

## Dedication in Memory of Jonathan “Jack “King

We dedicate this year's Annual Town Report to the memory of Jonathan “Jack “King. Jonathan was a kindhearted 17-year-old young man who attended school here in Waterboro at Massabesic High School and enjoyed being part of the Navy JROTC. He worked in the kitchen at Waterboro Market & Café and attended Lakeside Community Church. His favorite past-times were his friends, history, camping, dreaming of traveling the world, writing, and gaming. Tragically he cut his own life short on March 1, 2024, by suicide.

In his honor, we are committed to raising awareness about mental health and suicide prevention. It is our collective responsibility to create a supportive and understanding environment where every person, especially our youth, feels valued and heard. Together, we can work towards a future where no one feels alone or without hope.

If you or someone you know is struggling, please reach out for help. Resources are available, and there is always someone willing to listen. Let us remember Jonathan by fostering compassion, kindness, and support within our community. The following are some resources to help.

Dear Friends,

On behalf of the Board of Selectmen, town staff and committee volunteers, I am pleased to submit the Waterboro Annual Town Report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024. You will find reports and information from each Town Department as well as from Boards and Committees.

In June of 2023, we elected a new Charter Commission, they presented their Commission's findings in June of 2024, and presented several changes. At the November Presidential Election their changes were approved by the voters.

Significant changes adopted were to change the Town Administrator title to Town Manager, changing the Board of Selectmen to a Town Council and removing the Town Clerk, Treasurer, Tax Collector from the Town Administrator title. These changes will be effective July 1, 2025.

In addition, at the November Presidential Election the voters approved a Public Works Garage which is currently going through design and development.

The Town remains financially strong, but we remain vigilant with issues that may confront us in the short and long term. We continue to see a strain on our ability to manage assessed Real Estate Values versus Maine Revenue Services which still utilizes real estate sales data to determine "State Valuations". This has always challenged us to determine the impacts that valuation and/or inflation might have on local property rates. The Budget Committee, Town Administrator and the Board will work diligently to maintain a stable tax rate.

Although we have a strong base of volunteers working on our committees, please consider getting involved in some capacity. The stronger the base of volunteers will avoid adding additional staff in support of Town services.

As always, the Board's priorities will continue to be focused on developing solutions that will meet and address each challenge as it surfaces. We are committed to increasing the transparency of town government and will continue to take steps to improve communication with the public, our employees, departments, and committees throughout the future.

As we conclude another year, it is my privilege and pleasure to present to you the Town's Annual Report detailing our accomplishments and challenges. Our community continues to grow and thrive, thanks to the dedication and hard work of our staff, the involvement of our residents, and the collaboration of our local businesses and organizations throughout the year.

We continue to work on our town's infrastructure. Road repairs and repaving projects were completed on Roberts Ridge Road, Ossipee Hill Extension, and Happy Valley Loop. We also completed roadway mowing, updated Friendship Park, updated and installed irrigation systems, and completed some much-needed building repairs. While we have much to celebrate, it is important to acknowledge the challenges we faced. The ongoing supply chain disruptions and labor shortages have impacted various projects and services. However, through creative planning, we have managed to mitigate these issues and continue our progress.

The safety of our residents remains a top priority. This year, we increased our investment in public safety by upgrading equipment for the fire department. Training programs continue to be offered to our small but dedicated crew of responders. This training is essential to ensure that our first responders are well-prepared to handle any emergency. We also have continued with community outreach programs to promote safety awareness among our residents throughout the year. As a reminder, smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are available from our Code Enforcement or Fire Department.

Recognizing the importance of robust community services, we have held several luncheons at the local Snowmobile Clubhouse. This has been a great opportunity for our residents to gather and socially engage with one another. We look forward to continuing and expanding our offerings to better meet the needs of our residents. Our public library offers a wide range of services and resources, which I would strongly encourage residents to explore.

Our goal is to continue to provide high-quality public services that meet the evolving needs of our community. We believe that community engagement is crucial to the success of our town. We will continue to be transparent and televise and stream online our Select Board meetings and record various other committees. With recent approved changes to our Charter, effective July 2025, we look to the future for Waterboro to remain committed to fostering a vibrant, safe community. We greatly appreciate the time and effort given by the Charter Commission for this endeavor.

Finally, I would like to extend my heartfelt gratitude to all our residents, businesses, and staff for their unwavering support and dedication. Together, we have achieved great things and will continue to build a bright future for our town.

I have always been guided by the belief that to strengthen our state, we have to invest in our greatest asset: the people of Maine. Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share several key accomplishments for our state from the previous year.

As Vice Chair of the Appropriations Committee, I have secured nearly \$580 million for 230 projects across all of Maine's 16 counties to promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; support law enforcement; improve public education and infrastructure; and protect our environment. As the new Congress begins, I am honored to be taking the helm of the Committee, the first Mainer to do so in nearly a century, and I remain committed to ensuring that federal spending produces real results for our state and nation.

Maine has the oldest average age in the country, which is why I have long prioritized health-focused legislative efforts. There were more than 1,860 health care bills introduced during the 118th Congress. Only 15 health care bills were signed into law, and I was a lead sponsor of five of them. These bills will enhance care for individuals with Alzheimer's, autism, and substance abuse issues through improved research funding, strengthened public health programs, and increased support for rural first responders.

Another important bill that I coauthored was the *Social Security Fairness Act*. Since 2003, when I led the first-ever Senate hearing on the Windfall Elimination Provision and the Government Pension Offset, I have sought to end these provisions of the *Social Security Act* that unfairly reduce the Social Security benefits that public employees or their spouses have earned. I am pleased to say that with the passage of my bill, the *Social Security Fairness Act*, in December, public sector retirees will now receive the full Social Security benefits they have earned.

When the Maine way of life was under threat, I was certain to defend the interests of our state. I worked to protect Maine's potato farmers when the Department of Agriculture tried to reclassify the potato from a vegetable to a grain. I thwarted efforts to consolidate USPS mail operations at the Hampden postal facility, which would have disrupted mail delivery throughout our state. I sounded the alarm with leaders at the FBI and Departments of State and Treasury on the spate of illicit marijuana growing operations that are destroying properties and providing refuge to foreign criminals in our state. Following damage to our working waterfronts after last winter's storms, I secured \$15 million to help fishing communities recover. I championed funding to support the Maine Air National Guard base, Bath Iron Works, and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard.

As of last December, I have cast more than 9,100 consecutive votes, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997. My ranking as the most bipartisan Senator reflects Maine's tradition of working with a spirit of cooperation and respect.



Dear Friends,

As we welcome the New Year, I want to extend my sincerest well wishes for 2025: to you, your loved ones, and your community. I'd also like to share an update on what my team and I have been working on—and how we intend to continue serving Maine's First District in the next Congress.

One year ago, our state was reeling from a series of unprecedented winter storms. Thanks to the efforts of local, state, and federal officials, we're starting to rebuild. The Federal Emergency Management Agency and the Small Business Administration approved more than \$10.7 million in federal assistance for Maine households, businesses, and homeowners in the months following the storms. In addition, Maine received a \$69 million grant from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to support the climate-resilience goals outlined in *Maine Won't Wait*. More help is needed, no doubt, and I will continue to advocate for the support our state deserves. In 2024, \$1.7 billion in federal grant funding came to Maine—encompassing everything from conservation efforts and home-heating assistance to resilient infrastructure and affordable housing. My team was able to secure \$1.4 million in refunds for Maine taxpayers, along with \$639,000 in Social Security benefits. We also helped thousands of constituents file for work permits, veterans benefits, and passports, and wrote countless letters of support on behalf of our constituents.

I'm so proud of what we achieved in 2024, and I'm fully committed to building on those accomplishments in the 119<sup>th</sup> Congress. As ever, my team and I are ready to assist however we can. What an honor and privilege it is to have once again been elected to serve the good people of Waterboro! I hope each of you had the opportunity to experience a joyous holiday season with family and friends, and that 2025 brings you good health and prosperity.

State lawmakers took their oath of office on December 4, with a more balanced partisan composition of the Legislature being sworn in. The House of Representatives currently has 75 Democrats, 73 Republicans, one independent, one unenrolled, and one vacancy, while the Maine Senate consists of 20 Democrats and 15 Republicans.

Amongst the many challenges we, as policymakers, will face over the coming months leading up to the statutory adjournment date of June 18 are housing, energy, child welfare, and property taxes. # YORK COUNTY COMMISSIONER



## FROM YORK COUNTY COMMISSIONER (DISTRICT 4) DONNA RING

Dear Friends,

It is a pleasure to bring news of York County government's forward initiatives and proactive responses to challenges that can confront our residents and municipalities.

First, let me say how proud I am to represent you as your York County Commissioner, and I pledge to continue to work hard for all of you.

As we look back on 2024, there is very good news to share about two building projects that will improve the lives of York County residents. The [York County First Responder Training Facility](#) and the York County Substance Use Treatment and Recovery Center projects are underway on Layman Way. Land clearing for the two buildings commenced in mid-October, and an official groundbreaking ceremony was held Nov. 21. The foundation for the training center was poured in the latter part of the year.

A pair of coastal storms in January 2024 brought severe damage to our coastal communities. We pulled together to muster resources and are continuing to work with those municipalities to mitigate the damage. That wasn't all; April brought a wind-driven snowstorm that eviscerated the electric grid countywide, with 90,000 of York County's 129,000 Central Maine Power customers without power at its peak. Tree limbs landed on power lines and crashed onto roadways throughout the county, complicating recovery. We got through it together, and are stronger for having done so.

A lot more happened within York County government in 2024; here are some highlights:

York County Emergency Management Agency helped municipalities recoup \$73 million and more than 200 individuals recoup \$1.15 million from damages caused by the January storms, and helped municipalities recoup \$3 million in damages from the April snowstorm. YCEMA worked to support municipalities through the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program application and is supporting nearly \$4 million in projects countywide. There were 34 trainings for first responders and others; the agency added more than 1,000 new people to its alert communications system, and a pilot Beach List alert for visitors to Old Orchard Beach, Wells and Ogunquit, saw 1,279 opt in.

First County Foundation, created to help support the training facility and the recovery center, earned its nonprofit status, developed a two year fundraising campaign, launched the First County Foundation website: <https://yorkcountyfcf.org>, and organized a formal groundbreaking for the two projects attended by upwards of 75 well-wishers.

York County was awarded \$300,000 from the Maine Recovery Council to help build the York County Substance Use Treatment and Recovery Center.

York County Sheriff's Office patrol deputies dealt with 25,336 calls for service in 2024. The patrol division cleared 35.1 percent of UCR crimes (manslaughter, gross sexual assault, robbery, assault, burglary, and theft), exceeding the 25.1 percent cleared nationally. Deputies solved several high profile cases, including the arrest of members of a criminal organization stealing from the elderly. YCSO instituted the use of body cameras for deputies. The sheriff's office maintained its Maine Law Enforcement Accreditation in 2024, and York County Jail became accredited under the Prison Rape Elimination Act. Lori J. Marks was named York County Jail administrator in November. The average daily census at York County Jail was 202 in 2024.



## *YORK COUNTY COMMISSIONER Continued*

York County Commissioners were pleased to attend an open house event for the new My Place Teen Center in Biddeford in December. The teen center provides a haven for young people 10-18, sustaining them with meals, academic resources, job readiness, and life skills. Commissioners provided \$1.5 million of the county's American Rescue Plan Act funds to support the center. Among other initiatives, Commissioners welcomed projects in the Kittery area – where the board also supported (\$750,000), through its ARPA funds, supportive housing and a services hub. Commissioners also welcomed the delivery of the York County dredge, designed to aid coastal communities, purchased with a portion of the county's ARPA funding.

In November, York County Commissioners bestowed 18 Spirit of America Foundation tributes, recognizing groups and individuals for their volunteerism, as nominated by their municipalities.

York County Registry of Deeds recorded an estimated 45,500 documents in 2024, nearly 4,000 more than the prior year. The deeds office welcomed two new employees in 2024. The work of archiving and preserving York County's earliest records continues. Registrar Nancy Hammond continues to focus on the issue of deed fraud and worked on a bill draft to present to the Maine Legislature. She earned the 2024 Voice Award from the Maine Registry of Deeds Association.

York County Registry of Probate continued to process a record number of passports. Two new staff members were added to the team. The department continues to see more contested cases than in prior years.

York County Registry of Probate continues to support some of the most vulnerable populations in the county and Register Carol Lovejoy said she remains impressed by the professionalism of the department's team.

In 2024 there were 6,539 cases presented to the York County District Attorney's office by local and state agencies. District Attorney Kathryn Slattery and staff are dedicated to prosecuting criminal cases and civil violations that occur in York County municipalities. The office welcomed three summer interns, all law school students, in 2024, who assisted in all aspects of prosecution, and will welcome two summer interns this year.

County Fire Administrator Roger Hooper's role changed somewhat in 2024, with a concentrated focus on fire and EMS training, grant oversight, strengthening relationship with educational institutions and industry organizations, and preparing for operationalization as construction of the York County First Responder Training Facility began. The fire administrator's office coordinated training for more than 450 firefighters and EMTs in 2025, and in concert with other agencies completed a community wildfire protection plan for Massabesic Experimental Forest and surrounding municipalities, among other endeavors.

The IT department made many upgrades in 2024, including boosting all fiber connections and infrastructure at all county buildings to allow for increased network bandwidth and future expandability, and much more. Daily the department watches for, investigates and mitigates security threats to York County's systems and data to ensure the safety of county resources.

The county's facilities department took on a new role in 2024 of performing all grounds maintenance.

Among other endeavors, the department continued its efforts to keep York County Court House in its original state by having the chimneys and brick repointed, painting of some of the entryways and installing new basement windows. As well, privacy screens on all fencing around York County Sheriff's Office were upgraded.

The York County Sheriff's Office considers it an honor and a privilege to be your partners in producing a great quality of life for the community members and visitors of Waterboro. The Sheriff's Office meets regularly with Town Leaders to ensure we continue to deliver the exemplary service that the town has come to expect. During 2024, Sheriff's Deputies responded to over 4900 calls for service. Because Waterboro hires two contract deputies whose patrol area is exclusively Waterboro, many of these calls for service were self-generated. For example, 700 vehicles were stopped for traffic violations and 144 follow up investigations were conducted.

Deputy Duane Fay continues to serve the community members of Waterboro and Deputy Robert Nejad has joined him as the evening deputy. Deputy Nejad was a York County Deputy from 08/2022 to 06/2023 and needed to leave the area for family reasons. While away, Deputy Nejad worked for the Nevada State Police for over a year. Once his family situation was settled, he returned to the sheriff's office and upon learning that Deputy Gould sought a transfer, he immediately volunteered for the assignment.

Deputy Nejad will be assisting with the Citizen's Police Academy that is being offered through Massabesic Adult Education and is hopeful that some Waterboro community members will be part of the program.



Dear Citizens of Waterboro,

As we reflect on the accomplishments of the past year, it is with great pride and gratitude that I share this update on the state of our schools. Together, we have achieved significant milestones that underscore our collective commitment to providing a high-quality education and fostering excellence across all levels of our school system as we prepare students for success in an ever-changing world.

**Academic Achievements:** Our students have demonstrated measurable growth in learning as evidenced by improvements on state assessments. This progress reflects the dedication of our educators, students, and families working in partnership to achieve academic success. At the elementary level, our schools have climbed in state rankings, a testament to the hard work and innovative practices implemented by our teachers and staff.

At the middle school, we are proud to report the addition of several new course offerings that expand learning opportunities for our students. These enhancements were achieved without increasing staffing, showcasing our ability to innovate and efficiently utilize resources to benefit our students.

Similarly, at the high school level, we have implemented changes to the academic schedule that broaden the breadth of programming available to our students. These changes allow for more diverse educational experiences while maintaining our current staffing levels, ensuring that our focus remains on both academic quality and fiscal responsibility.

**Athletic and Extracurricular Excellence:** Our students continue to excel beyond the classroom as well. RSU 57 teams have been recognized for their exemplary sportsmanship, earning several Maine Principal Association Good Sportsmanship Awards. These awards highlight the character and integrity of our student-athletes, coaches, and supporters. Additionally, we celebrate our High School Wrestling Team for their extraordinary achievement in winning the 2024 State Championship. Their hard work, dedication, and teamwork serve as an inspiration to our entire community.

**Staff Recognitions:** The excellence of RSU 57 extends to our staff as well. This year, several of our educators and staff members have been recognized at the regional, state, and national levels for their expertise and contributions to their fields. These accolades reflect the exceptional talent within our district and the positive impact our staff members have on both our students and the broader educational community.

**Community Acknowledgments:** It is important to note that these achievements and recognitions are regularly celebrated at RSU 57 School Board Meetings which are held on the second and fourth Wednesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. at the Massabesic East Building. A full schedule of School Board and committee meetings can be found on our website at [www.rsu57.org](http://www.rsu57.org). We encourage you to join us in acknowledging the outstanding efforts of our students, staff, and community members who contribute to making RSU 57 a district of distinction.

**Finance and Budget:** The School Board began the development of the fiscal year 2024-2025 budget in early January, 2024. The goal of the budget process is to provide a budget that aligns with the District's Strategic Plan

while being mindful of the financial impact to taxpayers. The budget is developed annually based upon the district educational goals, evaluation of current and future education programs, needs as expressed by state and federal requirements, staffing which is necessary to achieve these goals, facility maintenance plans as well as consideration of local economic conditions. The Finance Committee meets weekly from January through March to prepare a budget for the School Board's review and consideration that will then be brought forward to voters in June.

**Facilities and Maintenance:** In alignment with the RSU 57 Strategic Plan Focus Area 4: Facilities, the School Board and Finance Committee remain committed to continually reviewing and updating both the facility maintenance plan as well as the long term facility improvement plan. Given the number of buildings and also the aging nature of the District's facilities these plans are critically important to ensure that the facilities are cared for as efficiently as possible in an effort to keep unexpected repair costs to a minimum. The District continues to provide well maintained buildings through a structured preventative maintenance approach which includes roofing, leach fields, heating and ventilation systems, air and water quality, masonry, lighting, life safety systems and windows. The vast majority of these projects have been and will continue to be funded through the District's annual budget, federal grant funds or the District's capital reserve fund. It is through this structured and proactive approach that the District has been able to control repair and replacement costs and be as efficient as possible in using your local tax dollars.

The School Board plans to have a final approved budget in April to present to the citizens of RSU 57. Citizens will be asked to attend the District Budget Meeting scheduled to be held on Tuesday, May 6, 2025, at the Massabesic Middle School at 7:00 p.m. The District Referendum Vote will be held on June 10, 2025, at your local precinct. The total General Fund Budget for the 2024-2025 school year for RSU #57 is \$52,552,405. The Town of Waterboro's local portion of this budget is \$11,187,439 which equals 33.90% of the total local tax assessment and represents an increase in Waterboro's local tax of \$718,366 or 6.86% over the 2023-2024 assessment. The district per pupil expenditure continues to be at a moderate level comparative to the state average.

**Enrollment:** The total enrollment for RSU #57 was 2,852 students in grades Pre-kindergarten through 12 based on the October 1 count. A total of 1,118 students from Waterboro represent 39.20 % of the total district enrollment. Current location of students:

## FY 2024 TOWN OF WATERBORO MUNICIPAL VALUATION REPORT

(figures pursuant to FY 2024 Municipal Valuation Return)

Property in Maine is assessed according to rules embedded in the State Constitution, Maine Statutes (mostly Title 36), and case law. Thus, the Assessor acts as an agent of the State, although employed by the Town.

These rules direct the Assessor to approximate the market value of taxable property within the town, using a similar system for each property class. The market tends to oscillate over time, but as long as properties are valued proportionately, then the system is considered fair. Annually the state's Property Tax Division audits the work of the Assessor to ensure compliance with legal practices.

### FY 2024 TOWN OF WATERBORO ASSESSOR'S NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

By the authority of M.S.R.A. Title 36, Section 706 and the Assessors of the Town of Waterboro hereby give notice to all persons liable to taxation in said Town, that their agent will be in session at the Assessors' office in the Town Hall in said Town, on the **5th day of April from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.** for the purpose of receiving lists of all real and personal property not exempt that they owned or purchased, including any land division, deed transfers or agreements made from April 1, 2022 through March 31, 2023.

All persons hereby notified to make and bring to said Assessor or their agent, a true and perfect list of all their estates, real and personal, which they were in possession of, or which they held as administrator, executor, guardian, lessee/lessor, trustee, or any owner, on April 1st, 2023, and be prepared to make oath to the truth of the same. Failure to file such list by April 30, 2023, may bar any appeal of taxes levied for FY2024.

When estates of persons deceased have been divided during the past year or have changed ownership from any cause, the administrator, executor, or other persons interested, and hereby warned to give notice of such change, and in default of such notice will be liable under state law to pay the taxes assessed even though the estate is divided. (**Assessors may continue to assess and to bill the last known owner of record.**)

**Homestead or Veteran exemption applications\*** are due in our office no later than the **April 1, 2023** deadline. Any blind person, or veteran, widow, minor child or widowed parent of a veteran who desires to secure a tax exemption under M.S.R.A. Title 36, Section 651, exemptions, including organizations, institutions or corporations, shall on or before the first day of April 2023, furnish written proof of entitlement to the Town of Waterboro Assessors. People wishing to file under the Maine Tree Growth Tax or Farm and Open Space laws must file a request for state classification, no later than **April 1<sup>st</sup>**. (extension to April 30<sup>th</sup>).

## TAX ASSESSORS' REPORT

### PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS FOR VETERANS OR THEIR FAMILIES

Veterans, their surviving spouses, minor children and widowed parent of a veteran may qualify for a tax exemption if the veteran was in active service in the armed forces of the United States during a federally recognized war or campaign period (listed below) and was honorably discharged.

Estates of veterans or their survivors, including real and personal property are exempt up to \$6,000 (\$7,000 for veterans who served prior to World War II) of just valuation in the town where the person filing is a resident. These following criteria must be met:

Applicant must be a resident of the State of Maine.

A one-time application must be filed along with proof of entitlement with the Assessor in the town where the applicant is a resident on or before April 1.

Veteran must be at least 62 years old (see #4 exception) on April 1 of the year in which the application is made. If deceased, Veteran must have been born 62 years prior to filing of application by survivor, OR

Veteran must be receiving a pension or compensation from the United States Government for total disability, either service or non-service connected, as a Veteran.

Parents of a deceased veteran who was qualified to receive an exemption.

#### FEDERALLY RECOGNIZED WAR PERIODS

World War I (April 6, 1917 to November 18, 1918)

World War II (service in Russia) April 6, 1917 to March 31, 1920

World War II (December 7, 1941 to December 31, 1946)

Merchant Marines in Oceangoing Service (December 7, 1941 to August 15, 1945)

Korean Conflict (June 27, 1950 to January 31, 1955)

Republic of Vietnam (February 1, 1955 to May 7, 1975)

Active Duty for more than 180 days.

Persian Gulf War (August 2, 1990 to the date that the United States Government recognizes as the end of the Persian Gulf War Active Duty.)

Other recognized Service Periods from (from August 24, 1982 – July 31, 1984 and from December 20, 1989 – January 31, 1990.

## Motor Vehicle Report

Maine is now a 25-year title state. A 2000 and newer vehicle will require a title until further notice from the state. All motorcycles requiring an inspection sticker will have March expiration. The year and the word March will be on the same sticker. This is to allow room on the plate for the inspection sticker, which will now go there as well.

Please remember that your insurance card MUST cover the day you are here to register. Providing proof of insurance is your responsibility. We can accept a fax of insurance coverage from your insurance company if you request it from them. Our fax number is 207-247-5456. There is a \$1 fee for incoming faxes.

We have online re-registration. The town website has links to the website needed. You will need your current registration and insurance card available to do this.

We also do re-registrations by mail. You can call and get the amount due and mail the check, mileage, and copy of the insurance. Your new registration and stickers will be mailed to you. This process can also be done over the phone with a credit card if you have your insurance information faxed first. There are fees with credit card use because it is an online service.

As of October 25th, 2023, there is no longer a limit to the number of Veterans plates you can have.



### 2024 Department Report

Waterboro Fire-EMS responded to a total of 1,259 calls throughout the year. This included medical, fire, accidents, public assistance, and inspections.



With approval from voters, Genesis Extrication Equipment was purchased to replace the aging gas-powered tools on Engine 2. The Genesis battery powered tools deploy and operate faster and take less manpower than our existing gas engine hydraulic hose powered extrication tools. These factors make for a more reliable tool with reduced risk of injury to emergency responders and a more efficient service provided to the public.

The Waterboro Fire Department continuously strives to provide the highest level of service delivery with the utmost efficiency, professionalism and quick response time to members of our community, 24 hours a day/365 days a year.

## Annual Report

This year we applied for and received an Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) from FEMA. The total grant of \$64,232 provided us funding to replace our aging SCBAs with new Dräger SCBAs. We were able to purchase 8 pack harnesses, 8 masks, 8 protective mask bags, and 16 bottles to fully outfit each truck with four SCBAs and four spare bottles. The new masks offer an increased field of view and improved communications abilities; the packs offer built in mobility and comfort improvements meaning firefighters can wear the packs for longer periods of time with less fatigue. This equipment also comes with a 15 year warranty on all parts of the SCBA thus reducing costs of repairs in the future. These new packs will enhance our safety and effectiveness in protecting our communities.



As for the rest of our equipment, yearly upkeep and maintenance of both trucks and other equipment is a high priority. Both trucks and all equipment are currently in service, completely operational, and ready to respond to emergencies.

Special thanks to the community members of Alfred, Waterboro, and Shapleigh; your continued generous support provides us with the ability and resources required to provide effective fire protection and emergency response. As always, a huge thank you to the dedicated hard working men and women of the Ross Corner Fire Company for continuing to go above and beyond the call of duty both within the fire service and your daily lives.



**Statistics:**

WPL was open 243 days and had 8,782 visits from library users. Over 1,055 patrons attended 186 programs! The Library houses over 23,000 physical items that include books, audio books, magazines, and DVD's. Your library card also gives you access to over 20,000 additional items via cloud Library, an app-based platform where you can download books to read on a device or listen to audiobooks on the go. Our patrons downloaded 2,114 digital books this year.

This fiscal year, card holders borrowed 21,182 items from our collection and another 497 items through Interlibrary Loan (ILL) and our Consortium of Apollo Maine Libraries (CAML). WPL loaned out 594 items to other Maine libraries too. Staff put together 1,147 Take & Make craft kits to go home with children and families this year including the very popular Valentine and gingerbread cookie decorating kits! The library also provides copy and fax services for a small fee. We have public access computers available inside the library. Wi-Fi is available 24/7 from the parking lot. We offer discount and free passes to many nearby Museums and Parks.

Don't miss out; get a WPL library card today! Stop by or sign up online at our website. The benefits are tremendous. Library cards are free for residents of Waterboro, Alfred, Limerick, Lyman, Newfield and Shapleigh. We offer non-resident cards for an annual fee of \$15.00.

**Community News and Collaboration:**

Each month throughout the school year we welcomed a group of Massabesic Extended Support students and their teachers. It was a joy to read stories together and then have them choose books to take back to their classroom.

## Public Works Department



This fiscal year has been particularly busy for the Public Works Department with many projects and storm damages.

Our dedicated Public Works crew continues to work on Waterboro's 68 miles of town roads with ditching, paving, and brush clearing as well as a wide variety of other road maintenance and public building projects. Bagley Road underwent some erosion control work with a catch basin and curbing being added to collect the runoff. The dedicated crew also did ditch work on several roads in town as well as replacing street and driveway culverts.

The Department took ownership of an F600 one ton truck that replaced the original 2011 one-ton truck and is outfitted with a plow and sander to take care of town properties in the winter months as well as needed maintenance in the spring, summer and fall. We have also purchased a used 6-wheel dump truck that helped us out in the summer months with ditching which allowed us to keep working while the second truck was unloading.

Countless hours were spent in the roadside mower trimming back limbs and grass alongside the town roads. Roberts Ridge Road was paved with a shim and overlay with a wider shoulder going down the hill. A rip rap shoulder was added to the hill to stop the road from washing out. Ossipee Hill Extension and Happy Valley Loop were also paved.

Winter operations have our crew continuing to plow Town Hall, fire stations, the public Library and the Transfer Station, with the town roads contracted out. As we all know we were hit with a major Nor'easter on April 4, 2024. The Town was left with extensive tree damage. Three separate independent contractors were hired to initially open town roads with the Public Works crew completing the remainder of the cleanup. Your Public Works crew spent a better part of four months cleaning up tree damage and applying to FEMA for grants to help pay for these costs. We greatly appreciate the hard work, long hours and dedication from our valued employees Tom Blackburn - Foreman, James Charland, and Shane Binette.

# TRANSFER STATION & RECYCLING

Another busy year has come and gone at the Waterboro Transfer Station. Each passing year brings new challenges within the rapidly changing solid waste industry. We strive to overcome these challenges while keeping the town's best interests in mind and staying environmentally conscious. This fiscal year has been filled with trials and tribulations that we have met head-on to maintain the best possible services for our residents. Looking ahead, we will continue to provide our residents with the best services possible. On behalf of myself and the rest of the Waterboro Transfer Station crew, thank you for a great year! The following are some interesting year-end statistics.

**Household Waste:** 212 loads of municipal solid waste were hauled totaling 2,390 tons. This was up 46 tons from the previous year.

**Single sort recycling:** 102 loads of Single Sort Recycling were hauled totaling 375 tons, up 40 tons from the previous year.

**Oversized Bulky Waste:** 197 loads of bulky waste were hauled totaling 1,224 tons, up 86 tons from previous year.

**Landfill Demolition:** 18 loads of land fill demolition were hauled totaling 104 tons up 23 tons from the previous year.

## Town of Waterboro Planning Board Annual Report

**Board Membership:** During the 2023-2024 fiscal year there were no changes to the membership of the board with two open positions remaining.

**Professional Support:** This year saw a change in the professional support we received from Southern Maine Planning and Development Commission (SMPDC) with long time Town Planner, Lee Jay Feldman taking more a consultative role and Mikala Jordan assuming the role of Planner. Mikala brings with her a fresh perspective on planning and has been a wealth of knowledge for the board. We appreciate the time and dedication Lee Jay has provided to the Town of Waterboro and look forward to our continued partnership with Mikala and SMPDC, Mike Gilpatrick (CEO) and Angela Chute (Administrative Assistant to the CEO and Planning Board) continue to be invaluable resources for the board and the board greatly appreciates all the support and assistance they provide us.

**Mission:** The Planning Board shall maintain the Comprehensive Plan in a current state, make recommendations of changes in zoning ordinances, review subdivisions and conditional use applications and perform such duties as delegated by local ordinance or state law.

The Planning Board received the following items for review and guidance:

**Ordinances and Zoning** – The board continued work to ensure compliance with LD2003 (An Act to Implement the Recommendations of the Commission to Increase Housing Opportunities in Maine by Studying Zoning and Land Use Restrictions) which Governor Mills signed into law in April 2022. The Planning Board worked closely with the Town Planner, CEO, and the Select Board to finalize zoning for Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU). In addition to these discussions, the Planning Board reviewed requested changes to the Wellhead Protection Zone, the Farm and Agriculture (FA) Zone while also discussing a potential ordinance to control boat slip/dock rentals within the Shoreline Zone.



The Board of Trustees are pleased to announce progress to increase the Waterboro Water District drinking water supply is advancing. Based on the 2023 source water supply study, a site at the existing Straw Mill property was selected and a new 8" well has been installed. A \$20,000 Grant application was approved by the Maine Drinking Water Program and the funds were used toward the installation and testing of the new well. The information collected will be submitted to the State for approval as a drinking water supply source. Following approval final design and construction is expected to begin in the summer of 2025. The Maine Department of Transportation notified the District the Route 202 Hamilton Brook culvert replacement project is scheduled for the summer of 2025. The project will involve relocating approximately 260 feet of 12-inch water main. We are presently designing and planning to purchase materials to meet the MDOT April bidding period. The district is working closely with MDOT to seek options that will minimize construction costs and service interruptions. Customers affected by service interruption will be notified in advance once construction begins. Funding for the two projects mentioned will likely require an application for a rate increase to be submitted to the Maine Public Utilities Commission in 2026. One final comment recognizes the response and service the Trustees provided during the April snowstorm. In difficult weather conditions they ventured down unplowed pump station roads and cleared down limbs to inspect and tend to power outage issues. Their efforts is one example of the dedication offered to assure delivery of reliable water service to our customers. Individuals seeking additional water quality, managerial and operational information may find it in the Consumer Confidence Report posted at the entrance to the Waterboro Water District section of the Town Office. Copies are also available upon request. We appreciate the people who take the time to read the report and encourage readers to inform us if you have questions or comments. ## Waterboro Community Garden

2024 was a successful 13th season full of accomplishments on many levels for the Waterboro Community Garden! There was an abundance of veggies, herbs, flowers, bugs, critters, construction and a lot of fun! The twenty-five 4'x24' raised beds were filled with healthy growth intended for the households of the individuals renting them as well as for the Waterboro Community Food Pantry next door. Perennial and annual Flower beds at the sheds and the entrance to the garden provided food for pollinators and added beauty to the overall setting of the Garden.

Overall maintenance of the gardens and infrastructure projects was organized and led by Infrastructure Co-ordinators and once again kept member volunteers occupied. One of the agreements when folks rent a bed at the garden is to perform at least a minimum of six volunteer hours of the work that keeps the garden going and growing, so there was, as always, plenty to do! One unexpected infrastructure project arose early on. As winter melted away, an unwelcome surprise greeted members as the roof of the newly installed “berry garden” enclosure had collapsed under the weight of accumulated ice and snow! Two members repaired the damage using parts from a warranty replacement enclosure moved to the garden by Town Hall staffers Pete Cote and Jason Champion. In another project, a member crew replaced the rotting boards of five older raised beds, three in spring and two in the fall, with materials purchased from Buddy Woodsome in North Waterboro. Members also did the stone preparation for installation and painting of a second storage shed.

A major project of WCG is raising and donating fresh produce to the Waterboro Community Food Pantry, and 2024 was no exception. Many hours of planning and coordination went into producing the total of 536.5 pounds that was donated this year. While the bulk of that was grown in designated Pantry Beds, 65.5 pounds came from donations from individual members' beds. The heaviest crop, butternut squash produced 49 squashes and was the largest (and heaviest) crop, coming in at 123 pounds! The work to plant, maintain and harvest for the food pantry is always a significant amount of the volunteer labor contributed by members, and the Volunteer Coordinator listed a total of 332 reported hours of volunteer labor, knowing that many, many more hours are done and never reported.

As in most gardening years, 2024 was not without its weather challenges that brought both early warmth that led to some early planting, and then intense heat and serious rains that impacted plant growth for better and for worse. It also seemed to encourage the bug-level critters, especially a serious crop of squash bugs as well as those pesky potato and cucumber beetles. Critters also abounded during the season, requiring creative efforts of trapping and repelling at the sighting of tunnels around and within some beds. A mystery developed in August, as gardeners found unexplained crop damage. Setting up game cameras investigators discovered a family of skunks decimating vegetables and a small corn crop the very night of recording. Traps were soon set but nothing was caught! After the corn was gone so was the skunk family!

Committee members want to express gratitude to Judi Carll and Sherry Stone who left the committee during 2024, for their contributions. Appreciation also goes to community contributors that helped make for a successful season. Donations of a compost/loam mix by Leighton's Excavation and crushed rock from Dayton Sand and Gravel, as well as labor by Buddy Knight helped with infrastructure, while Ossipee Hill Farm's donation of seed garlic boosted a new bed planted with garlic for next year's Pantry Garden harvest. Purchases from Nathan Ford of what the gardeners call “wood bits” helped provide the surface for the entire garden's pathways and compost from Tibbetts Farm's added to the richness of the soils. Pete Cote's management of water delivery to the garden at season's start and close insured access to that vital garden component, and Public Works delivery of the plant leavings to the compost pile at the Transfer Station helped leave the gardens in good shape. Thanks all!

# Saco River Corridor Commission

## SACO RIVER CORRIDOR COMMISSION

*“Communities Working Together to Protect Our Rivers”*

The Saco River Corridor Commission (SRCC) was created with one purpose in mind – to protect the major waterways of the Saco Basin and all that these rivers represent to the people who live and work here. The Maine State Legislature provided the performance standards to initiate our program in 1973, and the current cleanliness and scenic value of the river is a testament to that effort. The Commission's role is one of partnership with our communities, and our standards apply to the first 500 or up to 1,000 feet of land around the Saco, Ossipee, and Little Ossipee, as well as the waters themselves (together called “the Corridor”). All twenty towns with lands in the Corridor can appoint one regular and one alternate Commissioner, and we are grateful to have Jonathan Gardner serving as a member from Waterboro at this time. Representation from Waterboro means that your community is weighing in on development patterns and specific development projects throughout the Corridor, from Fryeburg to Saco and south to Acton/Shapleigh. Together, representatives from our 20 municipalities help to keep the water clean and preserve natural resources, ultimately protecting public health and quality of life in our region. [Clean water is one of Maine's greatest assets](#), and our volunteer Commissioners work hard to ensure the Saco and its major tributaries are protected from unsustainable or incompatible uses.

Development in Maine continues at a rapid pace. As areas are built up or used for resource extraction, degradation can occur in the shoreland area, along with water quality problems. The SRCC has kept up with the recent surge in development that started in 2020, and it continues to review each application for development near the rivers for its compliance with the Saco River Corridor Act. In 2024, the Commission carefully reviewed 110 applications for development within the Corridor, including sixteen from Waterboro.

In 2025, the SRCC will coordinate its 24<sup>th</sup> year of the Water Quality Monitoring Program. Staff and volunteers will monitor for dissolved oxygen, conductivity, pH, turbidity, temperature, alkalinity, phosphorous (total amounts and orthophosphates) nitrogen (total dissolved, NPOC, and nitrates/nitrites), and either *Escherichia coli* (*E. coli*) or *Enterococci*. Our testing takes place bi-weekly along the Saco, Ossipee, and Little Ossipee Rivers at 43 different locations from May through mid-September, with additional *E. coli* bacteria testing at certain recreational sites from June to September. Not all sites are tested for all parameters, but we add parameters where there are particular concerns or conditions.

To help communicate water quality testing results to the public, the map available on our website highlights loca-

tions with recently elevated bacteria levels. The site also provides links to the most updated *E. coli* test results. While our monitoring program is near its capacity for new sites, the SRCC is happy to discuss the possibility of expanding testing locations in future or adding parameters to existing sites. We are especially grateful to our volunteer water quality monitors, who make our current array of testing locations possible. We encourage those interested in volunteering to contact us ahead of the mid-April training dates each year, in hopes of expanding our monitoring capacity.

The SRCC's mission is to work with the communities of the Corridor to help keep the rivers clean and preserve quality of life in the Saco River Basin.
