Department Remarks – Chief Stephen Klotz

The month of May was the busiest month so far this year. The fire department responded to 332 calls for service. We assisted Mokena, Oak Forest, and Harvey with structure fires. There were several mulch fires throughout the town. We also assisted the Police with a flash mob incident.

Our Firefighter Academy is progressing well. The students will graduate at the beginning of July, and they will start working shifts.

We are actively preparing for the summer events and concert season.

We hope to launch our Captains and Lieutenants testing in the middle of June. The department currently has several vacancies in these positions.

Fire Prevention Bureau – Fire Marshal Steve Lorendo

- **Significant Events**
 - Fire Marshal Steve Lorendo met with School District 140, TPHS, and Andrew HS for their annual Safety Meetings.
 - Began the process with Community Development to begin electronic permitting for all life safety systems.
 - Steve Lorendo and Brett Oftedahl attended an OSFM Pyrotechnic class at Aurora Fire Department.
 - Public Education Officer Jim Calomino attended a 3-day Community Risk Reduction Conference at Valparaiso University.
 - Public Education Officer Jim Calomino completed his IFIA Public Fire & Life Safety Educator Certification.
- **Public Education/Community Outreach**
 - Used a \$500 stipend from Home Fire Sprinkler Coalition to create a contest on social media to give away a fire extinguisher, smoke alarm, and a \$30 gift card to local Tinley Park restaurants to winners each day from May 14th - 20th.
 - Fire extinguisher class was held for 3 EMA personnel.
 - Held a babysitting class for 17 teenagers at Station 46.

- ***Fire Inspection/Plan Review Services***
 - 116% of assigned inspections for May were completed.
 - 53 (new construction, remodel, solar panels, fire alarm, and fire sprinkler) plan reviews.
 - Plan review turnaround time was 2.83 days.
 - 42 Community Development inspections (remodels, new construction, change of use, and solar panel)

Fleet / Building Maintenance – Assistant Chief Tim O'Hagan

- ***Summary of Significant Events***
 - Pump Testing on all apparatus has been completed, with no issues.
 - New Command vehicles are being upfitted and will be done next month.
 - Updating SOG's and SOP's as they pertain to the Maintenance Division
 - Working on converting Engine 46 to a Squad
- ***Vehicle Maintenance Report***
 - Truck 46 has had the front shocks replaced and an antifreeze leak repaired.
 - Brush 49 has a water leak.
 - Engine 47 had its preventive maintenance completed.
 - Tower 47 had an EGR Valve replaced.
 - Engine 48 had a power steering line replaced.
- ***Station Maintenance Issues and Repairs***
 - Station 48 has a roof leak.
 - Carpet cleaning at all stations has been completed.
 - Lights on the training tower need to be updated.
- ***Tools/Equipment Issues and Repairs***
 - Hurst Tool preventive maintenance has been completed.
 - All inventories are in the process of being updated.

- Continue to load equipment into the Check-it software.
- All yearly testing has been scheduled and is in process.
- Hose Testing scheduled for June.
- Pump Testing is scheduled for May.

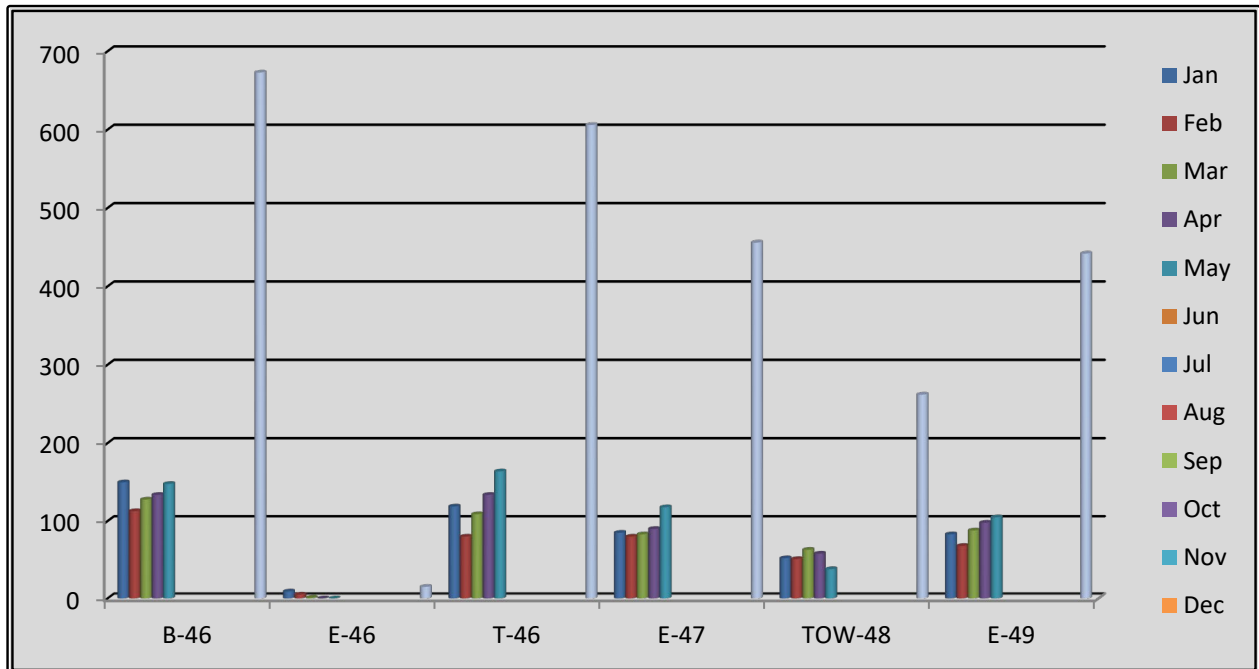
