3. REVIEW OF NOTES FROM DECEMBER 21, 2021 MEETING (attached)

*A motion was made by Reynolds to amend the misspelling of Level 1's lawyer Michael Avramidis. The minutes were approved as corrected.*

4. GUEST SPEAKERS:

- a. *Fire Chief Bob Martin Del Campo presented to the Committee the annual report for the Hollister Fire Department.*

*Fire Chief Del Campo lead the presentation introducing a map with their area of service. He stated that the Hollister fire department is responsible to cover 1,400 square area miles of the San Benito County. Throughout the presentation Fire Chief Del Campo would show the districts and their major type incident. He explained that on the Hollister fire station response times, light colors meant it would take approximately 3–4 minutes to response, while green meant 5–8-minute response time. He mentioned that in the following annual report, motor vehicles accidents will be added to allow the city to get an idea of congestions on the roads. It will be derived from Rescue and Emergency Medical Services section. Also, he emphasized that downtown businesses, apartment complexes, and hotels require life safety inspections. The fire department will start doing these inspections as requested.*

*Fire Chief Del Campo spoke about his responsibility to seek grants to alleviate cost. He emphasized that every opportunity he gets to apply for a grant he does. The fire department able to receive a \$60,000 grant for automobile tools. Not only did they receive that grant, but they also received a \$700,000 grant that constructed the Hollister's Fire Department 4 story multiroom training*



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*tower. He mentioned that the fire fighters train there on a weekly basis. The space is not only specific to the Hollister fire department. Gilroy's fire department will also use the training tower.*

*For fire prevention, Chief Del Campo noted that they are on their way of surpassing last year's fire inspections, having done 1123 inspections so far. He mentioned to the committee that the law enforcement officers are well versed at investigating the cause of the fires.*

*Ponce- Mentioned that she felt it is important for members of the general public to be informed of what is occurring in the fire department.*

*Medeiros- Questioned if the state has a way to measure if the City of San Juan Bautista has the correct equipment?*

*Fire Chief Del Campo- Answered that they follow the National Fire Protection Standard (NFPA). He found it important to note that San Juan Bautista is not the same as other jurisdiction, seeing as there is wild land interference and agriculture. The correct equipment is dependent of the location.*

*Medeiros- Questioned if the fire department is trained to deal with the constant fires?*

*Fire Chief Del Campo- Responded that in the case of an emergency, the public will be notified to evacuate the premises. If a large-scale event were to occur, multiple services will be required to handle it. He mentioned that there are some drills to needed to prepare for these emergencies. There are two levels of training, one is for the community while the other is for the firefighters.*

*Delgado- Questioned in the case of an emergency, will San Juan Bautista residents be adopted into Hollister's system?*

*Fire Chief Del Campo- Stated that all of the community will be in consideration during the moments of emergency. He then reminded the committee that San Juan Bautista has their battalion chief.*

*Delgado- Questioned if the battalion chief is the key person to communication with? And if so, can they only be contacted regarding fires and danger?*

*Fire Chief Del Campo- Reminded them that each place has a liaison officer with the adequate knowledge to reach out to. In the case of emergencies, an emergency operation center would open.*

*Delgado- Questioned if our fire department would be trained four the independence rally?*



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*Fire Chief Del Campo- Answered stating that San Juan Bautista is an extremely important facility in the department for San Benito County, During the rally there is roughly around 20,000-30,000 individuals. The fire department will place additional water sources in San Juan Bautista (in town and out of town). On Fourth of July there is a lot of spot fires. San Juan Bautista will have: 2 engines and water tender, 5-6 firefighters staffing three different pieces of equipment. He emphasized, that just because an event was occurring, he will provide the same level of service to San Juan Bautista.*

*Jordan- Sought further understanding of a good intent call and mutual aid?*

*Fire Chief Del Campo- Gave an example of good intent being a smoke detector going off and the fire fighters will go to the property to change the battery. As well as helping someone who was locked out of their vehicle.*

*Jordan- Questioned if the people, city hall staff, and public works would be able to have the active shooting training?*

*Fire Chief Del Campo- Responded that the training for city hall would be more defensive, whereas the fire department uses more of a reactive approach. Either way, he will look into it.*

*Reynolds- Mentioned that the city could use more help from the fire department with planning future events better.*

*Jordan- Mentioned that she found having a check off a list beneficial before an event, to see if the city was ready for it.*

*Reynolds- Questioned if Chief Del Campo had heard anything about the county contracting a different service provider?*

*Fire Chief Del Campo- Reassured Reynolds, stating that he was 75% certain it was not going to happen.*

*Reynolds- Wondered if during the summer there could be training for residents?*

*Fire Chief Del Campo Guest Speaker ended at 4:55 pm*

*b. Lieutenant Tomas Corral was present to answer the questions and concerns the council members had.*

*Reynolds- Mentioned that over the weekend there was complaints about burglaries and break-ins. He questioned if Corral knew of these issues and if they were reported?*



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*Lieutenant Corral- Stated that there was only one report for 18 Monterey Street on the 21<sup>st</sup>.*

*Reynolds- Stated that there is an issue in the community of San Juan Bautista and their lack of reporting crime.*

*Lieutenant Corral- Mentioned that the lack of calls is an issue everywhere. It is important to call the Sheriff's department to have the crime statistics documented accurately.*

*Ponce- Questioned if there was a possibility for better communication between the sheriff's department and Level 1. She mentioned how Level 1's report the previous month had a lot of incidents, but none were solved. She believes that if Level 1 reported to the sheriff's department, the sheriffs would keep up with the suspicious activity.*

*Lieutenant Corral- stated that it will be easier to resolve the issues once there is an assigned dedicated deputy.*

*Ponce- Mentioned that regardless of the dedicated deputy, there are sheriffs on duty who can follow-up on these reports.*

*Lieutenant Corral- Stated that he was not aware of Level 1's reports, but is open to the idea if it will help resolve issues.*

*Freels- Mentioned that the dedicated deputy still needs to do training and how the sheriff's department can get involved with Level 1.*

*Lieutenant Corral- Mentioned that the Sheriff's department is not normally involved with citations, except when contracted with municipalities. There are a lot of young employees willing to learn. Believes that Level 1 has very detailed reports and wondered if Don could send the reports to Lieutenant Corral? She mentioned that there have been a few vandalizations, but the victim did not call due to the cop's response time.*

*Delgado- Mentioned that by the beginning of January all Sheriffs will be trained to write tickets. Questioned if sheriffs can cite vehicle violations?*

*Lieutenant Corral- Stated that while deputies are trained to write vehicle citations, they lack the exposure due to the contract with the Highway Patrol's.*

*Delgado- Mentioned that the sheriffs did not tow a vehicle with no tags*

*Lieutenant Corral- Provided his email: [tcorral@sbcsheriff.org](mailto:tcorral@sbcsheriff.org)*

*Jordan- Questioned if there was anything the city could do to help the sheriff's department?*

*Lieutenant Corral- Emphasized to encourage residents to report crime. He knows that people may not call due to not wanting to bother the sheriff's department or the sheriff's department response time. While he knows that their response times are a little longer, a deputy may be around the corner when needed. It is important to address small problems before they get big.*

*Jordan- Would like to bring up the issue of calling and reporting at the next council meeting.*

### 5. SECURITY CAMERAS-Draft Request for Qualifications (verbal report-update)

*The committee spoke about the presence of cameras in the city*

*Reynolds- Mentioned that he was actively looking to receive different request for qualifications (RFQ) from other cities. Also, he is thinking of hiring someone who can help create a plan and pricing strategy for the camera's equipment. By doing so, the city would be able to implement cameras in phases. He then mentioned how in June of 2021 the City of Oceanside spent \$500,000 as well as federal grants to put 9 cameras and an old system into place. He reminded the committee about the agreement with, Etheric, a broadband company and the city. He mentioned how Etheric is ready to pull building permits, since they finally have the hardware in stock to begin installing the broadband access up at the water tank. He believes that the cameras can connect into the broadband.*

*Medeiros- Questioned if the cameras would have real time monitoring?*

*Reynolds- Responded that the cameras could be checked anywhere in the world with a secure system.*

*Freels- Likes the idea installing cameras in tiers, sees it as economically beneficial, allowing the city to discover their target areas.*

*Delgado- Questioned if Reynolds had contacted SurveillanceGRID? And if Level 1 would be able to monitor the cameras at a lower rate?*

*Jordan- Questioned if there was a substation in the windmill? She then mentioned installing cameras in entry points. She would like to get another City's RFP. She believes that using surveillance grid will be beneficial, because using the same company as Hollister allows for potentially working together.*

### 6. PATH OF TRAVEL

a. *Jordan- Question if the School Superintendent should be invited to the next meeting?*

*Ponce- Believes it would be good to have the school district superintendent and board member.*

b. *New ideas to add?*

*Medeiros- Would like to speak about animal control and a dog park. He suggests another park close to San Juan Bautista creek, believing that the location may be historically valuable.*



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*Delgado- Would like to speak about installing GPS on the code enforcement officer.*

*Freels- Would also like to meet with the school's superintendent. He would like to speak about the active shooter program and shelter in place. He believes that we have to speak to the City of Hollister regarding their animal control.*

**SUBJECT: CODE ENFORCEMENT UPDATE**

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Attached to this report is the City Code Enforcement Officers "Annual Report" for the period ending December 31, 2021. I have also included the "after Action Report" from special enforcement actions authorized by the City Council to better control the use of illegal fireworks.

### OUTLINE

"Code Enforcement" is defined differently by different cities, and used for different purposes. In larger cities, it is restricted to enforcement of City planning, zoning, and building codes. Cities with tight budgets use "code enforcement" only for responding to complaints that are "health and safety" related, like overcrowded housing. In San Juan Bautista, the City needs "enforcement" for a much wider scope of work.

Enforcement of City Codes reaches far beyond zoning, planning and building and safety. They include homeless issues, parking, abandoned vehicles, and traffic enforcement. They include County health laws, new City COVID-19 health laws, a ban on single use plastics, and animal regulation. The City's Animal Regulation code is 17-pages long. (Chapter 5-7 on the City website). Just last year, COVID-19 laws and illegal fireworks were added to this list.

Traditional Code Enforcement occurs through educational and informal methods. The results of this method is a citizen who voluntarily complies with the City regulations and this normally results in long term compliance. If this less intrusive method does not result in compliance then the Code Enforcement Officer starts the formal process by issuing up to three (3) Compliance Orders and if those are ineffective followed by an Administrative Citation for each day the violation remains. The first citations has a \$50.00 fine, the second \$100.00 and the third and any additional citations \$500.00 for each day. In special cases concerning health and safety (such as illegal fireworks during a drought, or COVID-19 violations), fines can quickly add up to \$1,000.00s after a first warning. During the current state of emergency, homeless were protected by the State and allowed to "shelter in place."

When warnings escalate to citations, there are two types: parking citations and administrative citations. After a citation is written, the City relies on a third-party contractor to follow-up. The cite is entered into a data base, and warnings notices are sent by this company. In the case of an unpaid parking ticket, the penalty is sent to the DMV and paid when the vehicle registration is renewed (if it is renewed). Administrative citations are different, There is no easy way to secure payment, unless the code specifically allows a lien on a property owner the City must rely on the Small Claims Court.

The law requires the City to have an adjudication process for all citations. If a person feels the citation was written unjustly, they can "post bail" or deposit with the City equal to the fine amount, and request an Administrative Citation Hearing within ten (10) days of the issuance of the citation. If the Hearing Officer finds in favor of the person filing the deposit is refunded. If the person is not satisfied with the decision of the Administrative Citation Hearing they can file a review with the Superior Court. If the Court upholds the citation the person must pay the fine and any associated court costs. If the Court dismisses the citation the City must pay the court costs.

Code enforcement is a very difficult job. Every week, someone calls City Hall to complain about enforcement; either too little to too much. One property owner let his vicious dogs loose when he saw the City's Code Enforcement Officer issuing his vehicle a citation. (He later apologized). People often complain about being "picked on" or "discriminated against." When the City receives complaints about discrimination it takes them seriously, and during the past two-years, one investigation has been completed, but was unfounded.

Code Enforcement Officers are often entangled between property owners that have grown to disrespect each other. The best approach is to build communities that work together to solve their issues. That takes time and resources. Unfortunately, that is not often the Code Enforcement Officer's first call to duty.

## STATUS

In July 2019, the new City Manager received many requests for parking enforcement, truck traffic enforcement, traffic enforcement, abandoned vehicles and other complaints. The code often leaves all enforcement of every code to the City Manager. The Code Enforcement Officer was working part time for the County, so in October 2019, the City hired Rich Brown to work 20-hours per week SJB. His compensation reflects the multiple tasks that he performs above and beyond the traditional code enforcement officer. During the State of Emergency his hours were increased from 20 to 30, and he continues to serve 30-hours per week until such a time as the emergency ends, or the Council otherwise directs the City Manager to change the position.

Working now for almost three-years, the City Manager is aware that many code and administrative practices that are in need of serious attention. Attached is the City's Chapter 13

"ENFORCEMENT" that was last updated in 1996. It pertains to nuisance properties and the process to correct them; urgent, or not so urgent. It requires the City Council take action to correct nuisance properties, and modern polices leave this to the City Manager and Code Enforcement. The City Attorney is reviewing this code and comparing it to a County Ordinance adopted last August. It is a much better tool for abating nuisance properties.

The City Attorney is also reviewing 6-7 different definitions of parking violations. At the March 15, 2022 Council meeting revisions to these parking laws will be introduced for "upgrades." Staff is also looking into revisions to truck traffic violations and better tools for enforcing this.

Now that the City is writing more parking citations, (49 in 2020 vs 3 in 2019). So far in the second month of 2022 - 27 citations and 18 green stickers (warnings) have been issued the biggest whole in the system was the lack of follow-through. The City has revisited its relationship with its third-party carrier to help collect parking fines, and conduct hearings for parking citations. It was discovered that 3-persons requested hearings more than two-years ago, and no hearing ever occurred. These citations were dismissed in December. The parking citations have to be re-designed because they were printed as "San Juan Bautista Police department" citations. The third-party contract was amended to include a hearing process for persons protesting their parking ticket. It is managed now monthly, with the help of the Administrative Services Manager.

The management of the Administrative Citations were worse. The City was not paying the third-party contractor to follow through on these, and very few (if any) were ever collected. That changed in December. A new administrative citation has been drafted and when it is printed and ready, the whole system will move forward in-tact. The City will do its best to collect fines for citations written in 2020.

When the above referenced system is in working order, the City will move forward with better enforcement. It will bid private security before the current contract expires and negotiate a price for parking enforcement, and the associated appeal processes. The a more robust contractual services agreement to include citations will be moving forward July 1, 2022.

I will start out by saying 2021 was the first full year that Covid was not the primary focus of code enforcement. Face coverings and compliance with State requirements were monitored but no citations were issued regarding any Covid related matters.

There were ten animal control issues and of the ten only one required the assistance of the Hollister Animal Control Department. The case involved the care of a cat that was taken from the city limits by CHP and placed in the drop box in Hollister. The cat was adopted and only had to be house a few days. Two of the remaining nine cases I relied on the assistance of the Monterey SPCA who on two separate occasions involving reported animal cruelty were able to provide me with invaluable information as to what to look for and offered in person support if needed. Just having the in person support available was a huge asset and fortunately was not needed.

Homelessness appears to be restricted to one primary individual who has been offered assistance on numerous occasions but has decline to take advantage of any. At times we do have motorhomes appear near the Valero gas station. They are contacted and provided a verbal warning or green sticker regarding parking of trailers and/or overweight vehicles. On a few occasions a second contact is needed to gain compliance.

In regards to vehicle parking violations, there were forty-nine (49) parking citations issued. Twenty-three (23) of the forty-nine (49) were for over weight vehicles (Big Rigs). Ninety-four (94) green Stickers were issued and all were abated. The City is in the process of replacing the current parking citation books due to the fact they are titled as the City of San Juan Bautista Police Department. It just happens that we were already ordering Administrative Citations from the same company. I anticipate both citations will be ready by the first of next month.

There were a couple of cases involving businesses being operated out of residences both were abated or brought into compliance. With the recent ADU regulations there may be an increase in citizens reporting possible violations.

In addition to standard violations such as construction without a permit, weeds, and unsightly junk, we still have a few properties that need to be addressed regarding habitability and safety concerns that will be a priority this year.

## Code Enforcement

One word to describe a successful event is usually not enough, however; in the case of the Fourth of July weekend the word that can describe the level of success is "Outstanding!"

### Brief Summary:

With the approval of the City Council, 4 surveillance trailers equipped with sophisticated cameras and recording capabilities were deployed at locations that historically have been active area for setting off illegal fireworks including aerial fireworks with the potential of setting catastrophic fires in and around our small City.

The City's contracted security company Level 1 provided 4 Additional Officers, initially the intent was to have all four additional officers in the field but the decision was made to utilize one officer as a dispatcher/video monitor setting up a communication center much like NETCOM for law enforcement in City Hall.

The coordination and cooperation between the Security Officers and Code Enforcement was of the highest standard.

The primary goal of increasing officer presence and deployment of the camera system was to prevent a catastrophic fire. Through education and contact with public gatherings the unbelievable level of fireworks exploding last year was greatly reduced this year.



Unfortunately, not everyone who were educated did the right thing. On two occasions citizens were warned and continue to violate the law resulting in a \$1,000.00 citation. Fortunately, the law breaking did not result in injury or damage to property.

On the other hand a criminal activity did result from the illegal use of fireworks that damaged the public restrooms at Abbe Park that a great many of our citizens use on a daily basis and especially during ball games.

This matter is being investigated by the San Benito County Sheriff's Office.

Lastly, I anticipate additional citations being issued upon review of the captured video from the surveillance trailers.
