Department Remarks – Chief Stephen Klotz

The month of September was a busy month for the Fire Department. We responded to 264 calls for service. We had an attack fire that was quickly extinguished causing minor damage. We had two vehicle extrications, one of them at 183rd street and Harlem and the second one at 167th Street and Central involving a train. We also assisted Oak Forest with an incident involving gunshot victims and a house fire. These emergency responses kept our crews extremely busy this month.

We have been diligently preparing for our upcoming ISO visit which will be on October 10th. This evaluation takes a lot of preparation not only from Fire Department but also from the Water Department, Dispatch, and GIS.

We hosted the Patriots Day ceremony at Station 46 which was a success.

The fire crews are very busy visiting all the schools in Tinley Park and working on the 51st Annual Fire Prevention Poster Contest.

The Citizens Fire Academy is going well with great participation and a lot of hard work from my crews.

- ***Significant Events***

- Began the process for the ISO evaluation
- Finalized the process of the new RMS for the Fire Department.

- ***Public Education/Community Outreach***

- Citizens Fire Academy concluded after 8 classes on September 28, 2022.
- 14 Fire drills
- 10 School visits
- Fill the boot at Texas Roadhouse for IFSA “Camp I am Me”
- Pizza boxes “Fire Safety” messages every Friday in September.

- ***Fire Inspection/Plan Review Services***

- 100% of assigned inspections for September were completed.
- Correspondence turnaround time = 1.04 business day
- 265 hours dedicated to plan reviews for 2022
- Square footage of inspected space in 2022 = 19,294,164
- 41 (new construction, remodel, fire alarm, and fire sprinkler) plan reviews were processed
- Plan review turnaround time was 1.73 days

- Exit signs/emergency lighting maintenance = 47

- ***Summary of Significant Events***

- Lift Assist (4.36%)

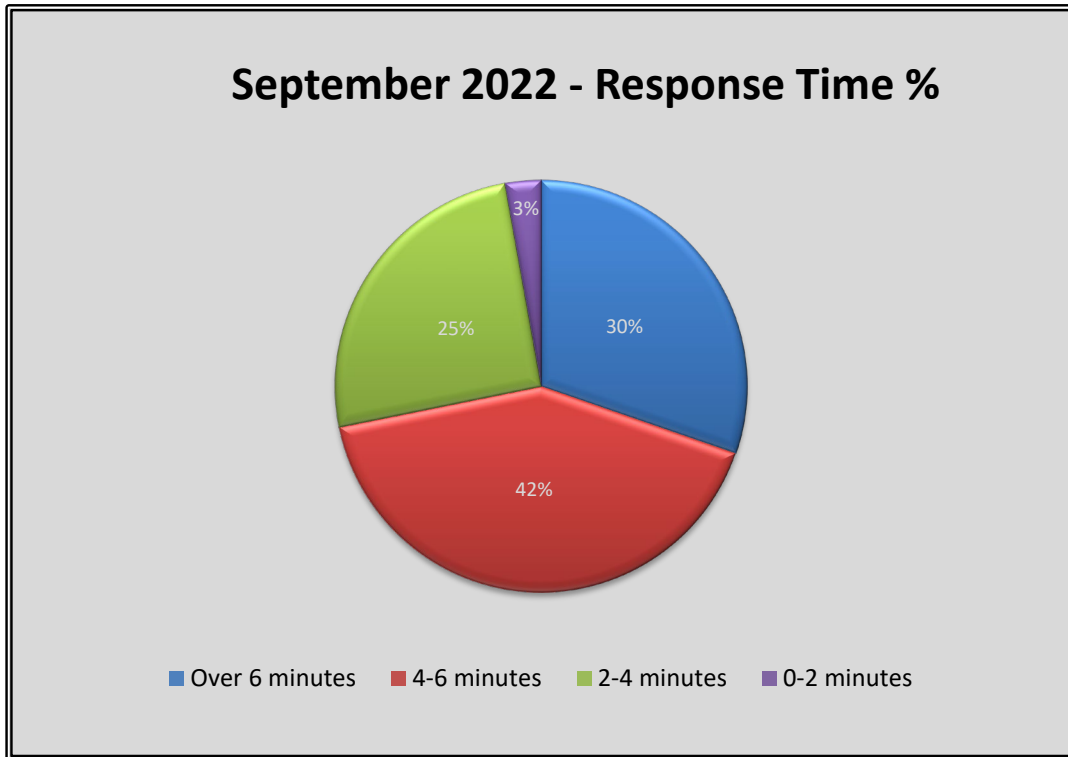

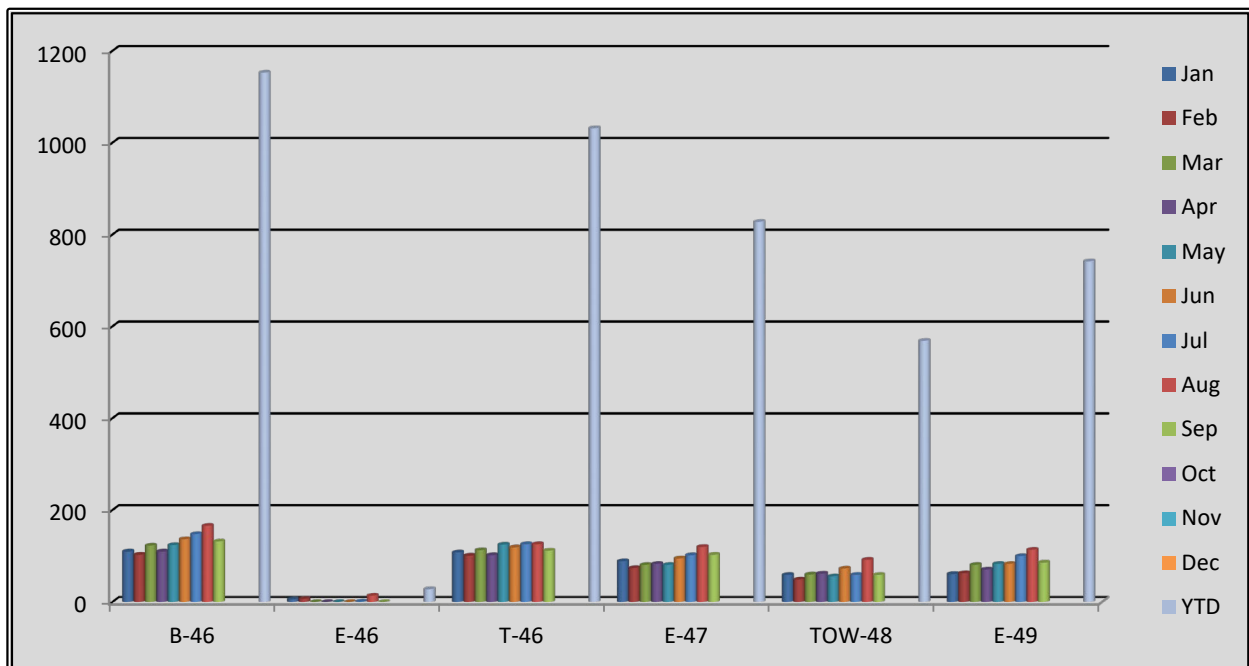
