrance to the school building in the morning?

No, students can use different entrances. Bus riders use the two front entrances, on Buchanan St., and parent/caregiver drop off utilizes the entrances in the back of the school.

Are all students released at the same time during dismissal?

No, a staggered release process is utilized. Times are staggered starting with parent pick-up beginning at 2:25pm, followed by bus pick-up at 2:30pm and lastly, walkers/bikers at 2:40pm.

Is school staff involved in either arrival or dismissal?

Yes, school staff helps students to enter and exit the campus safely. Adult staff members are stationed at all entrances of the school.

Are there any adult crossing guards located along student walking routes?

Yes, there are adult crossing guard that help students on their walking routes. There is one crossing guard at the corner of Hayes Ave. and Buchanan St. and one crossing guard on the corner of Buchanan St. and Thomas St.

No, police officers do not help direct traffic around the school.

















Active Transportation Needs Analysis



To understand the state of walking and biking to school in Sandusky, it is critical to identify areas where individuals are more likely to walk and bike due to economic necessity. The Active Transportation Needs Analysis uses socio-demographic data from the American Community Survey (ACS) to identify geographic concentrations of disadvantaged residents, considered more vulnerable to unsafe, disconnected, or incomplete active transportation networks.

The equity factors in ODOT's statewide AT Need analysis are weighted equally, and include minority groups, youth and older adults, poverty, educational attainment, limited English proficiency and no access to a motor vehicle.

Within the Sandusky City School District, 100% of the students are offered free or reduced lunch. Among the students currently enrolled in the Sandusky City Schools, there are 166 students and families that meet the definition of homelessness and less than 2% that have English as a second language.


According to the 2017-2021 U.S. Census Bureau, 4.3% of the Sandusky population speaks a language other than English. In addition, 12.3% of Sandusky residents live in a zero-vehicle household and 42.8% live in a one-vehicle household. This data further shows that the students in Sandusky have additional barriers than just their routes to school.

Other determining factors included: the speed of traffic along route (49), time (33), sidewalk or pathways (26), convenience of driving (23), child's before or after-school activities (19), crossing guards (17), adults to walk or bikes with (15), a group or students to walk with (7), or none of the above (9). Current Projects

After various conversations with the School Travel Plan team, the Sandusky City Schools' parents and the Sandusky community at large, it was a unanimous consensus that the primary focus needs to be on the Hayes Ave. and Perkins Ave. intersection. This focus is due to the lack of signage, and heavy congestion resulting in students, caregivers and community members facing an unavoidable amount of chaos and high-risk scenarios. Perkins Ave. is also the city boundary with the southern half of the road lying under Erie County jurisdiction however, no students are currently living past this border.

However, after meeting with the City of Sandusky, current and upcoming plans were shared with the School Travel Plan team containing projects set to improve the priority intersection of Hayes Ave. and Perkins Ave.. Some of these projects have already begun with the installation of digital speed limit and digital speed feedback signs heading east and westbound on Perkins Ave. near the Sandusky High School back entrance.

Additionally, the City of Sandusky has continued improvements along Hayes Ave. as part of their Southside Plan. These improvements have included the addition of three digital speed limit and digital speed feedback signs: one heading south on Hayes Ave. in front of the Sandusky Intermediate School, one heading west on Buchanan St. on the side of the Intermediate School and one also heading west at the intersection of Buchanan St. and Thomas St. The City of Sandusky has also repainted the crosswalks at the Hayes Ave. and Buchanan St. intersection, along with the Buchanan St. and Campbell St. intersection. At the Buchanan St. and Campbell St. intersection, there has also been an addition of rapid flashing pedestrian beacons and a no left turn Monday through Friday during the hours of 7am–4pm. This limitation sign has also been added at the intersection of Buchanan St. and Hayes Ave. Lastly, additional rapid flashing pedestrian beacons were added at the intersections of Hayes Ave. and Johnson St. and Hayes Ave. across from the Firelands Regional Medical Center.

Walking and Biking Encouragement Activities

There are currently no activities or encouragement strategies that promote walking or cycling to school. With the heavy congestion, lack of signage and lack of infrastructure features supporting pedestrian safety along the Hayes Avenue corridor, bus travel is currently preferred.



At the Sandusky Blue Streak Fall Festival in October, the School Travel Plan was further explained to the community and additional feedback was obtained. While gathering feedback from students and caregivers, students received a blue backpack safety light to utilize while they are walking or biking to school and a "Practice Bike Safety" coloring book.

Public Input Received at the Sandusky Blue Streak Fall Festival

Students and caregivers rated their top areas of concern as follows: the highest need for improvement being the Hayes Ave. and Perkins Ave. intersection due to high traffic volumes, speed and congestion; second was tied between adding a shared use path along the westside of Hayes Ave. due to the sidewalks being narrow, not leaving enough room for pedestrians and adding a raised intersection at the Buchanan St. and Hayes Ave. intersection due to the high traffic volumes and high speeds along the route; lastly, tied at third, was additional lighting and a digital speed feedback sign at the Hayes Ave. and N. Depot underpass and adding a high visibility crosswalk at the Orlando Pace Dr. and Camp St. intersection.

Additional feedback was provided including Buchanan St. needing to be widened because there is not enough room for cars and buses at the same time, causing buses to drive on the curbs; improving the exit of the Sandusky High School and Middle School turnabout due to cars leaving the parking lot at high speeds; the idea of speed tables at the Buchanan St. and Hayes Ave. intersection; the addition of a school crossing guard at Pierce St. and Hayes Ave..
