Department Remarks – Chief Stephen Klotz

The fire department experienced an average call volume during the month of February with 221 calls for service. There was extra staffing twice in February due to the weather conditions. We also assisted the police with successfully locating a missing subject during one of the snow events.

The fire department hosted a special four-day rescue class this month, “Man vs. Machine”. The class tested our firefighters’ skills with several types of simulated exercises focusing on rescue and extrication from machinery.

We were very active this month as it relates to personnel. The end of February was the application deadline for all candidates interested in applying for the Assistant Chiefs openings. We also started 2 new experienced firefighters, and 2 current members returned to work after their leave of absence. The additional personnel will help the daily staffing numbers.

 - Smoke detector activation, no fire – unintentional (5.11 %)

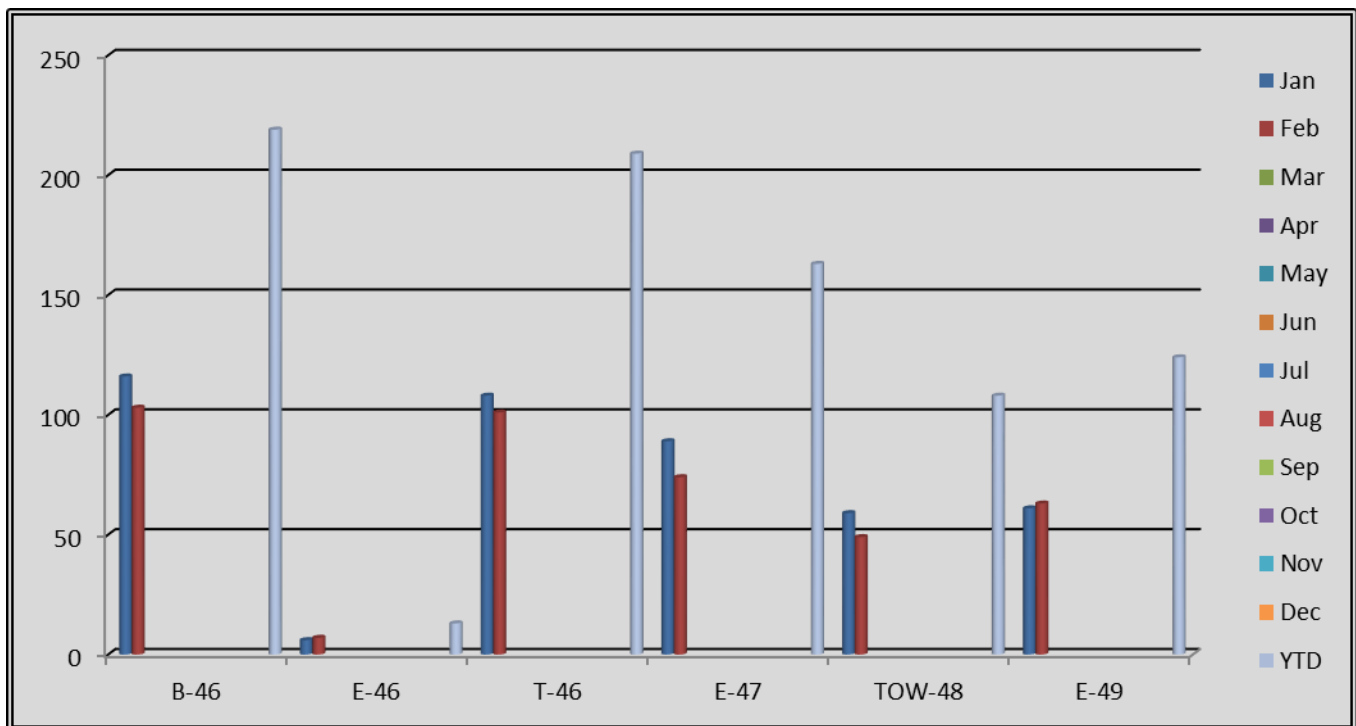
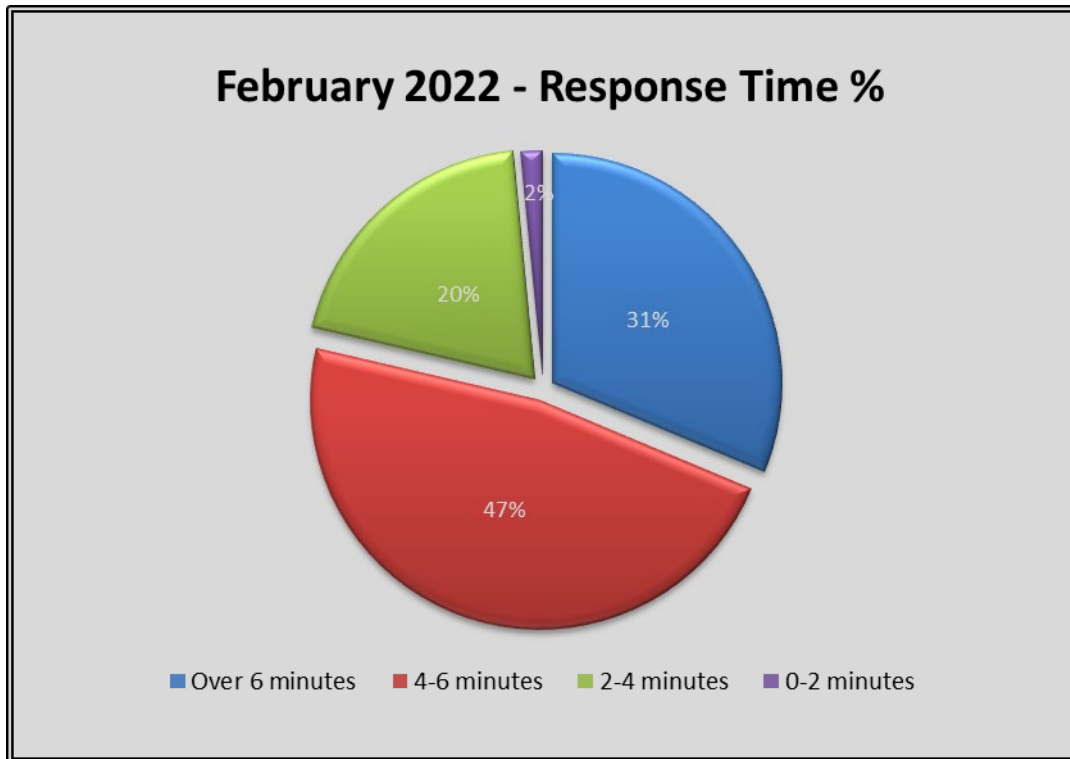
