Department Remarks – Chief Stephen Klotz

The month of October was a very busy month for the Fire Department. We responded to 259 calls for service. Two of the more significant calls were a fatal crash on I-80 and an assist to Oak Forest for a house fire. We had the preliminary ISO visit this month. From this meeting we will have follow-up information that we will send to them.

The Fire Department had our annual Open House on October 1st. During the Open House we conducted the graduation ceremony for the Citizens Fire Academy. Once more a big congratulations to this year's graduating class. October 1st is also a very important date for our department as it is the anniversary of Captain Thomas Gotkowski's line of duty death. We had a moment of silence in his honor to reflect and pay tribute to his ultimate sacrifice.

We hosted a Village employee picnic which was a big success. Also, we held our annual Poster Contest Banquet. The banquet had more than 80 people in attendance and a great time was had by all. The winners of the poster contest receive a ride to school on a fire truck which is always a big hit.

We are continuing to hire firefighters to fill the shortages, and we hope that the non-certified academy will start in the beginning of January.

 - Exit signs/emergency lighting maintenance = 39
 - Fire extinguisher maintenance = 10

- **Summary of Significant Events**
 - Rear apron and parking lot has been completed at Station 49
 - Front apron wings in progress at Station 48
 - Quarterly safety checks have been completed with PW
 - The roof at Station 48 has been completed

- **Vehicle Maintenance Report**
 - All vehicles have had their preventative maintenance completed
 - Truck 46 has been repaired and brought to standards
 - Engine 47 is still waiting on parts
 - Tower 47 is waiting on parts
 - Engine 46 is at the repair shop being worked on
 - Boat 46 had improvements done to the motor mount

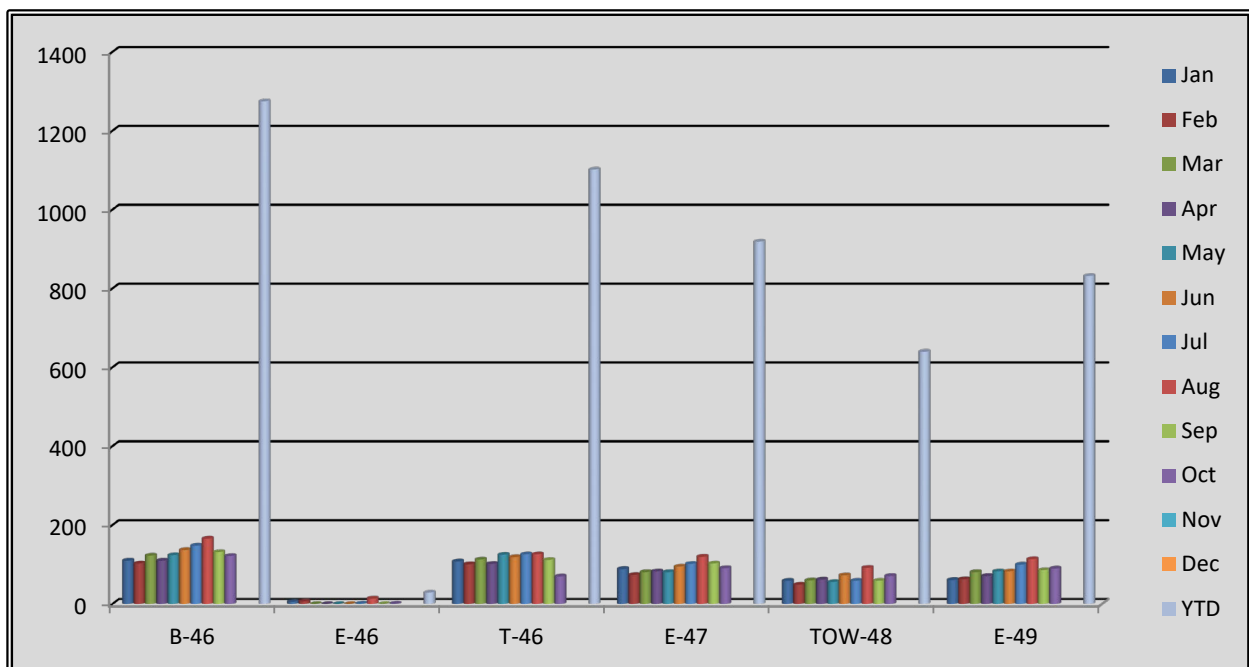
