Social District Permit Information



The city, township, or village where your business is located must have first designated a Social District before you may apply. Your licensed business must be contiguous to the commons area inside the Social District to qualify. Check with your local governmental unit to see if you qualify.

Local Governmental Approval Required Before You Apply

Your licensed business must also be approved individually by the city, township, or village before you apply for a Social District Permit. A local governmental unit approval form is attached to this application.

The governing body of a local governmental unit may designate a Social District within its jurisdiction that contains a commons area in which the patrons of qualified licensees may consume alcoholic liquor (beer, wine, mixed spirit drink, spirits, or mixed drinks/ cocktails) in the commons area.

At least two (2) qualified licensees must have their licensed premises contiguous to a commons area for the area to qualify to be part of a social district.

The local governmental unit must define and clearly mark the commons area with signs. The local governmental unit must establish a management plan, including the hours of operation, for the commons area. These plans must be submitted to the Commission.

A qualified licensee may apply the to Commission for a Social District Permit using the attached application. The licensee must first obtain approval from the governing body of the local governmental unit before applying for the permit.

A licensee that has been issued a Social District Permit may sell alcoholic liquor for on-premises consumption on its licensed premises only, but then customers may remove the alcoholic liquor from the premises to be consumed in the commons area. <u>A licensee must</u> not sell alcoholic liquor in the commons area.

The commons area is not considered part of any licensee's licensed premises. Nevertheless, a licensee that has been issued a Social District Permit must make every effort to ensure that it does not sell alcoholic liquor to a minor or intoxicated person.

Any alcoholic liquor sold to customers for consumption in the commons area by a licensee with a Social District Permit must comply with all of the following:

- The serving container must prominently display the licensee's trade name or logo or some other mark that is unique to the licensee that sold the alcohol.
- The serving container must prominently display a logo or some other mark that is unique to the commons area.
- The serving container is not made of glass.
- The serving container does not have a liquid capacity over 16 ounces.

A customer that purchases alcoholic liquor to be consumed in a commons area must not transport that alcoholic liquor onto the licensed premises of another licensee contiguous to the commons area from which the customer did not purchase the alcoholic liquor. A licensee shall not allow alcoholic liquor purchased from another licensee to be brought onto its licensed premises.

A customer that purchases alcoholic liquor to be consumed in a commons area must not transport that alcoholic liquor outside of the commons area.

Qualified licensees for Social District Permits are:

- A retailer licensee that is licensed to sell alcoholic liquor for consumption on the premises, such as a Class C, Tavern, A-Hotel, B-Hotel, Club, G-1, or G-2. A Special License issued to a nonprofit organization is not a qualified licensee.
- A manufacturer with an On-Premises Tasting Room Permit.
- A manufacturer with an Off-Premises Tasting Room License or a Joint Off-Premises Tasting Room License. For Joint Off-Premises Tasting Room Licenses, all licensees that have licenses at that same location must be approved for and issued a Social District Permit.

Dear Mayor and Council,

I'm writing you today regarding our current leaf removal program and some suggestions to improve it or change it all together. The last few years have been difficult making our residents happy and picking up

the leaves. This year is no different, we had weather issues, events, worker shortages and communication problems. I'm suggesting some difficult changes. We had a Tree lighting, parade and a weather event which caused DPS to skip a section and move to the next section. This was not communicated to the residents which upset some people. We have a service and need to improve it, don't do it at all or change it all together.

- 1. We stop picking up the leaves with street sweepers and machines. We ask the residents to bag the leaves and put them into the street on trash day. Many cities do this now and it works great. I know the residents will not like this option and many people will not pick up their leaves or can't physically do it. Many do not blow the leaves into the street now and those same people will not bag them up. The Riverview landfill expansion did not pass, and we will pay the price. We will soon see ridiculous trash removal prices as we will soon be taking trash 20 minutes down the road to a new landfill. I bring up trash because our leaf removal program is paid by our solid waste account. As many of us know the milage didn't pass and with trash removal about to skyrocket we might have to make a tough decision.
- 2. We hire a contractor to team up with DPS to help pick up our leaves during this very short weather window. We are shorthanded and until we have a full work force, we need help. This could be paid for out of the general fund since we are short approximately 5 full time and 5 seasonal workers.

Our map is better this year but still difficult to read. We are getting better at communication but could still use some work. We should have been notified a section of the city was going to be skipped. This could've easily been communicated through the mayor's office and sent out via social media and to each councilperson. I understand the mayor is already working on this very topic.

Today I'm asking Mayor and Council to improve this service or change it all together. Option 1. residents bag the leaves or option 2. Contract seasonal help to assist DPS with leaf pick up. The communication issue is already improving. Please ask the DPS supervisor and our city administrators input on this issue. I'm requesting this communication be added to the next City Council meetings agenda. Thank you

ITEM: Charter Amendment - Operating Millage

PRESENTER: Todd A. Drysdale, City Administrator

INDIVIDUALS IN ATTENDANCE: N/A

BACKGROUND: The City's General Fund continues to project a revenue shortfall as a result of the sharp decrease in taxable value which occurred in 2008. Previously, in November of 2011, the City Council approved a ballot question asking to increase the operating millage by an additional 1.75 mills for a three (3) year-period, which was approved by the voters. In May of 2014, the City Council approved a ballot question asking to increase the operating millage by an additional 3.00 mills for a five (5) year period which essentially replaced the previous additional operating millage approved in 2011. In May of 2019, the City Council again approved a ballot question to maintain the supplemental operating millage of 3.0 mills for an additional five (5) year period. This additional operating millage was approved by the voters and is scheduled to expire at the end of the 2023 calendar year, which is tax revenue for the 2024 Fiscal Year. Recently, the City Council placed a permanent renewal of the supplemental operating millage on the November 8, 2022 ballot, where it failed to pass by a vote of 5,220 (no) compared to 5,120 (yes).

The City's taxable value continues to be 8% less than its peak in 2006. This loss of taxable value results in an annual reduction in tax revenue from the normal operating millage of \$732,000 compared to 2006 amounts. In addition to the loss of tax revenue from the historical operating millage authorized in the City Charter, most, if not all, of the annual expenditures of the General Fund (pension contributions, retiree healthcare, utilities, wages, fuel, capital equipment, etc) have increased dramatically since that time, totaling in excess of \$3 million.

As a result, the preliminary 5-Year Financial Forecast for the City's General Fund for the 2023FY budget indicates the following annual shortfall in revenue:

2023FY - (104,000) <- includes supplemental operating millage 2024FY - (120,000) <- includes supplemental operating millage 2025FY - (1,460,000) 2026FY - (1,634,000)

Attached is a draft resolution that would place the extension/renewal of the supplemental operating millage beyond the 2024FY (2023 calendar year) on the ballot for voter approval. The "renewal" of the 3.00 mills would reduce the estimated shortfall to the following:

2025FY - (158,000) 2026FY - (338,000)

It is clear that even if the City's taxable value returns to pre-2006 levels, the slow pace of the recovery coupled with the permanent increases in annual expenditures over the past sixteen (16) years have changed the supplemental operating millage from a stop-gap measure to a permanent necessity. As such, it is recommended that three (3) mills be submitted to the voters for permanent approval.

<u>STRATEGIC PLAN/GOALS</u>: To provide the finest services and quality of life. To be financially responsible.

<u>ACTION REQUESTED:</u> Concur with the recommendation and direct the Department of Legal Affairs to prepare the necessary ballot language to permanently increase the charter tax rate limitation for general operating purposes for City Council approval.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS & ACCOUNT NUMBER: The City will realize continue to collect approximately \$1,895,000 in tax revenue in the first year if the charter amendment is approved as opposed to letting the previously authorized supplemental operating millage expire.

IMPLEMENTATION PLAN: City Administrator to work with the Department of Legal Affairs to prepare the ballot language to be approved by the City Council which will then be forwarded to the State's Attorney General for approval prior to the deadline established by the County Clerk.

BACKGROUND: In 2011, the State passed PA 152 otherwise known as the Publicly Funded Health Insurance Contribution Act (PFHIC), which was amended in PA 269-273 of 2013 and PA 184 of 2014. These laws were designed to lessen the burden of employee healthcare costs on public employers. There are four (4) options available to each public entity:

1. Apply the Hard Cap (capped dollar amount each government employer may pay towards an employee's healthcare costs;

- 2. Adopt by majority vote the 80%/20% cost-sharing-model;
- 3. Opt out of the cost-sharing model as set forth in the law;
- 4. Elect not to follow the statute (non-compliance).

For the first eleven (11) years that this law has been in effect (2012-2021), the City has adopted the 80%/20% cost sharing model. Using this option for compliance requires an annual resolution from the elected body.

It is recommended that this cost-sharing model continues to be approved due to the significant cost savings derived by the City.

STRATEGIC PLAN/GOALS: To be financially responsible.

<u>ACTION REQUESTED:</u> Adopt a resolution affirming the continued application of the 80%/20% Cost Sharing Option allowed under PA 152 of 2011

<u>BUDGET IMPLICATIONS & ACCOUNT NUMBER</u>: The application of the 80%/20% cost sharing of medical and prescription drug costs provides approximately \$400,000 in savings to the City. The amount is already included in the current and future budgets.

Defined Contribution Plan

- 1. Effective Date: February 1, 1999/Revised , 2022
- 2. Participants:
 - A. Individuals who became employed with the City of Wyandotte between February 1, 1999 and February 1, 2020, in the Police Patrol bargaining unit who did not make a non-revocable election to participate in the City of Wyandotte Defined Benefit Retirement System II will become participants upon satisfying the eligibility requirements.
 - B. Individuals who became employed with the City of Wyandotte between February 1, 1999 and February 1, 2020, in the Police Command bargaining unit who did not make a non-revocable election to participate in the City of Wyandotte Defined Benefit Retirement System II will become participants upon satisfying the eligibility requirements.
 - C. Individuals who became employed with the City of Wyandotte after October 1, 1999 in a Non-Union position will become participants upon satisfying the eligibility requirements.
 - D. Individuals who became employed with the City of Wyandotte after March 31, 2000 in the AFSCME (DPS) bargaining unit will become participants upon satisfying the eligibility requirements.
 - E. Individuals who became employed with the City of Wyandotte after **October 1, 2000** in the **IAFF (Fire) bargaining unit** will become participants upon satisfying the eligibility requirements.
 - F. Individuals who became employed with the City of Wyandotte before October 1, 1999 in a Non-Union position will become participants upon making a non-revocable election to transfer their actuarially determined accrued liability from the City of Wyandotte Retirement System (Defined Benefit Plan) effective March 31, 2001.
 - G. Individuals who became employed with the City of Wyandotte before March 31, 2000 in the AFSCME (DPS) bargaining unit will become participants upon making a non-revocable election to transfer their actuarially determined accrued liability from the City of Wyandotte Retirement System (Defined Benefit Plan) effective March 31, 2001.

- H. Individuals who became employed with the City of Wyandotte after **July 1, 2001** in the **Police/Fire Dispatch bargaining unit** will become participants upon satisfying the eligibility requirements.
- I. Individuals who became employed with the City of Wyandotte before March 31, 2000 in the Police/Fire Dispatch bargaining unit will become participants upon making a non-revocable election to transfer their actuarially determined accrued liability from the City of Wyandotte Retirement System (Defined Benefit Plan) effective June 30, 2002.
- 3. Participant Accounts:

Participants will have their own individual Account which will be comprised of the required Participant contributions and earnings/losses thereon and the City's contributions and earnings/losses thereon. The employee and employer amounts will be accounted for separately within the Participant Account. For reference purposes, the Participant's contributions and earnings/losses thereon will be called the *Employee Contribution Account* and the City's contributions and earnings/losses thereon will be called the *Employee Contribution Account*.

- 4. Vesting:
 - A. Participants are always 100% vested in their <u>*Employee Contribution*</u> <u>Accounts</u>.
 - B. Participants become vested in their <u>Employer Contribution Accounts</u> after completion of five (5) years of service with the City. An employee receives credit for each year of continuous service with the City computed to the nearest one-twelfth of a year. Credit for a month of service is earned after working eighty (80) hours during a month (or one hundred hours and eight tenths of an hour (100.8) for fire department members).
 - C. Participants who die prior to retirement or other termination of City employment will be treated as fully vested in the <u>Employer Contribution</u> <u>Account</u> as of the date of death. "Retirement" or "retire" shall be based on the same eligibility criteria as a Voluntary Normal Retirement or Disability Retirement for Defined Benefit participants under the Wyandotte Retirement System Ordinance.
 - D. Participants whose employment with the City is terminated because of a total and permanent disability as defined in the Wyandotte Retirement System Ordinance, Section 2-224/§32.019, will be treated as fully vested in the *Employer Contribution Account* as of the date they satisfy the applicable requirements.

- 5. Participant Contributions:
 - A. Participants, except for members of the IAFF (Fire) bargaining unit, will contribute five percent (5%) of Base Wages by payroll deduction from each pay check received while participating in the Plan. Participants who are members of the IAFF (Fire) bargaining unit will contribute six percent (6%) of Base Wages by payroll deduction from each pay check received while participating in the Plan.
 - B. Participant contributions will be made on a pre-tax basis where allowable under the law.
- 6. Employer Contributions:
 - A. The City will contribute ten percent (10%) of Base Wages received by Participants who are not members of the IAFF (Fire) bargaining unit while participating in the Plan. The City will contribute twelve percent (12%) of Base Wages received by Participants who are members of the IAFF (Fire) bargaining unit.
 - B. The City's contribution will be paid on each payroll date for all eligible participants.
 - C. The City's obligation under the Plan will be limited to payment of all required City contributions.
- 7. Base Wages:

All contribution amounts (both Participant and City contributions) are based upon the applicable percentage of Base Wages. Base Wages are defined as basic earnings for service actually rendered excluding overtime, uniform allowance, longevity, holiday premium pay (police and fire), gun allowance, food allowance, distribution of accumulated sick and vacation time, compensatory time and disability benefits or any other fringe benefits. Worker's Compensation benefits will not constitute Base Wages; however, for purposes of this Plan only, pay received directly from the City which is in addition to Worker's Compensation benefits being paid will be considered Base Wages as if it were earnings for service actually rendered.

- 8. Investment of Accounts:
 - A. The Plan will offer a number of different investment options. Participants may specify how they wish their Accounts to be invested among the various available investment options.

- B. Participants may periodically change their investment allocations with respect to future contributions and/or current Account balances.
- C. Participants will have daily toll-free access to investment information. Accounts will be valued and updated daily.
- D. Participants will receive a printed, updated Statement of Account on a quarterly basis.
- 9. Distributions:
 - A. Distributions will be made available upon the occurrence of a qualifying event. A qualifying event is a termination of City employment (including termination due to total and permanent disability) or death. No distributions will be made prior to a qualifying event.
 - B. Distributions from the Plan will be in a form legally authorized and available from our plan provider.
 - C. Distributions will be made as soon as practical after a qualifying event and after receipt of an appropriate application for distribution and any other administrative forms or documentation required. *Participants who retire or terminate employment should submit an application for distribution of vested Account at least ninety (90) calendar days before they would like to receive distribution (see Section 4C for definition of "retire"). All applications for distributions require time for consideration and processing.*
- 10. Disability Provisions Backstopping:
 - A. The City will provide a disability benefit in accordance with the disability formula stated in the City of Wyandotte Retirement Ordinance, Section 2-225/§32.019.
 - B. When an employee is disabled or dies, the City will calculate the cost of funding an annuity, minus the assets in the Participant's Contribution Account.
 - C. At the time of the disability claim, the City's actuary will calculate the annuity purchase power of the assets in the Participant's Contribution Account. If the annuity purchase power exceeds the benefit provided under the Defined Benefit Plan, the participant gets the greater benefit. If the annuity purchase falls short of the benefits provided under the Defined Benefit Plan, the City is responsible for funding the difference.
 - D. The Participant is under no obligation to purchase an annuity or assign any

of their Defined Contribution Plan assets to the City. The aforementioned calculation is used to determine the City's obligation only.

- E. When calculating the annuity purchase power of the Participant's Account, the City must be able to produce an actual annuity at that price.
- 11. Retiree Health Insurance Provisions
 - A. Subject to sub-section C, the City will provide a health insurance benefit to participants who have achieved a minimum of ten (10) years of service with the city. The level of this benefit is determined by various eligibility criteria.
 - B. The participant and his/her spouse are eligible to begin receiving these benefits at the age of fifty-five (55) with ten (10) years of service or at any age after twenty-five (25) years of service.
 - C. The coverage will be changed to Blue Cross/Blue Shield Medicare Plus Blue Group PPO at the age of sixty-five (65) consistent with the established practice in place for members of the defined benefit plan and outlined in the collective bargaining agreement (if applicable) or the Non-Union Personnel Policy Handbook.
 - D. Employees who are members of the City's Retiree Health Savings (RHS) Plan are not eligible for retiree health insurance benefits provided by the City.
 - E. Participants should consult their collective bargaining agreement (if applicable) or the Non-Union Personnel Policy Handbook for additional information regarding this benefit.
- 12. Retiree Life Insurance Provisions
 - A. The City will provide a life insurance benefit to participants who have achieved a minimum of ten (10) years of service with the City.
 - B. The participant and his/her spouse are eligible to begin receiving these benefits at the age of fifty-five (55) with ten (10) years of service or at any age after twenty-five (25) years of service.
 - C. Participants should consult their collective bargaining agreement (if applicable) or the Non-Union Personnel Policy Handbook for additional information regarding this benefit.

- 13. Sick Time Payout
 - A. Participants will be eligible for payout of accumulated sick time if they separate from service through retirement or death (See Section 4C for definition of "retire").
 - B. Participants should consult their collective bargaining agreement (if applicable) or the Non-Union Personnel Policy Handbook for additional information regarding this provision.
- 14. Mobility within City Departments

Participants who move between the divisions of the City of Wyandotte Retirement Systems, including the Defined Benefit Plan and Defined Contribution Plan, are subject to the provisions in force for that division. The portion of retirement benefits earned in each division of the system shall not become payable prior to a qualifying event (as defined above) by the Participant. For any eligible benefits derived from the Defined Benefit Plan, all requirements outlined in the City of Wyandotte Retirement Ordinance must also be met. Credited service earned as a member of any division of the Retirement System may be used for calculating vesting requirements.

ITEM: Purchase of Flock Safety cameras

INDIVIDUALS IN ATTENDANCE: N/A

BACKGROUND: The Flock Safety camera system is a powerful investigative tool that will allow our agency to prevent and solve serious crimes. Flock Safety cameras are solar-powered license plate readers. This camera system instantly alerts officers when it detects wanted vehicles. Additionally, it provides a searchable database that will allow us to capture vehicles fleeing from crimes by attributes such as color, make, type, and unique characteristics (bumper stickers, racks, spoilers, etc.).

The purchase price for the first year will be \$22,800.00 and the annual recurring cost is \$20,000.00. The total 2-year contract will cost a total of \$42,800.00.

We are requesting a waiver of the competitive bidding process for the purchase of (8) Flock Safety cameras for the following reasons:

- FLOCK and Axon, our body and car cameras, are the only digital evidence management systems which fully integrate.
- FLOCK offers the unique ability of "Vehicle Fingerprint Technology" by way of proprietary patent. This capability will permit our agency to identify vehicles based on attributes such as color, type, make, and objects (bumper stickers, roof racks, etc.).
- FLOCK is a sole source provider of this technology. FLOCK's network expands over 25 Metro Detroit agencies which include Ecorse, River Rouge, Lincoln Park, Allen Park, Taylor, Dearborn, Dearborn Heights, and Detroit. Therefore, we all can share information collected by the system. FLOCK is the only provider who offers this unique "Sharing" ability in our geographical area.

This purchase was approved by the police & fire commission on November 22, 2022.

BACKGROUND: Landis+Gyr is the sole source contracted provider of advanced metering infrastructure (AMI) transponders for the Water Department and AMI metering for the Electric Department. The water department has been presented with the opportunity to purchase 1,200 surplus Landis+Gyr transponders from the City of Holland (MI) Board of Public Works (BPW) at a discounted rate of \$90/unit (\$108/unit regular cost) due to network issues encountered by BPW and not being able to return the transponders, for a total of \$108,000; an overall savings of \$21,600. Due to supply chain issues the next regular order WMS shipment of transponders is not scheduled to arrive until the spring of 2023, so these units will provide enough inventory to continue installation until that shipment arrives. AMI transponders allow the water department to read water meters remotely without the need for manual or drive-by meter reads and results in labor savings for the department.

STRATEGIC PLAN/GOALS: Improving water infrastructure

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PLAN

OVERVIEW

The City of Wyandotte's Capital Improvements Plan (CIP) outlines a schedule of public service expenditures over the ensuing six-year period (Fiscal Years 2023-2028). The CIP does not address all of the capital expenditures for the city, but for large, physical improvements that are permanent in nature, including basic facilities, services and installations needed for the functioning of the community. These include transportation systems, utilities, infrastructure, municipal facilities and other miscellaneous projects.

To qualify for inclusion in the CIP, a project must:

- 1. Constitute permanent, physical or system improvements greater than or equal to \$50,000.00;
- 2. A program of projects whose total is \$50,000.00 (playgrounds, neighborhood parks);
- 3. Significant equipment purchases in excess of \$50,000.00 with a useful life of at least ten years;
- 4. A study of at least \$50,000.00 that will lead to such projects

Projects which are considered operational or routine maintenance are excluded from the CIP.

What are Capital Improvement Projects?

Capital improvement projects are major and infrequent expenditures, such as the construction of a new facility, a major rehabilitation or repair of an existing facility, or the purchase of major equipment. Capital improvement projects are non-recurring expenditures that tend to be large both in physical size and in cost, and have a long-term usefulness (10 years or more).

Examples of capital improvement projects can include:

- Renovation/construction of new city hall
- Construction of a new fire station
- Extension of a water/sewer line
- Purchase of a new fire truck

- Major rehabilitation of a city-owned building
- Creation of a new city park

Examples of expenditures which would not usually constitute a capital improvement project include:

- Purchase of new office furniture or computers
- Purchase of small equipment (lawn mowers, copiers, individual computers, etc.)
- Recurring maintenance of existing facilities
- Minor repairs of existing buildings and equipment
- Minor improvements to existing buildings (carpet, painting, etc.)


What are the benefits of preparing a CIP?

The CIP is more than just a state requirement; it is an essential planning tool in addition to a statement of budgetary policy. It informs the taxpayers of Wyandotte how the city plans to prioritize, schedule, and coordinate capital improvement projects over the next six years. The benefits of creating and annually updating the CIP include:

- Prudent use of taxpayer dollars
- Focusing the city expenditures on the needs of the community
- Prioritizing projects across the needs of the community
- Generating community support by inviting public input
- Promoting economic development
- Improving the city's eligibility for State and Federal grants
- Providing an implementation tool for the goals and objectives of the City's Master Plan
- Transparency in identification of high-priority projects
- Coordination/cost-sharing between projects

Preparation of the Capital Improvements Plan is done under the authority of the Municipal Planning Commission Act (Act 33 of the Public Acts of 2008). It is the City of Wyandotte's goal that the CIP be used as a tool to implement the City Master Plan and assist in the City's financial planning. The Capital Improvements Plan proposes project funding relative to the anticipated availability of fiscal resources and the choice of specific improvements to be achieved throughout a six-year period. The first two years of the Capital Improvements Plan serve as the basis for establishing the City's Capital Projects Budget (CPB), programming the implementation of the planned projects for the upcoming two fiscal years. The CIP and CPB make up the City's Capital Improvements Program. A total of 55 projects are included in the 2023 CIP with one-year funding of \$12,239,300.00 and six-year funding need for fiscal year FY2023 - FY2028 of \$132,340,120.00.

FUNDING ISSUES AND SOURCES

As is often the case with governmental agencies, the total funding need identified in the CIP exceeds the available funding. There are projects contained in this CIP that do not have an established, secure source of funding at this time. Projects in the first two years of the CIP form the basis for the City's Capital Budget and generally require secure funding. That funding may include specific limited General Fund requests. Some higher priority unfunded projects (generally anticipated to be funded via grants or outside funding) are included in years 1 or 2 of the plan in the event funding is obtained and the projects can then be implemented.

GENERAL FUNDED VS. ALTERNATIVELY FUNDED PROJECTS

Of the \$132,340,120.00 needed to fund all of the FY2023–2028 CIP program, monies for particular projects may come in part or in whole from discretionary fund sources outside the City's General Fund. Such dollars are included in totals shown because they fund improvements to assets which belong to the City, will become so upon project completion, or are part of an intergovernmental or interagency project in which the City is a participant. Discretionary funds are defined here as those which require specific application to obtain or which come from other non-City sources at the discretion of others. Certain projects may receive funding from non-city sources which the City receives by formula and so are not considered discretionary. Project funding sources are identified in the Master CIP spreadsheet.

PRIORITIZATION OF PROJECTS

The initial task for the City of Wyandotte Department Heads is to generate a list of identified capital needs (identification of projects). The next, and most critical process component, is rating the relative merits of each project (prioritization). This crucial step, while constrained by the amount of funding anticipated to be available for capital projects and timing of availability of funds when more than one asset category is involved in a project, nonetheless provides invaluable information in the CIP plan decision-making process. Shrinking funds and rising costs incurred in maintaining and rehabilitating deteriorating infrastructure make the process of selecting the most vital capital projects even more crucial and difficult. The merits of each identified capital need must be judged against the policies and criteria of the CIP process and the goals of each component of the master plan, as well as against the other competing needs in that particular asset category. Prioritization of CIP projects is identified in the Master CIP spreadsheet.

COMMUNITY INPUT AND INFORMATION SHARING

As the City's focus on community engagement efforts identified in the Public Participation Plan, many new capital improvement projects are being generated from such interactions. The City of Wyandotte engages in infrastructure related planning and evaluative studies that have involved citizen advisory groups and/or community-wide engagement efforts. The results of such studies have begun to generate capital improvement projects which were heavily driven by such citizen input. Resident requests on specific topics have also initiated a number of capital improvement projects.

ITEM: Memorial Park Improvements: Michigan DNR Spark Grant Application

PRESENTER: Joe Gruber, DDA Director

INDIVIDUALS IN ATTENDANCE: Sheryl Riley, Superintdenent of Recreation

BACKGROUND: The Department of Recreation, Leisure and Culture has identified the need for extensive improvements to be conducted at Memorial Park, Wyandotte's largest and most substantial park and recreational space. The Michigan DNR has created the Michigan Spark Grant, which will support projects that provide safe, accessible, public recreation facilities and spaces to improve people's health, introduce new recreation experiences, build on existing park infrastructure and make it easier for people to enjoy the outdoors. Grants are available up to \$1,000,000 for park improvement projects and require a Certified Resolution from the City Council authorizing the application.

STRATEGIC PLAN/GOALS: Both the 2019-2023 Recreation Master Plan and 2022-2027 Recreation Capital Improvements Plan cite extensive improvements for Memorial Park which are outlined in this grant application.

<u>ACTION REQUESTED:</u> Requesting the City Council to approve the Grant Application and Authorize Mayor, Clerk and the Superintendant of Recreation to submit the DNR Spark Grant Application.

<u>BUDGET IMPLICATIONS & ACCOUNT NUMBER</u>: Total Project Budget estimated to be \$1,095,000, which shall consist of \$1,000,000 funds from the DNR Spark Grant and \$95,000 from the City of Wyandotte.

WHAT FEATURES CURRENTLY EXIST AT THE PARK?

Memorial Park is a 53-acre mixed-use, educational and recreational campus in the City of Wyandotte that offers vast stretches of publicly accessible parks and green space. The City of Wyandotte is the largest owner onsite (31 acres) followed by Wyandotte Public Schools ("WPS", 15 acres) and the private non-profit corporation, Paragon Support Systems ("The Arc", 7 acres).

Wyandotte's 30-acre Memorial Park is comprised of three ball fields: softball & baseball diamonds, and "dust bowl" field; three soccer fields; basketball court; skate park; disc golf course; playscape; picnic pavilion; concessions stand; two restroom facilities. There are approximately 1.3 miles worth of paved walking paths throughout the Park connecting all of the park's amenities.

The WPS property located on the eastern portion of the Memorial Park campus is the former Lincoln Jr. High School (build in 1955) and now houses two co-located centers: the Madison School and the Jo Brighton Skills Center. The Madison School services students ages 3 to 26 who are Severely Multiply Impaired, while the Jo Brighton Skills Center services students ages 18 to 26 who are Moderately Impaired. Jo Brighton is known for their Bakery with it's walk up window open to the public. WPS also owns several soccer fields and adaptive playscapes onsite.

The Arc is located in the former Madison School, on the north side of Memorial and offer a plethora of programs, assistance and resources to families living with disabilities.

WHAT DO YOU WANT TO DO?

The current physical state of The current physical state of Memorial Park is very challenged. The park's features and amenities are many decades old, and while the City has managed to successfully deliver spotted improvements over the years to help maintain safe, regular programming for its diverse group of users, the park remains to be in desperate need of major enhancement and renovations, especially as the diversity and volume of users continues to increase in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Park is located on Pennsylvania Road, in the southwest corner of the Wyandotte, bordering the City of Southgate to the east and City of Riverview to the north. The Park is surrounded by dense neighborhoods predominantly comprised of single-family homes, and it's convenient location provides regional access to a broad group of users including many Downriver-area schools.

The overall goals for the Memorial Park Project are to improve, redevelop and renovate the existing public outdoor recreation facilities in this strategically vital regional park; to deliver new and improved recreational facilities and equipment; to provide high-quality recreational activities along with safe and enjoyable physical fitness experiences; to enhance connections with the park's surrounding neighborhoods, commercial corridors and regional trail systems; and to deliver a comprehensive set of improvements that will be programmed, operated, and maintained for decades to come.

This transformative project will help re-establish Memorial Park as a premier location for regional baseball, softball, soccer and overall activity. The improvements will help alleviate significant challenges brought by Michigan's harsh winters and unpredictably cold and wet springs, with better drainage, better lighting, and more dignified playing fields. The improvements will also improve the seamless connections to and through the Memorial Park's amenities and facilities, thus improving safety and accessibility for people of all abilities.

The improvements will benefit the Wyandotte's households, which are statistically older, aging, cardependent and disproportionately suffering from obesity, diabetes, heart disease and asthma. These figures have been compiled through reports generated by Wayne County Health Department, the State of Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, and privately conducted Community Health Needs Assessments (Henry Ford Health) which further compile a multitude of health and wellness data.

The improvements will also directly benefit the School District of Wyandotte and school districts throughout Southeast Michigan who regularly utilize Memorial Park for a gamut of sporting events and recreational activities. In particular, the project will benefit a diverse group of highly active children and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities who are collocated at the public and private institutions within the Memorial Park campus.

This project will be made possible through a joint partnership between the City of Wyandotte, the Wyandotte Board of Education / Wyandotte Public Schools, the County of Wayne, and the State of Michigan's Department of Natural Resources, all of whom have been allocated funding through the United States Federal Government's COVID-19 stimulus funding, the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

All of the below improvements will be conducted on City-owned and City-maintained property. The improvements are anticipated to cost approximately \$1,095,000 and will create safe, accessible, public recreational facilities that will improve people's health while building on existing infrastructure and making it easier for a diverse group of people to access and enjoy the outdoors.

- New softball and baseball infield turf = \$800,000
- Install new solar powered lighting around the entire 1.3 mile track = \$215,000
- Soft Costs = \$80,000

HOW WAS THE COMMUNITY NEGATIVELY IMPACTED BY COVID? HOW DOES THIS PROJECT ADDRESS THAT?

The City of Wyandotte was deeply affected by COVID-19. Families and residents were completely restricted from schools, camps, sporting activities, and countless extracurricular activities. Huge groups of people, namely seniors and children, were left without any social interactions, recreational activities and many other creative outlets. The students and clients at Jo Brighton, Madison and The Arc were left without the critical services they needed. The business community also deeply suffered, with mandated closures and significant restrictions on operations had a compounding effect on Wyandotte's neighborhoods and working families.

In the wake of the COVID pandemic, and as things slowly got back to normal, Memorial Park experienced a swift return of regular users and a strong resurgence of new users with a new found appreciation for the great outdoors. This rapid increase to usage and participation at Memorial Park had an exacerbating effect on the deteriorating equipment, dilapidated facilities and distressed amenities throughout the Park.

This park improvement project will deliver much needed reconstruction and rehabilitation to the most heavily utilized features at the park, while also creating new experiences and encouraging more users to utilize the park facilities. This park improvement project will help address the negative compounded impacts of COVID while providing more access to public green space and parks, and strengthening the community's connection to place.

HOW WILL THIS PROJECT CONTRIBUTE TO STRONG HEALTHY COMMUNITIES THAT PROMOTE HEALTH AND SAFETY?

This project will contribute to strong and healthy communities across the region due to the high quality and meaningful improvements that are completed. The activities outlined in this application and intended for this project will deliver very high quality features and improvements that will create a world class recreational experience, thus attracting a larger volume of diverse users to this regionally significant park and fostering more physical fitness programs and recreational activities on a very broad scale. With top notch facilities, Memorial Park will be cemented as one of the most prominent facilities for a wide variety of activities, which will have positive health outcomes for our community and our neighbors.

The improvements outlined in this application will directly enhance safety and will promote overall health, and accessibility for a diverse group of users. User safety will be improved when old equipment is replaced and deteriorating facilities are renovated, thus preventing accidents and injuries. A comprehensive lighting installation throughout the site will enhance seasonal activity with early mornings and later evenings now becoming a more viable time to recreate. The lighting installations will also prevent crime, property destruction, and other offenses.

WHAT KIND OF STAKEHOLDER AND COMMUNITY INPUT DID YOU HAVE?

The City of Wyandotte is deeply engaged with Wyandotte Public Schools on a number of different projects and programs. The Recreation Department is closely aligned with various athletic departments and sporting programs throughout the region that utilize Memorial Park for school programming. The City and Schools are both mutually attune to the challenges, opportunities, complaints and desires cited by the various coaches, educators, community residents and Park patrons. Almost all of the improvements outlined in this project are a direct response to a long list of challenges and complaints from the diverse users of this park, now compiled into the park improvement project.

IS THIS PROJECT PART OF A COMMUNITY RECREATION OR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN?

Memorial Park is cited to be the most substantial city park in the 2019-2023 Wyandotte Recreation Master Plan. The improvements to Memorial Park outlined in this project are also included in the 2019-2023 Wyandotte Recreation Master Plan including more exercise equipment, more lighting improvements to the skate park and turfing the baseball and softball fields. The 2022-2027 City of Wyandotte Capital Improvement Plan also includes many of these same improvements.

2c. WHAT PROGRAMS AND PARTNERSHIPS CURRENTLY EXIST THAT BRING PEOPLE TO YOUR PROJECT AND ACTIVATE THE SPACE?

Memorial Park is heavily used by the Wyandotte Public School, including the Special Education Programs, and surrounding School districts throughout Downriver and Southeast Michigan for athletic and educational programs for a variety of sporting activities, practices and organized events, including baseball and softball tournaments, cross country meets (Jamborees), disc golf tournaments and soccer tournaments. However, the lack of improvements and the poor physical condition of many of the facilities has resulted in a decline in the volume of organized programs that occur at the park.

PROVIDE YOUR TARGETED DATES FOR THE FOLLOWING PROJECT MILESTONES.

5/31/23 - Public Input is ongoing and shall continue throughout the Design Phase

5/31/2023 - The Design Phase shall be substantially completed between January and May

9/30/2023 - Once comprehensive designs and engineering are completed, the bidding will continue throughout the Summer until the end of the Fiscal Year, September 30th, 2023

10/1/2025 - Once bidding is completed and construction contracts can be awarded, we would conservatively allot two years for all improvements and construction to be completed, and no later than October 1st, 2025.

3/1/2026 - It is presumable that some improvements could be completed within the first year, allowing for a rolling schedule of programming and activations to start in conjunction with the corresponding improvements that are completed. All programming and activations would resume no later than break of winter, beginning of Spring 2026.

5B. WHAT SPECIFIC FEATURES MAKE YOUR PROJECT UNIQUE AND CAN CLEARLY SHOW THAT INPUT FROM THE ABOVE GROUPS HAS BEEN INCORPORATED?

BASED UPON THE EXISTING MECHANISMS AND RESOURCES, HOW LONG COULD YOU MAINTAIN THIS INVESTMENT?

In general, the City of Wyandotte is committed to maintaining this investment in perpetuity.

The useful life of AstroTurf, the most significant singular investment, is anticipated to last for approximately 15 years before it requires repairs. Repair funds will be budgeted by the City of Wyandotte and Recreation Department in the ongoing five-year Recreation Master Plans and regularly updated Annual Capital Improvements Plans. The useful life of the new lighting facilities is estimated to be between 20-30 years. These will require replacement and repairs, which may be handled by Wyandotte Municipal Services.

DESCRIBE THE SELECTION OF MATERIALS, THE WAY THE PROJECT IS DESIGNED, AND OTHER FEATURES THAT MAKE IT SUSTAINABLE

The improvements outlined in this program have a very strong environmental and economic sustainability focus. Incorporating solar powered lighting along the walking trail will have multifaceted benefits for the local environment and the City's municipal services department. Conducting these improvements will hopefully expand the dates and times the park can be used, broadening the number of users, helping to generate more revenue for the City through leasing or renting the facilities (travel teams, leagues, events, etc.) which in turn would increase the financial resources required to maintain the park.

WHAT DESIGN FEATURES OR CONSIDERATIONS IN YOUR PROJECT REDUCES LONG TERM MAINTENANCE?

Incorporating AstroTurf will limit the amount of regular maintenance and long-term maintenance associated with mowing, planting, watering grass fields. Most of the improvements to the Park's amenities and features aim to stem deterioration through effective renovation and rehabilitation, as opposed to replacement which would likely be necessary for many features throughout the park if improvements are deterred longer.

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
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and agreements of said contract in accordance with the plans, specifications and terms thereof during the original term thereof, and any extensions thereof which may be granted by the Owner, with or without notice to the Surety, and if he shall satisfy all claims and demands incurred under such contract, and shall fully indemnify and save harmless the Owner from all costs and damages which it may suffer by reason of failure to do so, and shall reimburse and repay the Owner all outlay and expense which the Owner may incur in making good any default, then this obligation shall be void; otherwise to remain in full force and effect.

PROVIDED FURTHER, that the said Surety, for value received hereby stipulates and agrees that no change, extension of time, alteration or addition to the terms of the contract or to the work to be performed thereunder or the specifications accompanying the same shall in any wise affect its obligation on this bond, and it does hereby waive notice of any such change, extension of time, alteration or addition to the terms of the contract or to the work or to the specifications.

PROVIDED, FURTHER, that no final settlement between the Owner and the Contractor shall abridge the right of any beneficiary hereunder, whose claim may be unsatisfied.

1.01.02 Definitions

<u>Contract and Included Documents</u>: The written agreement covering performance of the work, as provided in the specifications. The Contract shall include the proposal performance bond, payment bond, all general conditions or special provisions pertaining to the work or materials therefore, all supplemental agreements entered into, all general and detail plans, and shall be in force until the work is completed or the Contract terminated, it being mutually understood and agreed that when taken together the plans and specifications shall be cooperative and shall describe and provide for a complete piece of work. In the event that any provision to this agreement is deemed invalid, the remainder of this agreement shall not be affected thereby.

<u>City:</u> The Downtown Development Authority of the City of Wyandotte, Michigan, or its authorized representatives as the party of the first part of this contract.

<u>Contractor</u>: The individual, partnership, or corporation or a combination of any or all jointly, undertaking the execution of the work under the terms of the contract and acting directly or through agents or employees, as the party of the second part of this contract.

Engineer: The City Engineer of the City of Wyandotte, Michigan.

1.01.02 Definitions Con't

<u>Inspector:</u> A designated representative of the Engineer assigned to make any or all necessary inspections of the work performed and materials furnished by the Contractor.

<u>Plans:</u> Approved drawings or reproductions of drawings pertaining to the construction or details of the work included in the contract and forming a part thereof.

<u>Special Provisions</u>: The specific clauses setting forth conditions or requirements peculiar to the project under consideration, covering work and materials involved in the proposal. An addendum is a special provision.

<u>Specifications</u>: The General Conditions, Special Provisions, and all written or printed instructions pertaining to the method and manner of performing the work, or to the quantities, or the qualities of the materials to be furnished under the contract.

<u>Subcontract:</u> An agreement between the Contractor and any party or parties to execute a part of the contract work.

<u>Subcontractor</u>: The individual, partnership, or corporation who, by terms of an agreement with the Contractor, undertakes the execution of any part of the work.

<u>Work:</u> The term "work" shall mean all labor, materials, equipment, transportation, or other facilities necessary to be performed or furnished, by or on the part of the Contractor, to complete the contract.

<u>Working Day:</u> Any day when, as determined by the Engineer, it is possible for the Contractor to effectively carry out work on the controlling operation.

<u>Wyandotte Based Business</u>: A business that has its offices or business, or substantial portion of its equipment physically located in the City of Wyandotte and which pays real property taxes and/or personal property taxes in the City of Wyandotte.

SECTION 1.02 PROPOSAL REQUIREMENTS AND CONDITIONS

1.02.01 Preparation of Proposal

The proposal shall be legibly prepared, with ink, printed or typewritten, on the form provided by the City. All blank spaces in the proposal forms must be correctly filled in where indicated for each and every item for wDELETE WHOLE SECTION 1.02

The proposals received w renderings of proposed sit _______ he lump sum amounts bid, and the products of the quantities of items listed at the unit prices bid. In case of discrepancy between the total shown in the proposal and the unit prices, the unit prices as stated in the proposal shall govern; and any errors found in said products, and in the addition, will be corrected.

The proposal must be properly signed in ink and the address of the Bidder given.

1.02.02 Estimated Quantities

The quantities of the various classes of work to be done and materials to be furnished under this contract, which have been estimated as stated elsewhere herein, are approximate and only for the purpose of comparing, on a uniform basis, the bids offered for the work under this contract, and neither the party of the first part, or its agents, is to be held responsible should any of the said estimated quantities be found incorrect during the construction of the work, and the Contractor shall make no claim for anticipated profit, nor for loss of profit because of a difference between the quantities of the various classes or work actually done or materials delivered, and the estimated quantities as herein stated.

1.02.03 Examination of Plans, Specifications and Site of Work

Bidders shall carefully examine the proposal forms, plans and specifications and shall inspect the site of the proposed work in order to satisfy themselves, by examination, as to all local conditions affecting the contract and as to the detailed construction requirements. The submission of a bid shall be considered prima facie evidence that the Bidder has made such examination and is satisfied as to the conditions to be encountered in performing the work and as to the requirements of the plans, specifications, general conditions, special conditions, and contract.

Where data respecting existing conditions is provided or mentioned in the Contract Documents, such data is provided for the convenience of the Bidder and not as a guarantee of conditions. The Bidder shall satisfy himself as to the sufficiency and correctness of such data, and shall make all investigations necessary so that his bid shall be based upon his/her own knowledge and estimation of conditions to be met.

1.02.03 Examination of Plans, Specifications and Site of Work Con't

The location of all public or private utilities as shown on the plans is taken from the best available data. The City of WDELETED FROM CONTRACT any omissions or for variations from the locations shown. The Contractor shall contact all utility owners regarding the location

of their facilities, including service connections, prior to starting the work. Utility service connections are not shown on the plans and are not the responsibility of the City.

Any damage to utilities caused by the Contractors operations shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor.

The Contractor shall make and responsibility with res under whatever conditions ons and shall assume all risk in whatever manner and tra cost to the Owner.

1.02.04 Laws and Regulations

The Contractor shall keep himself duly informed of all laws and municipal ordinances and regulations in any manner affecting those engaged or employed in the work, or the materials used in the work, and all orders and decrees of bodies or tribunals having any jurisdiction or authority over the same. He shall at all times himself observe and comply with all such existing and future laws, ordinances, regulations, orders and decrees, and shall protect and indemnify the party of the first part and its officers and agents against any claim or liability arising from or based on the violations of any such law, ordinance, regulation, order or decree, whether by himself or his employee.

1.02.05 Rejection of Proposals

Proposals may be rejected if they show any alterations (except as provided for in Section 1.02.01), additions or conditions not called for, conditional or alternate bids unless called for, or incomplete bids. Proposals in which the unit prices are obviously unbalanced may also be rejected.

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SECTION 1.03 AWARD AND EXECUTION OF THE CONTRACT

1.03.01 Consideration of Proposals

The City reserves the right to reject any and all bids, the right to waive any formal defect or technicality in any proposal, and any determination of the lowest responsible bidder is based solely upon the City's exercise of its discretion when it is deemed to be for the best interests of the City.

The opening and reading of the proposal shall not be construed as an acceptance of the Bidder as a responsible Bidder. The City reserves the right to determine the responsibility of the Bidder from its knowledge of the Bidders qualifications or from other sources.

1.03.01a Equalization Factor

Any Wyandotte based firm shall be deemed a better bid than the bid of any competing firm which is not Wyandotte based, whenever the bid of such competing firm shall be equal to or higher than the bid of the Wyandotte based firm after the appropriate equalization percentage credit has been applied to the bid of the Wyandotte based firm. The equalization percentage credit shall be that percentage or credit which the competing firm has applied for similar or equivalent bids in the city where such competing firm is located. If the competing firm has no equalization percentage credit applied to bids in the city they are located, then <u>no</u> credit shall be applied to the Wyandotte based bid.

1.03.01b Determining the Lowest Responsible Bidder

When sealed bids are received by the City for purchases, supplies and construction contracts, the following shall apply:

(a) The person or business submitting the lowest responsible bid shall be deemed the lowest bidder. If, however, the lowest bidder is not a Wyandotte-based business, any Wyandotte-based business with a bid within a specified percentage (two (2%) percent) of the lowest bid that has been deemed responsive and responsible by the City may be deemed the lowest bidder if it agrees to reduce its bid to match the bid of the lowest bidder within five (5) days of request by the City. (Except for bids under Paragraph 89 of Charter)

(b) If a Wyandotte-based business refuses to reduce its bid to match the lowest bid, then the next lowest responsible Wyandotte-based business with a bid within the established percentage of the lowest bid shall be given the opportunity to reduce its bid to match the bid of the lowest bidder. If the Wyandotte-based bidder agrees to reduce its bid to match the bid of the lowest non-Wyandotte bidder, it may be deemed the lowest bidder and awarded the contract.

(c) If no responsive and responsible Wyandotte-based business within the established percentage of the lowest bid agrees to reduce its bid to that of the lowest bidder, then the contract shall be awarded to the person or business with the lowest responsible bid.

(d) Except for construction contracts, no contract awarded pursuant to this Section shall be sublet in any manner that permits any of the contracts to be performed by a subcontractor or subcontractors who do not meet the definition of Wyandotte-based.

1.03.01b Determining the Lowest Responsible Bidder Con't

(e) Before any Wyandotte-based business is awarded a contract pursuant to this Section, it shall agree to make available to the City all records necessary to establish its eligibility and compliance with all City, State and local laws, including verification that said business is current in payment of all taxes and obligations due to the City and is in compliance with all Code requirements of the City and is not in violation of any City Ordinance, County ordinance and State law.

(g) This Section is designed to advance the best interest of the City of Wyandotte in its sole discretion and is not intended to provide any unsuccessful bidder with a basis for commencing litigation against the City to seek award of a contract by judicial action. The City of Wyandotte reserves the right to reject any and all bids and the right in its sole discretion to determine if a Wyandotte-based business is eligible to match the low bid.

(h) The BEST VALUE PERFORMANCE CRITERIA for awarding bids shall be as follows:

- 1. Previous work performance;
- 2. Reliability, skill, qualifications and integrity of bidder;
- 3. Bid price;
- 4. Cleanliness;
- 5. Sufficiency of equipment, fitness and responsibility or capacity to perform the work or furnish the supplies at the bid price;
- 6. Insurance and licenses when required by law in a form and amount satisfactory to the City;
- 7. References and experience of the bidder;
- 8. Good communication and compliance with bid requirements set forth in the specifications;
- 9. Wyandotte-Based Business;
- 10. Any other criteria of the City, in its sole discretion, feels is necessary for the particular bid.

1.03.02 Competency of the Bidder

If requested by the City, the low Bidder, in order to determine whether he is a responsible Bidder, shall be required to furnish to the City the following information sworn to under oath by him or by a proper authorized representative of the Bidder.

- a. The address of the Bidders place of business.
- b. Articles of co-partnership or incorporation or license to do business under an assumed name.
- c. Itemized list of equipment available for use on the project.
- d. A list of supervisory personnel.
- e. A certified or authorized financial statement, dated within sixty days prior to the opening of bids. The City may require that any of such statements be further verified.
- f. A list of present contracts including dollar value, percentage of completion and Owners involved.
- g. A list of recent projects including dollar value and Owners involved.

1.03.02 Competency of the Bidder Con't

h. Such additional information as may be required that will satisfy the City that the Bidder is adequately prepared, in technical experience, or otherwise to fulfill the Contract. The Contractor shall provide the requested information to the City within fourteen days of receipt of such written request.

1.03.03 Disqualification of Bidders

Any one or more of the following causes may be considered sufficient for the disqualification of a bidder

and the rejection of his bid or bids:

- a. Evidence of collusion among Bidders.
- b. Lack of competency as revealed by either financial, experience, or plant equipment statements submitted.
- c. Lack of responsibility as shown by past work, judged from the standpoint of workmanship and progress.
- d. Uncompleted work under other contracts which, in the judgment of the City, might hinder or prevent the prompt completion of additional work if awarded.

1.03.04 Award of Contract

The Contract will be awarded, or all bids rejected, by the City within thirty (30) days after the opening of proposals unless otherwise provided. The notice of the award will be mailed to the address given by the Bidder on his proposal.

1.03.05 Execution of the Contract

The Contract and bond forms will be furnished by the City. The Contract must be executed by the successful Bidder and, together with satisfactory bonds, evidence of insurance and endorsement as required, be delivered to the City within ten (10) days of the date of award.

1.03.06 Bonds Required

The successful Bidder shall furnish satisfactory performance and payment bonds executed by a surety acceptable to the City which is licensed to do business in the State of Michigan, upon forms furnished by the City, each in the amount of the following:

1. Performance Bond with limits of amount of contract amount.

-2. Labor and material bond with limits of amount of contract amount.

1.03.07 Insurance Requirements

During the term of this contract, contractors shall maintain insurance in the kinds and in the amounts specified below with insurers of recognized responsibility, licensed to do business in the state (where the work is being performed) and having either an AM Best rating of "A X", Standard & Poore's Rating of "AA", or Moody's rating of "Aa2". If any work provided for or to be performed under this agreement is subcontracted, contractor shall require the consultants or subcontractor(s) to maintain and furnish the contractor with insurance equivalent to that which is required of the contractor.

In accordance with the above, the following insurance coverages and limits shall be maintained by the contractor at all times during the term of this contract, and for a minimum of 1 year after completion of the project. Such insurance will protect contractor, the owner, the engineer and the City of Wyandotte from claims demands and law suits arising out of the work described in this contract and performed by the contractor and/or subcontractor(s). The following coverages and limits are minimum requirements, but nothing contained in these insurance requirements is to be construed as limiting the extent of the contractor's responsibility for payment of damages resulting from their operations under this contract. The contractor shall advise all insurance companies to familiarize themselves with the conditions and provisions of this contract.

Insurance - Other Requirements

<u>Damage Claims - Acknowledgment and Reports:</u> The Contractor shall furnish to the Owner an acknowledgment receipt from the Insurance Carrier for each damage claim against the project. The receipt shall include the Insurance Carrier's assigned claim number.

Upon request, the Contractor or his Insurance Carrier shall also furnish to the Owner a status report on all damage claims. This report shall include inspections made, the disposition of claims, and what action has been taken towards settlement of each claim.

Failure of the Contractor to comply with this section of the specifications may result in the amount of such damage claims being withheld from the Contractor's estimate. Such withholding shall be reimbursed in the monthly estimate following compliance.

1.03.08 Indemnification

reasonable-

The Contractor shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend the City of Wyardotte, its agents, employees, elected officers, against any and all claims, expenses (including attorney's fees) demands, payments, suits, actions, recoveries, and judgments of every name and description, brought or recovered against them or either or any of them for or on account of loss of life, any personal injury, or damages to property received or sustained by any person or persons to the extent caused by a whomsoever by reason of any act or omission of the said Contractor, his agents, servants, or subcontractors in the performance of said work, or by or in consequence of any negligence or earelessness in connection with the same or on account of the death of or injuries to persons who shall be engaged in or about the work to be performed under the Contract;

and on account of liability or obligation imposed directly or indirectly upon the City of Wyandotte by reason of any law of the State of Michigan or the United States, now existing or which shall hereafter be enacted imposing any liability or obligation, or providing for compensation to any person or persons on account of or arising from the date hereof, for injuries to employees or others. Said Contractor shall pay, settle, compromise, and procure the discharge of any and all such claims and all such losses, damages, expenses, liabilities, and obligations, and shall defend at his own cost and expense any and all claims, demands, suits, and actions made or brought against the City of Wyandotte for or upon any such claim. In case the said Contractor shall fail, negleet, or refuse to comply with any of the provisions of this paragraph, said City of Wyandotte may, in order to protect itself from liability, defend any such claim, demand, suits, or action and pay, settle, compromise, and procure the discharge thereof, in which case the said Contractor shall repay to the City of Wyandotte any and all such loss, damage, and expense, including attorney's fees paid, suffered, or incurred by said City of Wyandotte in so doing. So much of the monies due, or to become due, to said Contractor under this agreement as shall be deemed necessary by the Engineer shall or may be retained by the City until every and all such claims, demands, suits, actions, recoveries, judgments, liabilities, and obligations have been settled and discharged and evidence to that effect furnished to said City of Wyandotte, or said City may collect the same in whole or in part in any other lawful manner from said Contractor.

1.03.08 Indemnification Con't



Contractor shall defend, hold harmless and indemnify City of Wyandotte against any and all claims, expense (including attorney's fees), loss or liability for injury to or death of any persons (including employees or agents), and loss of or damage to any property (including property owned, leased or borrowed by City of Wyandotte), incurred during the performance of work associated with and under this agreement, unless any of the above stated claims, expenses, loss iability or obligation is caused solely by the negligence of the City of Wyandotte.

1.03.08a Waiver of Subrogation

The Contractor shall waive any rights of subrogation for bodily injury or property damage against the City of Wyandotte, its employees and agents, arising from this contract.

In the event of any payment by any insurer of the Contractor under any policy of insurance, the insurer of the Contractor shall not be subrogated to any of the Contractor's rights of recovery therefor against the City of Wyandotte, its employees and agents; and the Contractor shall neither execute nor deliver instruments and papers nor do anything whatever to secure any such rights for the insurer of the Contractor. The Contractor shall do nothing after loss to secure such rights for the benefit of the insurer against the City of Wyandotte, its employees and agents. The Contractor waives any and all rights of recovery against the City of Wyandotte, its employees and agents for insured losses occurring to any property insured by the Contractor arising from this Contract. The City of Wyandotte shall not, under any circumstances, be liable to the Contractor or any person for any personal injury or property damage occasioned by any defect or malfunction of equipment or property, or from the escape of steam or water, or for any damage or injury occasioned by water or ice being on the premises or work site or coming from any source. The Contractor shall be solely responsible for providing all services and products arising from this Contract in a safe and proper fashion.

The Contractor will be solely and completely responsible for conditions of the job site, including safety of all persons and property during the performance of the work. This requirement will apply continuously and not be limited to normal working hours.

The Contractor shall furnish such watchmen, guards, fences, warning signs, lights and walkways, and shall take all other preeautions as shall be necessary to prevent damage to persons or property. All structures and improvements in the vicinity of the work shall be protected by the Contractor, and if such property is damaged, injured or destroyed by the Contractor, his employees, subcontractors, or agents, it shall be restored to a condition as good as when he entered upon the work.

If the Contractor shall fail to reasonably protect the work and persons against damage, the Engineer may provide for such protection and the costs of the same shall be charged against the Contractor and deducted from the payments due him for completed work. The mention of any specific duty or liability of the Contractor in any part of the specifications shall not be construed as a limitation or restriction upon any general liability or duty imposed upon the Contractor by the specifications.

1.03.08a Waiver of Subrogation Con't

The safety provisions of applicable laws, including but not limited to building and construction codes, shall be observed. Machinery, equipment, and all hazards shall be guarded (or hazards eliminated).

The duty of the Engineer to conduct construction inspections of the Contractor's performance is not intended to include review of the adequacy of the Contract's safety measures in, on or near the construction site or sites.

1.03.09 Contract Extension

The City of Wyandotte reserves the right to extend all provisions of this contract, including, but not limited to, the accepted unit rates as bid, to perform similar work in other areas according to these specifications for an additional period of two (2) consecutive years. This Contract extension will only be authorized when initiated by the City, approved by the Wyandotte City Council and agreed to by the Contractor. At the time of the agreement, the Contractor shall furnish updated insurance documents and bonds.

1.03.10 Subcontracting of Contract Work

which shall not be unreasonably withheld.

The Contractor shall not subcontract any portion of the contract or of the work provided therein, except the furnishing of necessary materials, without the written consent of the City of Wyandotte through its Engineer. Such consent shall not in any way relieve the Contractor of full responsibility for the performance of the Contract. The Contractor shall not sell, transfer or assign any portion of the Contract without the written consent of the City and the Surety.

Approval of the subcontracting of any portion of the work will not be given unless and until it is determined that the Subcontractor is qualified to perform work of the type, magnitude, and scope proposed. The City reserves the right to require Subcontractors to provide information in accordance with Section 1.03.02. The Subcontractor shall not begin work until he has been approved by the Engineer and has had his subcontract with the Prime Contractor executed in a form acceptable to the City.

If the amount of the subcontract or the nature of the work to be performed thereunder warrants, the City may require the Subcontractor to furnish, for the benefit of the Contractor, bonds in an amount proportioned to the amount of his subcontract, and for the same purpose and under the same specifications as those of the General Contract. The Surety on the General Contract shall not be eligible to furnish subcontract bonds.

The City of Wyandotte reserves the right to remove forthwith from the job any Subcontractor or his equipment operating in violation of these requirements, and any costs or damages thereby incurred are assumed by the Contractor. It is further understood that the Contractor's responsibilities in the performance of his Contract, in case of an approved subcontracting, are the same as if he had handled the work directly.

Assignment or subletting the whole or any portion of this contract shall not operate to release the Contractor or his bondsmen hereunder from any of the contract obligations.

1.03.11 Failure to Execute Contract

If the successful Bidder fails to deliver an executed contract or to fulfill any of the other requirements relating to the award of a contract, as herein specified, it shall be deemed just cause for the annulment of the award. In the event of such annulment of the award, the amount of the proposal guaranty shall become the property of the City of Wyandotte, not as penalty but as liquidated damages. The award may then be made to the next best qualified Bidder, or the work readvertised or processed as the City may elect.

SECTION 1.04 SCOPE OF THE WORK

1.04.01 Intent of the Plans, Specifications and Contract

The intent of the plans, specifications and contract is to provide for the completion of the work in substantial compliance with the details as shown thereon and as described herein. The Contractor shall furnish all labor, materials, equipment, tools, transportation and necessary supplies, unless otherwise mentioned and shall perform all operations required to complete the work in accordance with the specifications and plans; but in no case will any work in excess of such requirements be paid for unless otherwise ordered in writing by the Engineer.

1.04.02 Increased or Decreased Quantities

The Engineer reserves and shall have the right under the Contract to make such changes, from time to time, in the plans and in the quantities of the work, as may be necessary or desirable to insure the completion of the work in the most satisfactory manner in accordance with the specifications.

All items of work will be paid for at the contract unit price for the quantity required to complete the work regardless of any increased or decreased quantities.

1.04.03 Physical Conditions

If this Contract exceeds \$75,000.00, and when different or unknown physical conditions are found at the work site, the following shall apply:

- b. If the City Engineer or his representative receives a written notice under subdivision a. above, the City Engineer or his representative shall promptly investigate the physical condition.
- c. If the City Engineer or his representative determines that the physical conditions do materially differ and will cause an increase or decrease in costs or additional time needed to perform the Contract, the City Engineer's or his representative's determination shall be made in writing and equitable adjustment shall be made and the Contract modified in writing accordingly.
- d. The Contractor cannot make a claim for additional costs or time because of a physical condition unless the Contractor has complied with the notice requirements of subdivision a. The City Engineer or his representative may extend the time required for notice under subdivision a.
- e. The Contractor cannot make a claim for an adjustment under the Contract after the Contractor has received the final payment under the Contract.

1.04.04 Extra Work

On or before the 20th of each month, the Contractor shall submit to the Engineer all bills or claims for extra work done during the preceding month, failing in which, it is mutually understood and agreed that the Contractor shall waive and forfeit all rights and claims to extra compensations for same. The Contractor shall give written notice to the Engineer before commencing work which he considers extra, whether he shall have received written orders for the same or not; failing such notification he shall waive and forfeit all rights and claims to extra compensation for same.

1.04.05 Additional Work Outside of Designated Areas

The Engineer reserves and shall have the right under this Contract to specify areas of work within the City which do not fall within the area designated as this years program. These additional areas of work will be selected and deemed for the good of the City to correct hazardous conditions, trip and fall situations, complaints, and to perform any special work requested by other City of Wyandotte Departments. This work shall be paid for as specified above in Section 1.04.03 Extra Work.

1.04.06 Alterations

No extra charge shall be made for adjustments or alterations usually occurring in construction; and failure to understand the tru plans for any particular cause WORK IS DESIGN / NOT whatsoever, including possible elieve the Contractor from obligations to perform a comple CONSTRUCTION

To facilitate his work, the Contractor will be permitted, at his own expense, to make such additions or alterations as the City Engineer may approve in writing.

SECTION 1.05 CONTROL OF THE WORK

1.05.01 Authority - General

No agents of the party of the first part shall have power to revoke, alter, enlarge or relax the stipulations or requirements of these specifications, except insofar as such authority may be specifically conferred by the specifications themselves, without the formal authorization to do so, conferred by the contract of which the specifications are a part, or by ordinance, resolutions or other usual official action by the party of the first part.

1.05.02 Authority of the Engineer

The Engineer shall in all cases decide every question of an engineering nature which may arise relating to the quality and acceptability of materials furnished and work performed, the manner of performance and the rate of progress of the work. He shall also decide all questions which may arise as to the interpretation of the plans and specifications, and any questions involving coordination of various aspects of the work.

The administration, inspection, assistance and actions by the Engineer shall not be construed as supervisory control of the work or of means and methods employed by the Contractor and shall not relieve the Contractor from any of his responsibilities or obligations under the Contract. The Contractor shall not request or require the Engineer to undertake such supervisory control or to administrate, to supervise, to inspect, to assist, or to act in any manner so as to relieve the Contractor of his responsibilities or obligations. The presence of the Engineer on the project shall in no way relieve the Contractor of his obligation to conform to the Local, State and Federal regulations which govern safety requirements on the project.

1.05.03 Agents

The work shall be carried on under the personal supervision of the Contractor or his property authorized representative, who shall be on the ground at all times during the construction and who shall have full responsibility of the work with power to receive orders and carry out instructions.

1.05.04 Deviation from Plans or Specifications

No person except the Engineer shall have authority to revoke, alter, enlarge, or change any provisions of these specifications or the plans for the work, and if the Contractor deviates from them in any particular without written authorization from the Engineer, he does so at his own risk; and such work and payment therefor may not be approved. The inspector may make such field changes as deemed necessary to facilitate the work.

1.05.05 Cooperation of the Contractor

The Contractor shall conduct his operations so as to interfere as little as possible with those of other Contractors, utilities or any public authority on or near the work as shown on the plans or in the Proposal. The City additionally reserves the right to perform other non-specified work by contract or otherwise, and to permit public utility companies and others to do work on or near the

project during progress of the work. The Contractor shall conduct his work and cooperate with such other parties so as to cause as little interference as possible with their operations and as the Engineer may direct.

No additional compensation will be paid to the Contractor for any delay or inconvenience due to material shortages, or delays due to the operation of such other parties doing the work indicated or shown on the plans or in the Proposal, or for any delays on construction due to the encountering of existing utilities whether or not shown on the plans.

1.05.06 Locating Work

Principal location points and Bench Marks shall be given by the Engineer at such time as he may deem necessary, or if the Contractor shall be in need of the Engineer's services in such work, he shall notify the Engineer 24 hours in advance.

No claims will be honored for delay of the job for lack of line and grade if the Contractor has not given the Engineer 24 hours notice prior to the need for such line and grade.

The Contractor shall adequately protect and maintain all stakes and marks given by the Engineer and locate all work accurately therewith. If the Contractor through willfulness or carelessness removes or causes the removal of said stakes or marks before the prosecution of the work requires it, they will be replaced at he Engineer's earliest convenience, and the cost of replacing of same shall be at the expense of the Contractor.

The Engineer shall have access to the work at all times, and the Contractor shall cooperate with him and furnish such assistance as may be required in order to facilitate the laying out of the work and establishing lines and grades.

1.05.07 Authority and Duties of Inspectors

Inspectors may be appointed and directed to inspect all materials used and all work done. The inspection may extend to all or any part of the work and to the preparation or manufacture of the materials for use in the work. The Inspector on the work will inform the Engineer as to the progress of the work, the manner in which it is being done, and the quality of the materials being used. He will also call to the attention of the Contractor any failure to follow the plans and specifications that he may observe.

He shall have the authority to prevent the use of any material and to stop any work being done which does not conform with the specifications and the plans until the question at issue can be referred to and be decided by the Engineer. In no instance shall any action or omission on the part of the Inspector relieve the Contractor of the responsibility of completing the work in accordance with the plans and specifications.

The Inspector shall in no case act as foreman or perform any duties for the Contractor, nor interfere with the management of the work by the latter. Any advice the Inspector may give the Contractor shall not be construed as binding on the Engineer in any way, except as provided in this Section, nor shall it release the Contractor from fulfilling all the terms of the Contract.

1.05.08 Inspection of the Work

The Engineer or his representatives shall be allowed access to all parts of the work at all times and shall be furnished such information and assistance by the Contractor as may be required to make a complete and detailed inspection. Such inspection may include mill, plant or shop inspection of materials and workmanship

1.05.09 Removal of Defective and Unauthorized Work

Work done beyond the lines shown on the plans or given, or work done without grades where required, or work done without inspection, except as herein provided, or any extra work done without written authorization will not be paid for under the provisions of the Contract. Work so done may be ordered removed or replaced at the Contractor's expense.

The Engineer has the right to have removed by the Contractor such portions of the work as he may deem necessary for the discovery of improper work or material, and the Contractor must restore such work at his own expense if improperly done and at the expense of the party of the first part if found to be in proper condition. Any work which during its progress and before its final acceptance may become damaged from any cause, shall be removed and replaced by good satisfactory work at the Contractor's expense.

The Engineer shall have the right to suspend work upon discovery that any part or parts is being done not in accordance with specifications and he shall not order work resumed until materials furnished or methods used or both, as the case may be, corrected to meet plans, specifications and interpretations of same by the Engineer.

No extension of time will be allowed for correction of faulty work.

If the Contractor refuses or neglects to correct any defective work or to remove unsatisfactory materials from the site of the work within 24 hours, unless otherwise directed, after written notice to do so has been given him by the Engineer, the City may employ the necessary labor to correct or to remove the defective work or unsatisfactory materials, and the total cost of the operation shall be deducted from any money that is due or may become due to the Contractor. The Engineer shall have the authority to plainly mark all unsatisfactory materials for removal after the 24 hour notice period has expired.

1.05.10 Contractor's Responsibility for Work

Should any error or inconsistency appear to the Contractor in either the plans or the specifications, or should the Contractor fail to understand the real intent of the specifications, he shall report same to the Engineer before starting the work concerned, and the decision of the Engineer shall be final and conclusive. The Engineer and the party of the first part shall not be held liable to errors made in lay-out work where said errors could have been detected before performing work by use of ordinary intelligent checking of marks by the Contractor or his responsible help.

Until the final acceptance of the work by the Engineer, the Contractor shall have the charge and eare thereof and shall take every precaution against injury or damage to any part thereof by the action of the elements or from any other cause, whether arising from the execution or from the non-execution of the work. The Contractor shall rebuild, repair, restore, and make good all

injuries or damage to any portion of the work occasioned by any of the above causes before final acceptance and shall bear the expense thereof.

1.05.11 Contract's Responsibility for Trees and Shrubs

All trees and shrubs not designated or otherwise authorized to be removed shall be protected from injury by the Contractor. When excavating adjacent to trees or shrubs, the Contractor shall exercise due care and caution so as not to unnecessarily disturb or damage the roots. Roots that are exposed and injured during excavation shall be cut clean and smooth by approved methods prior to backfilling.

1.05.11 Contract's Responsibility for Trees and Shrubs Con't

Other physical damage to the trunk or branches of trees or shrubs shall be repaired at the Contractor's expense by the City of Wyandotte Department of Public Service or an approved tree service organization under the direction of the City of Wyandotte Department of Public Service.

Trees or shrubs damaged beyond repair, or removed without authorization, shall be replaced in kind or paid for by the Contractor, as directed by the Engineer, prior to final acceptance of the project.

1.05.12 Cleanliness of the Work

The Contractor shall at all times keep the right-of-way and/or any public or private premises temporarily occupied by him for purposes of work under this Contract free from accumulations of waste material or rubbish caused by his employees or work. This requirement shall also apply to any areas in the vicinity of the work, including roads which are affected by the Contractor's construction or hauling operations.

Approved sweeping equipment shall be available to adequately clean, as often as necessary in the opinion of the Engineer, all areas which become a nuisance and a source of complaint due to the operations of the Contractor, Subcontractor, or materials suppliers to the project.

If the Contractor fails to keep the above noted areas cleaned of dust or debris resulting from his operations, and thereby creates a public nuisance, he shall be so notified in writing by the Engineer.

If, within 2 hours after receipt of such notice, the Contractor shall fail to clean such areas satisfactorily, the Engineer shall have the City of Wyandotte, Department of Public Services, or such other agency as he shall designate, perform the work; and all costs of such cleaning shall be paid for by the Contractor. If the Contractor fails to reimburse the City for the above costs before completion of the Contract, the costs shall be deducted from monies due or to become due to the Contractor.

1.05.13 Emergencies

The Contractor has a duty to be continually aware and responsible for any condition which could endanger the public or the work. If the Engineer discovers any such endangering condition or situation and is unable to contact the Contractor or if, after notification by the Engineer, the Contractor shall fail to respond immediately with sufficient action to protect life and health of the workmen or the public and to protect the work and adjoining public or private property, the Engineer shall have the City of Wyandotte, Department of Public Services, or such other agency as he shall designate, perform the work or correct the problem; and all costs of such correction shall be paid by the Contractor. If the Contractor fails to reimburse the City for the above costs before completion of the Contract, the costs shall be deducted from monies due or to become due the Contractor.

1.05.14 Final Inspection

The Engineer shall make inspection of all work included in the Contract, or such portions thereof eligible for acceptance, as soon as possible after notification by the Contractor that the work is completed or after the Engineer's records show that the work is completed. If the work is not acceptable to the Engineer at the time of such inspection, he shall advise the Contractor in writing as to the particular defects to be remedied before final acceptance.

SECTION 1.06 CONTROL OF MATERIALS

1.06.01 Quality and Source of Sur DELETE WHOLE SECTION OF 1.06 -

The Contractor shall furnish only SERVICES ARE BEING to the requirements of the specific PROVIDED, NOT After award of the Contract, wher MATERIALS ls or fabricated items conforming ngineer prior to use in the work. le Contractor shall furnish

complete written statements of the origin, composition and manufacture of all materials or fabricated items required in the work. The Contractor will not be permitted to change the source of supply without giving the Engineer prior notification. The Contractor may be required to submit preliminary samples of materials intended for use.

If it is found that a source of supply does not furnish a uniform product, or if for any reason the product from any source at any time proves to be unsatisfactory, the Engineer may require the Contractor, fabricator or supplier to furnish acceptable material from other sources; and the Contractor shall have no claim for increased cost on account of such requirement.

Whenever and wherever possible, all materials, products or fabricated items used in the performance of this work shall be produced, manufactured, or assembled in the United States.

All manufactured and fabricated items shall be new unless otherwise specified or approved by the Engineer.

106.02 Samples of Materials

Samples upon which acceptance or rejection of the material is based shall be taken by a representative of the City in accordance with the methods designated in the specifications or as directed by the Engineer. The Contractor shall afford such facilities as the Engineer may require for collecting and forwarding samples and shall not use the materials represented by the sample until they have been found to satisfy the requirements of the specifications. The Contractor in all cases shall furnish the required samples without charge.

1.06.03 Tests of Materials

Tests of materials will be made by and at the expense of the City unless otherwise provided.

All materials proposed to be used may be inspected and tested at any time and at any place during their preparation, storage and use, unless otherwise specified. All tests of materials will be made in accordance with methods as described or designated in the specifications. Plant inspection may be made if the production is sufficient to warrant such inspection or is in the best interests of the City. Where plant inspection is made, the producer shall furnish and maintain a suitable Field Office for the use of the Inspector in making field tests.

1.06.04 Materials Not Mentioned

1.06.05 Storage of Materials

SECTION OF 1.06 -SERVICES ARE BEING PROVIDED, NOT MATERIALS

The Contractor shall consult with the Engineer before beginning the work as to available space within the right-of-way for temporary storage of materials, machinery, equipment and other property of the Contractor. Locations for storage shall be accepted by the Contractor as temporary; and the Contractor shall, at his own expense, promptly move any part or all of same, at any time or times, as directed by the Engineer. Private property shall not be used for storage purposes without written permission of the owner or lessee; and, if requested by the Engineer, copies of such shall be furnished to the Engineer.

Materials placed on the roadway shall be neatly and compactly piled in such manner as to cause the least inconvenience to property owners and the general public. No materials shall be stored within the right-of-way unless it is barricaded in accordance with the Michigan Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices.

Materials shall be stored so as to insure the preservation of their quality and fitness for the work.

1.06.06 Handling and Transporting Materials

All materials shall be handled in such manner as to preserve their quality and fitness for the work.

Aggregates shall be transported from the storage site to the work in vehicles so constructed and maintained as to prevent loss or segregation of materials after loading or measuring.

1.06.07 Unacceptable Materials

All materials not conforming to the requirements of the specifications shall be considered as unacceptable and all such materials will be rejected and shall be removed immediately from the site of the work unless otherwise instructed by the Engineer.

1.06.08 Unused Material

All furnished materials which are not incorporated in the work upon completion of the work items, shall remain the property of the Contractor and shall be removed from the project prior to acceptance of the work.

SECTION 1.07 LEGAL RELATIONS AND RESPONSIBILITY TO PUBLIC

1.07.01 Laws to be Observed

In all operations connected with the work, all Federal and State laws, local ordinances, and laws or by-laws controlling or limiting in any way the actions of those engaged on the work shall be strictly compiled with by the Contractor and all employees working under his direction.

1.07.01a Commercial Drivers License (CDL)

The Contractor shall have the responsibility to comply with the U.S. Department of Transportation's regulations regarding alcohol and drug testing of all CDL drivers engaged in completing work under this contract. The Contractor shall not allow unlicensed CDL drivers to operate any equipment requiring a CDL. The City may require proof of compliance or will periodically check for compliance.

1.07.02 Permits, Licenses and Taxes

The Contractor shall secure and pay for all permits fees, licenses, and inspection costs. The Contractor shall give all notices necessary to the due and lawful prosecution of the work. Any inspection fees of other governmental agencies or utility companies and other expenses occasioned by the Contractor's work shall be paid by the Contractor and shall not be recoverable from the City. The Contractor shall pay sales, consumer, use and similar taxes for any work provided by the Contractor.

1.07.03 Patented Devices, Materials and Processes

If the Contractor uses any design, device, material or process covered by letters of patent or copyrighted, he shall provide for such use by suitable legal agreement with the patentee or patent owner. The Contractor and the Surety shall indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the City of Wyandotte for any and all claims for infringement by reason of the use of such patent, design, device, material or process, or trademark or copyright in connection with the work to be performed under this Contract, and shall indemnify the City of Wyandotte for any costs, expenses and damages which it may be obligated to pay by reason of such infringement at any time during the prosecution or after the completion of the work.

1.07.04 Sanitary Provisions

The Contractor shall provide and maintain in a neat and sanitary condition such accommodations for the use of his employees as may be necessary to comply with the requirements and regulations of the Federal, State and Local health authorities. All sanitary installations for use during construction shall be removed from the project by the Contractor before final acceptance of the work. The construction, maintenance, and removal of all temporary sanitary facilities shall be included in other items of work and will not be paid for separately.

1.07.05 Public Convenience and Safety

The Contractor shall comply with all Federal, State, Municipal and local laws, by-laws, ordinances, and regulations applicable to the work under this Contract, including OSHA and

1.07.05 Public Convenience and Safety Con't

MIOSHA. He shall furnish and use all material, safeguards, safety devices, and protective equipment as required by such laws, ordinances or regulations.

He shall also be responsible for taking any other needed actions to protect the life and health of the Contractor's and Owner's employees on the work and safety of the public, and to protect the work and adjoining utilities and property during the construction of the project.

In order to freely prosecute the work the Contractor shall occupy only such parts of the public property along the line of the work as is reasonably needed. Regardless of its degree of proximity of the work, private property shall not be used by the Contractor except upon his obtaining express permission from the owners involved.

During the progress of the work, the Contractor shall accommodate both vehicular and foot traffic and shall provide free access to fire hydrants, water and gas valves. Gutters or waterways must be kept open or other provisions made for removal of storm water. Street intersections may be blocked but one-half at a time, and the Contractor shall lay and maintain temporary driveways, bridges, and crossing, such as in the opinion of the Engineer are necessary to reasonably accommodate the public.

In the event of the Contractor's failure to comply with these provisions, the Engineer may cause the same to be done, and will deduct the cost of such work from any money due or to become due the Contractor under this contract, but the performance of such work by the party of the first part, or at its insistence, shall serve in no way to release the Contractor from his general or particular liability for the safety of the public or the work.

-a) <u>Control of Air Pollution</u>: The Contractor shall comply with all Federal, State, and local laws -and regulations governing the control of air pollution.

During the construction of any project, adequate dust control measures shall be maintained so as not to cause detriment to the safety, health, welfare, or comfort to any person or cause damage to property or business.

- b) <u>Excavation and Shoring</u>: Excavation and Shoring, where herein specified in the Special Provisions, are intended only as a guide to the Contractor. When in the judgment of the Engineer, any additional excavation, sheeting, shoring and/or bracing is required to adequately protect the work, the Contractor shall promptly provide the same. This additionalwork will not be a pay item. However in all situations the Contractor will be responsible for the work, the safety of the personnel engaged in the work, and the safety of the public at large.
- c) <u>Utilities:</u> The Contractor shall comply with Act 53 of the Michigan Public Acts of 1974, commonly known as "MISS DIG".

At points where the Contractor's operations are adjacent to properties of railway, telegraph, telephone, water, sewer, electric, gas, petroleum, or cable television companies, hereinafter referred to as "utilities", or are adjacent to other property, damage to which might result in considerable expenses, loss or inconvenience, work shall not be commenced until all arrangements necessary for the protection thereof have been made.

1.07.05 Public Convenience and Safety Con't

The Contractor shall cooperate with the owners of any underground or overhead utilities in their removal and rearrangement operations in order that these operations may progress in a reasonable manner, that duplication of rearrangement work may be reduced to a minimum, and that services rendered by those utilities will not be unnecessarily interrupted.

In the event of interruption to utility services as a result of accidental breakage or as a result of being exposed or unsupported, the Contractor shall promptly notify the proper utility and shall cooperate with said utility in the restoration of service. If utility service is interrupted, repair work shall be continuous until service is restored.

1,07.06 Protection and Restoration of Property

The Contractor shall restore at his own expense any public or private property damaged or injured in consequence of any act or omission on his part, or on the part of his employees or agents, to a condition equal or better than that existing before such injury or damage was done. If the Contractor neglects to restore or correct such damage or injury, the City may, upon 48hours notice, proceed to restore or make good such damage or injury and order the cost thereof deducted from any monies that are due or may become due the Contractor.

Where it is the policy of any utility owner to make its own repairs to damaged conduit or other structures, the Contractor shall cooperate to the fullest extent with the utility, and he shall see that his operations interfere as little as possible with these operations, and the Contractor shall assume the cost of any charge against the City therefore.

In cases where existing public and private utility connections are encountered, the Contractor shall perform his operations in such manner that service will be uninterrupted, and the cost thereof shall be at the Contractor's expense.

1.07.07 No Waiver of Legal Rights

Neither the acceptance by the party of the first part or its Engineer, or any of its agents, nor any order, measurements or certificate by the Engineer nor any order of the party of the first part for the payment of money, nor any payment for or acceptance of the whole or any part of the whole, or any part of the work by the Engineer or any party of the first part or its agents shall operate as a waiver for any portion of the contract or any power therein reserved to the party of the first part, or any right to damage therein provided; nor shall any waiver of any breach of the contract be held to be a waiver of any other or subsequent breach. Contractor's waiver of any breach of contract shall not be held to be a waiver of any other or subsequent breach.

The party of the first part shall pay, and the Contractor receive, the prices bid on the proposal or agreed upon, based upon measurements made by the Engineer or as otherwise herein stipulated and such measurements shall be final and conclusive.

The quantities of the various classes of work to be done and material to be furnished under this contract, which have been estimated as stated elsewhere herein, are approximate and only for the purpose of comparing on a uniform basis, the bids offered for the work under this contract. Neither the party of the first part, or its agents, is to be held responsible should any of the said estimated quantities be found incorrect during the construction of the work; and the Contractor shall make no claim for anticipated profit nor for loss of profit, during the progress of the work.

1.07.08 Personal Liability of Public Officials

In carrying out any of the provisions of these specifications, or in exercising any power or authority granted to them by or within the scope of the Contract, there shall be no liability upon the City Engineer, or their authorized representatives, either personally or as officials of the City, it being understood that in all such matters they act solely as agents and representatives of the City.

SECTION 1.08 PROSECUTION AND PROGRESS

1.08.01 Prosecution of the Work

The Contractor shall begin work on the project within 30 calendar days after the acceptance by the City of the executed documents unless otherwise stated or directed by the Engineer. In all cases, work shall be started in time to finish the project by the completion date stated in the Contract. The Contractor shall notify the Engineer at least 48 hours in advance of the time he intends to start.

Contractor will perform the work as expeditiously as is consistent with professional sill and care and the orderly progress of the Project.

It is distinctly understood and agreed to, by the parties hereto, that the time specified for the completion of the work is the essence of this contract and the Contractor shall not be entitled to claim performance of the agreement until the work is satisfactorily completed in every respect, within the time herein specified.

The entire project, pieces of work, portions of work and sections of work shall be prosecuted regularly and uninterruptedly, unless the Engineer shall otherwise specifically direct, with such force and at such points as to insure its full completion within the time herein stated. If in the opinion of the Engineer, it is necessary or advisable that certain portions of the work be done immediately, the Contractor, upon written order, shall proceed with such work without delay. Should he fail to so proceed, the Engineer may do or cause to be done such work, and will deduct the cost of the same from any money due or to become due the Contractor under this contract. Further, the Contractor shall be subject to Liquidated Damages as set forth in Section 1.08.06 of these Specifications.

If, in the judgment of the Engineer the work is not being prosecuted in such manner as to ensure its completion within the time specified, the Engineer shall have the right to require the Contractor to furnish and place in operation such additional force and equipment as the Engineer shall deem necessary to insure completion of the work within the time specified in the Contract. Any of the above requirements directed by the Engineer shall be performed by the Contractor at no additional cost to the City.

The Contractor's failure to comply with this Section shall be cause for termination of the Contract in accordance with Section 1.08.07.

1.08.02 Limitations of Operations

The Contractor shall be required to prosecute work done under this contract only during the daylight hours between 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., unless otherwise authorized by the Engineer, and except for the purpose of making emergency repairs and for the proper protection of the work. The prosecution of the work must be stopped and the daily clean-up completed by 6:00 p.m. No work will be permitted at night or on Sundays, except to save property or life or as specifically authorized or directed by the Engineer.

The Engineer reserves the right to require the Contractor to cease construction operations on legal holidays and the day preceding and the day following, or at such other times as may be determined to be in the interest of the general public, except for the purpose of making emergency repairs and for the proper protection of the work.

1.08.02 Limitations of Operations Con't

In case of a dispute arising between two or more Contractors or others as to the respective rights of each, the Engineer shall determine the matters at issue and shall define the respective rights of the various interests involved in order to secure the completion of all parts of the work in general harmony and with satisfactory results, and his decision shall be final and binding on all parties concerned and shall not in any way be cause for claim for extra compensation by any of the parties. but may entitle the Contractor to additional time in which to complete the work.

1.08.03 Superintendent, Character of Workman and Equipment

The Contractor shall employ a competent superintendent and necessary assistants who shall be in attendance at the project site during performance of the work. The superintendent shall represent the Contractor and communications given to the superintendent shall be as binding as if given to the Contractor. Important communications shall be confirmed in writing. Other communications shall be similarly confirmed on written request in each case.

The Contractor shall employ only skilled workmen experienced in the kind of work to be done, and in sufficient numbers to complete all parts of the work in a substantial neat and workmanlike manner within the time specified.

It is the responsibility of the Contractor to confirm that all of its employees that it uses under this Contract are authorized to work in the United States. It is the Contractor's responsibility to fill out and have on file all necessary paperwork which confirms the employee's eligibility to work in the United States. If any employee of the Contractor is found not to be eligible to work in the United States, the employee shall be immediately removed from the work and the Contractor shall be responsible to pay as Liquidated Damages to the City the monetary amount as set forth in 1.08.06 for each day said ineligible employee was employed on the project. Any information provided by the Contractor to the City to confirm each employee's eligibility will be solely for the purpose to verify that the employee is eligible to work in the United States.

If any authorized representative of the Contractor shall refuse or neglect to obey the directions of the Engineer in anything. relating to the work, or if any person shall appear to the Engineer to be incompetent, disorderly, or unfaithful he shall upon order of the Engineer, be at once discharged and shall not be re-employed on the work, and such discharge shall not be used as the basis of any claim or damages against the party of the first part.

The Contractor shall furnish and use such adequate and proper machinery and equipment as will insure the work being done in a satisfactory manner. Equipment used on any portion of the project shall be such that no injury to the roadway, adjacent property, or other roadway will result from its use.

When the methods and equipment to be used by the Contractor in accomplishing the construction are not prescribed in the Contract, the Contractor is free to use any methods or equipment that he demonstrates, to the satisfaction of the Engineer, will accomplish the work in conformity with the requirements of the Contract, except that equipment for a specific task shall be the type generally designed for this purpose

1.08.04 Temporary Suspension of Work

The Engineer shall have the authority to suspend the work wholly or in part for such period or periods as he may deem necessary, due to weather, or for such other conditions as are considered unfavorable for the suitable prosecution of the work, or for such time as is necessary, due to the failure on the part of the Contractor to carry out orders given or to perform any or all provisions of the Contract or for violation of any of the Contract specifications. If work is suspended due to no fault of Contractor,

Contractor shall be granted a time extension in which to

The Contractor at his own volition shall not suspend the work without written authority of the Engineer.

1.08.05 Time of Completion

The time allowed for completion of the work, including final cleaning up, shall be as stated in the proposal or specifications, and as mutually agreed upon in a Pre-Construction Meeting.

Upon request of the engineer and before signing the Contract the Contractor shall prepare and submit information on Contractor's construction schedule for the work. The construction schedule shall include a list of any subcontractors with a value for each subcontract. This shall be prepared at no cost to the City even if the Contract is not awarded to the Contractor.

Time will be charged for every day when it is possible for the Contractor to effectively carry out controlling operations, unless otherwise provided.


All days in which work is suspended by order of the Engineer or in accordance with these specifications shall automatically extend the time for completion an equal number of days.

1.08.06 Liquidated Damages

In case the Contractor shall fail in the due performance of the work to be executed under this contract by and at the time or ti DELETE SECTION 1.08.06 referred to or at other than the cliquidated Damages extended, or if the Contractor enpresed works and not as penalty, the completion may have been orized to work in the United States, he shall be liable to pay to the party of the first part, and does hereby agree to pay to the party of the first part, as liquidated damages, and not as penalty, the applicable sum stated in the Schedule of Liquidated Damages. This Schedule shall apply for each and every day which may elapse between the appointed and actual time of completion, or the number of days which an unauthorized employee works, which sum is hereby agreed upon, fixed and determined as the damage which will be suffered by the party of the first part by reason of the failure of said Contractor to complete the work within the time specified or to employ only those authorized to work in the United States.

The Contractor shall complete the work even after the time limits within the scope of this Contract, and such completion shall in no way operate as a waiver on the Part of the City of its rights under this Contract.

1.08.07 Termination of Contract

If the Contractor:

- a. Fails to start work on notice to do so; or
- b. Fails to prosecute the work with manpower, equipment, construction plant or materials sufficient to complete the work by the date set for completion or according to the project completion schedule; or
- c. Performs the work improperly; or
- d. Discontinues the performance of the work before completion without prior approval; or
- e. Neglects or refuses to remove rejected materials or to perform anew such work as shall-

have

-been rejected as defective and unsuitable; or-

- f. For any other reason fails to carry on the work in accordance with the Contract; or
- g. Shall become insolvent; or
- h. Shall be declared bankrupt in a court proceedings; or
- i. Shall commit any act of bankruptcy or insolvency; or
- j. Makes an assignment for the benefit of creditors; or

k. Shall be subject to proceedings for reorganization under the Bankruptcy Act; then

The Engineer shall give notice to the Contractor and his Surety, in writing, of the happening of any such event, specifying the same, and notifying them of the City's intention to terminate the Contract pursuant to this Section, and if the Contractor or Surety within a period of five (5) calendar days after such notice shall not proceed satisfactorily in accordance therewith, or fail to halt the proceedings under h., i., j., or k. above, then upon written certification from the Engineer of the fact of the happening of such event, and of the Contractor's or Surety's failure to comply with such notice, the City shall have full power and authority, without violating the Contract, to take the work away from the Contractor. The Surety shall be given the opportunity after termination of the Contract, within a period of five (5) calendar days, to arrange for a new Contractor to promptly complete the work pursuant to all of the Contract's plans and specifications. If the Surety declines such opportunity, the City shall have full power and authority to appropriate or use any or all materials and equipment on the site of the project as may be suitable and acceptable and may enter into a Contract for the completion of the work according to the Contract's plans and specifications, or use such methods as in its opinion shall be required for the proper completion of the work. If the City terminates the Contract and the Surety declines to have the work completed, all additional costs, charges, and damages incurred

1.08.07 Termination of Contract Con't

by the City, together with the costs of completion of the work, shall be deducted from any monies due or which may become due the Contractor.

If the total of such damages, costs and charges exceed the balance of the contract price which would have been payable to the Contractor had the Contractor completed the work, then the Contractor and Surety shall, upon demand, pay to the City the amount of such excess.

1.08.08 Injunctions

Should the party of the first part be prohibited or enjoined from proceeding with the work, or from authorizing its prosecution, either before or after its commencement, by reasons of any litigation or otherwise, the said Contractor shall not be entitled to any damages by reason of the delays thereby caused except for the actual cost of protecting such work as he may have under way, or for the cost of removal and replacement of such tools, plant and materials as he may have delivered upon such work, such cost to be determined by the Engineer. Nor shall said party be entitled to withdraw from this agreement until such delays, as aforesaid, aggregate one year, but the time of completion shall be extended for such time, as in the judgment of the Engineer, shall be equal to the aggregate delay.

SECTION 1.09 MEASUREMENT AND PAYMENT

1.09.01 Measurement of Quantities

Quantities of work completed under the Contract will be measured by the Engineer according to United States standard DELETE WHOLE SECTION

When the method of measurement for a particular item specifies that it will be "measured in place", the measurements will be taken along the actual surface of the completed item to obtain the linear area or measurement.

When material is measured by weight in tons, the unit shall be the ton of 2,000 pounds.

When the method of measurement for a particular item is specified in square yards or square feet, measurements will be made along the actual surfaces. The dimensions used in calculating the pay area shall be the actual dimensions as constructed by not exceeding the neat dimensions provided on the plans unless authorized by the Engineer The depth of items shall be as shown on the plans or specified in the Proposal.

When the method of measurement specified is for an item "compacted in place", the volume will be that based on the neat lines called for on the plans or as authorized by the Engineer. Unless otherwise authorized by the Engineer, any amount less than the neat line dimension will be subtracted from the calculation of the pay quantity, and any amount greater than the neat line dimension will be omitted from the calculation of the pay quantity. This method of measurement is not intended to eliminate the grading tolerances provided by the Specifications, but establishes the basis of payment for the compacted in-place value.

All materials which are specified for measurement by the cubic yard, loose measure, will be as measured in the hauling vehicle, unless otherwise provided.

Structures will be measured as units unless otherwise specified.

The method of measurement for other items of work will be as provided under the Specifications for the particular item.

When required by the Engineer, the Contractor shall file original copies of freight bills, trucking slips, bills of lading, and paid invoices for any or all materials used in the work.

1.09.02 Scope of Payment

The Contractor shall accept the compensation as herein provided in full payment for furnishing all necessary materials, labor, tools, equipment and incidentals; and for performing all work under the Contract; also for all loss or damage arising from the nature of the work, or from action of the elements, or from any unforeseen difficulties which may be encountered during the prosecution of the work until its final acceptance by the Engineer.

1.09.03 Payments for Increased or Decreased Quantities

Whenever the quantity of any item of work as given in the Proposal shall be increased or decreased, payment for such item of work shall be at the contract price for the actual quantities of work done except as otherwise provided.

1.09.04 Eliminated Items

The Engineer shall have the right at any time to eliminate the performance or the completion of any contract item, such action to be evidenced in writing by the Engineer. In such case, payment will be made to the Contractor of a fair and equitable amount covering all direct costs incurred on such items prior to the date of cancellation, alteration, or suspension of the work. The Contractor shall accept payment in full at the contract unit prices for any work actually performed prior to the date of cancellation, alteration, or suspension of the work by order of the Engineer. No allowances will be made for anticipated profits in payments to the Contractor for deleted items of work.

1.09.05 Progress Payments

Progress payments, upon estimates of the Engineer, shall be made by the City to the Contractor every fourth week, or more often at the discretion of the City. Progress payments shall not exceed 90 % of the value of completed work at the date of authorized payment unless otherwise approved by the Engineer.

Progress payments shall not be considered as an acceptance of the work, or any portion thereof.

If any work completed by the Contractor or material furnished by the Contractor is determined to be defective, or should a reasonable doubt arise as to the integrity of any part of the work completed by the Contractor prior to the final acceptance and payment, there will be withheld from the Contract's progress payments, after the discovery of such work, an amount equal in value to the replacement cost of the defective or questioned work until the defects have been remedied or the causes for doubt removed.

1.09.06 Acceptance and Final Payment

When the work has been completed and the City shall have found that each and every part of the work

has been done in accordance with the Contract, plans and specifications or such modifications thereof as

have been approved, the same will be accepted; and the Engineer will make a final estimate as soon as practical of the completed work; and the total amount due the Contractor less the total amount of all previous payments will be paid.

The Contractor, for himself or for any Sub-Contractor under him, shall well and truly pay, as the same may become due and payable, all indebtedness which may become due to any person, firm corporation or City on account of which these specifications form a part; and in case of his failure to do so, and on sworn statement of any unpaid claim for labor or material as above being filed with the Engineer, a sum of money sufficient to cover such claim or claims shall be retained from any monies due substantiated to the satisfaction of the Engineer, said Engineer shall pay such claim or claims from the monies so retained, any residue to be paid to such contractor on the completion of the work.

1.09.06 Acceptance and Final Payment Con't

Any and all monies due the City by the Contractor on this Contract at the final completion of the Contract shall be deducted from monies due or which may become due the Contractor before final payment.

Before final payment is made, the Contractor shall as directed by the party of the first part make affidavit that he has paid all claim of every nature or secure a release from the surety or sureties approving payment of final estimate by the party of the first part. The final payment, when made, shall be considered as final approval and acceptance of the completed work herein specified.

The acceptance by the Contractor of the final payment aforesaid shall operate as and shall be, a release to the party of the first part and its agents, from all claims and liability to the Contractor for anything done or furnished for, relating to the work, or for any act or neglect of the party of the first part of any person relating to or affecting the work. except as it pertains to any claims pending by Contractor against party of the first part submitted in writing prior to the final payment.

1.09.07 Payment Not to be Stopped

The party of the first part shall not, nor shall any officer thereof be precluded by any return or certificate made or given by the Engineer, or other officer, agent or appointee, under the provisions of this agreement at any time (either before or after the final completion and acceptance of the work and payment made thereof pursuant to any such return or certificates showing the true and correct amount of money due therefore, notwithstanding any such return or certificate, or any payment made in accordance therewith), from demanding and receiving from the Contractor or his Sureties, separately or collectively, such sums as may have been improperly paid said Contractor by reason of any such return or certificate which has been untruly or incorrectly compiled.

1.09.08 General Guarantee

Neither the final certificate of payment nor any provision in the Contract Documents nor partial or entire occupancy of the premises by the owner shall constitute an acceptance of work not done in accordance with the Contract Documents or relieve the Contractor of liability in respect to any express warranties or responsibility for faulty materials or workmanship. Unless otherwise specified the Contractor shall bear the cost of correcting any defects in the work and pay for any damage to other work resulting therefrom, which shall appear within a period of one year from the date of final acceptance. The Owner will give notice of observed defects with reasonable promptness.

The contractor shall furnish, erect, mannant and remove upon completion of the work, all traffic control devices and barricade lights within the project and around the perimeter of the project for the safety of pedestrian and vehicular traffic. This includes, but is not limited to, advance, regulatory, and warning signs, barricades and channeling devices at intersecting streets on which traffic is to be maintained, barricades at the ends of the project and at right-of-way lines for intersecting streets which are to be closed to traffic, along with barricades, signs, and lights at the intersection of these streets to be closed with the first usable street on each side of the project. Traffic regulators, where required by the Engineer, are included

Provisions for the protection of pedestrians shall be maintained at all times. The Contractor shall be responsible for the posting/signing of work areas to alert residents of up-coming work at a minimum of 48 hours in advance of the start of the work. Moving of parked vehicles which interfere with the prosecution of the work will be the responsibility of the Contractor.

Side streets shall not be closed to through traffic except as approved by the Engineer. Walks, driveways and entrances to buildings shall not be unnecessarily blocked. Vehicular access shall be maintained to all commercial properties designated by the Engineer.

Interference with traffic at all cross-streets must be held to a minimum during the time required for construction.

Barricades shall effectively bar vehicular traffic from driving onto the work site, barricades shall be used and maintained in good repair at all times during progress of the work and shall be opened only for construction purposes and public emergency. Barricades for all parts of the work shall be erected and maintained by the Contractor so as to prevent personal and property damages of all description. Any damages from traffic or other causes occurring previous to the official acceptance of the work shall be repaired by the contractor.

DESCRIPTION

This bid document welcomes proposals for a survey-design-engineering services for the Downton Capital Improvements Plan and Infrastructure Project.

The City of Wyandotte is currently undertaking a major reconstruction of its Downtown alleyways, parking lots, above ground and under-ground utilities, including power and distribution lines, telecommunication lines, sewers, water mains, natural gas lines, etc.

The City of Wyandotte envisions an interconnected network of greenways and multimodal corridors throughout the district, with all utilities relocated underground, green infrastructure and stormwater management systems and high-quality infrastructure installations.

Professional engineering surveys, detailed site measurements and maps must be created for all the areas identified in the Downtown Capital Improvements Plan and Infrastructure Project as illustrated in the map in Attachment B. The scope of survey work shall include but is not limited to accurate measuring and mapping of sidewalks, roadways, curbs, gutters, aprons and approaches, alleyways, parking lots, overhead and underground utilities and facilities, commercial and residential structures, property lines, and other miscellaneous fixtures and features.

Final work product must include detailed engineering surveys and drawings in digital and hard copy blueprint formats, compatible with common/prevalent software applications, specifically geographic information systems (GIS) and Auto-CAD, etc.

Once surveys are complete, the City will proceed with Design and Construction Engineering for the project. Proposals must include a detailed timeline and quotes for professional engineering survey services. Proposals may also include quotes for Design and Construction Engineering services as well.

During the performance of this contract, the contractor, for itself, its assignees and successors, in interest (hereinafter referred to as the "contractor") agrees, as follows:

- 1. <u>Compliance with Regulations</u>: The contractor shall comply with Regulations relative to nondiscrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the Department of Transportation, Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21, as they may be amended from time to time (hereinafter referred to as the Regulations), which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this contract.
- 2. <u>Nondiscrimination</u>: The contractor, with regard to the work performed by it during the contract, shall not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, sex, or national origin in the selection, retention, and treatment of subcontractors, including procurements of materials in the discrimination prohibited by Section 21.5 of the Regulation, including employment practices when the contractor covers a program set for in Appendix B of the Regulations.
- 3. <u>Solicitation for Subcontracts, Including Procurements of Materials and</u> <u>Equipment</u>: In all solicitations either by competitive bidding or negotiation made by the contractor for work to be performed under a subcontract, including procurements of materials or leases of equipment, each potential subcontractor or supplier shall be notified by the contractor of the contractor's obligations under the contract and the Regulations relative to nondiscrimination on the grounds of race, color, or national origin.
- 4. **Information and Reports:** The contractor shall provide all information and reports required by the Regulations, or directives issues pursuant thereto, and shall permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as may be determined by the State Highway Department of the Federal Highway Administration to be pertinent to ascertain compliance with such Regulations or directives. Where any information required of a contractor is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information, the contractor shall so certify to the State Highway Department or the Federal Highway Administration, as appropriate, and shall set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.
- 5. <u>Sanctions for Noncompliance</u>: In the event the contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of this contract, the State Highway Department shall impose such contract sanctions as it or the Federal Highway Administration may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
 - a. Withholding payments to the contractor under the contract until the contractor complies and/or
 - b. Cancellation, termination or suspension of the contract, in whole or in part.

6. Incorporation of Provisions: The contractor shall include provisions of paragraphs (1) through (6) in every subcontract, including procurement of material and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the Regulations, or directives issued pursuant thereto. The contractor shall take such action with respect to any subcontract or procurement as the State Highway Department or the Federal Highway Administration may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance: provided, however, that, in the event a contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or supplier as a result of such direction, the contractor may request the State Highway Department to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the State, and, in addition, the contractor may request the United States.

Wyandotte DDA Capital Improvements

Public Space Revitalization

The City of Wyandotte has benefitted greatly from a focus on place making and supporting businesses in our Downtown. Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, previous efforts to promote walkability and utilization of public spaces helped soften the blow of widespread retail and commercial disruption.

To advance these efforts, the City of Wyandotte and the Downtown Development Authority (DDA) are embarking on an ambitious initiative to improve public spaces in Downtown and nonmotorized connections with our neighborhoods. The project focuses on three areas within the DDA and TIFA district boundaries:

- Improving Downtown alleys for non-motorized traffic by removing overhead utilities
- Incorporating stormwater retention and green infrastructure in City parking lots, alleys, and adjacent pedestrian areas
- Developing bike ways along City streets

These efforts are in the planning and development stages thanks to funding from the Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Legacy Funds for Design and

Access. The City and the DDA are eager to leverage Federal, state, and private funding for enhancing the sustainability of this critical infrastructure. We anticipate planning and design to proceed through the remainder of 2022, with implementation of the east alleys starting in 2023, with completion in 2024 or 2025.

A key component of the DDA's strategy will be identifying opportunities for public private partnership in financing public infrastructure in the redevelopment of vacant or underutilized properties. The City recently adopted an amended tax increment financing plan that extends the duration of the TIFA and DDA Plans until 2054. This will fund the DDA's ability to make critical capital improvements and maintain them for the next 35 years.

Although a long-term initiative, the DDA is ready to implement the first phase of the plan, focusing on the alleys and parking lots on the east side of Biddle. The East Alley projects aim to capitalize on the private redevelopment of the former City Hall Building at 3131 Biddle, which will become a four-story mixed-use facility. This project will increase the tax base of the City by revitalization a previously underutilized city-owned building.

Mr. Mysiwiec indicated that he will be renting the building for a tattoo studio. Mr. Mysiwiec indicated that it will be very professional and it will help the City of Wyandotte grow. Mr. Mysiwiec indicated that he has been in the tattoo business for 17 years.

Commissioner Kelly asked where is was located now.

Mr. Mysiwiec indicated that he has a private studio on Grosse Ile and wants to move his business to his hometown.

Commissioner Lupo asked what is body art makeup.

Mr. Mysiwiec indicated that it is basic tattoos. Mr. Mysiwiec indicated that he will also be selling high end body jewelry. Mr. Mysiwiec indicated that his clients have to go to Royal Oak and he would like to sell it in Wyandotte.

Commissioner Lupo indicated that there are areas on Fort Street for this type of use.

Mr. Mysiwiec indicated that he would like to be downtown to allow for his clients to eat and shop in the downtown area. Mr. Mysiwiec stated further that he feels this will help Wyandotte grow.

Chairperson Pasko indicated that rezoning this property would be "spot zoning" and it is not consistent with the Master Plan. Chairperson Pasko indicated that Mr. Mysiwiec could appeal to the Zoning Board of Appeals if the rezoning is not approved.

Karil Czajka, 219 Oak Street, Wyandotte.

Planning Commission Meeting November 17, 2022

Mr. Czajka indicated that he was an attorney and the vice president of Rocket Mortgage and he is in favor of this use in downtown Wyandotte. Mr. Czajka stated that Mr. Mysiwiec is very professional and that his clientele pays a lot of money for the tattoos, it is not like it was 20 years ago.

Mr. Czajak indicated that he understands spot zoning, but this will benefit the city.

Ms. Kaylyn Crayne, 763 Cherry, Wyandotte.

Ms. Crayne indicated that the current zoning ordinance is out dated and she believes that this use should be allowed in the CBD. Ms. Crayne did indicate that the City is updating the ordinance, but the owner cannot wait for it to be completed, property needs to get rented.

Ms. Crayne further stated that it is very expensive to get tattoos and the city needs to grow with the times and allow this type of use.

There being no further discussion, the hearing was closed.

Please be advised of the following from the City of Wyandotte Property Maintenance Code:

A site inspection was performed August 19, 2022, revealed that there are violations of the City of Wyandotte Property Maintenance Code on the exterior of the structures. A check of the records at the Wyandotte Department of Municipal Services shows little electric use and no water use since September 14, 2021. The structure appears to have been vacant for over six (6) months.

Due to the lack of maintenance of the property at 213-215-217 Superior Blvd. as noted by the attached letter, and the lack of occupancy, the undersigned deems the structures to be unsafe, unsanitary and dangerous.

Please be advised of the following from the City of Wyandotte Property Maintenance Code:

Section PM-202.0 General Definitions:

Dangerous Buildings: A building or structure that has 1 or more of the following defects or is in 1 or more of the following conditions:

- A. The building or structure is damaged by fire, wind, or flood, or is dilapidated or deteriorated and becomes an attractive nuisance to children who might play in the building or structure to their danger, or becomes a harbor for vagrants, criminals, or immoral persons, or enables persons to resort to the building or structure for committing a nuisance or an unlawful or immoral act.
- B. A building or structure remains unoccupied for a period of 180 consecutive days or longer, and is not listed as being available for sale, lease, or rent with a real estate broker licensed under Article 25 of the occupational code, Act. No. 299 of the Public Acts of 1980, being sections 339.2501 to 339.2515 of the Michigan Compiled Laws. For purposes of this subdivision, "building or structure" includes, but is not limited to, a commercial building or structure. This subdivision does not apply to either of the following:

- (i) A building or structure as to which the owner or agent does both of the following:
 - (a) Notifies a local law enforcement agency in whose jurisdiction the building or structure is located that the building oar structure will remain unoccupied for a period of 180 consecutive days. The notice shall be given to the local law enforcement agency by the owner or agent not more than 30 days after the building or structure becomes unoccupied.
 - (b) Maintains the exterior of the building or structure and adjoining grounds in accordance with the BOCA National Property Maintenance Code 1990 and amendments adopted by the City of Wyandotte.
- (ii) A secondary dwelling of the owner that is regularly unoccupied for a period of 180 days or longer each year, if the owner notifies a local law enforcement agency in whose jurisdiction the dwelling is located that the dwelling will remain unoccupied for a period of 180 consecutive days or mor3e each year. An owner who has given the notice prescribed by this sub paragraph shall notify the law enforcement agency not more than 30 days after the dwelling no longer qualifies for this exception. As used in this sub paragraph "secondary dwelling" means a dwelling such as a vacation home, hunting cabin, or summer home, that is occupied by the owner or a member of the owner's family during part of a year.

Due to the above referenced unsafe and unsanitary conditions and lack of occupancy, the undersigned has determined that the dwellings are unsafe, unsanitary and dangerous, and deems the dwellings uninhabitable and condemns the structures in accordance with Section PM-108.0 Unsafe Structures and Equipment and Section PM-108.1.3 Structures unfit for human occupancy of the Wyandotte Property Maintenance Code. Be advised of Section PM-108.5 Prohibited Occupancy, which states in part, anyone who occupies the premise, or any owner or person responsible for the premise who shall let anyone occupy it, shall be liable for the penalties provided by this Code. The dwelling CANNOT be occupied by any person(s) until the violations have been corrected and a confirming inspection made by the Department of Engineering and Building.

Further, in accordance with "Abandoned Residential Structure", of Chapter 170 "Building Regulations" of the City of Wyandotte's Code of Ordinances, this dwelling is deemed to be an abandoned residential structure. You must register the property in accordance with § 170.112 and § 170.113 Registration of the Ordinance. If you fail to do so by September 19, 2022, you will be subjected to the violations and penalties as set forth in § 170.999 Penalty of the Ordinance. Forms can be obtained at Wyandotte City Hall in the Engineering and Building Department.

The hearing was called to order by Mr. Mayhew at 2:00 p.m.

Mr. Mayhew indicated that this hearing is to discuss the condition of the home at 213-215-217 Superior and the lack of maintenance, little or no utility usage indicating the property is vacant, the hole in roof, rodents going in and out of the hole in roof; property is open to the elements, missing gutters, windows not maintained, dormers in need of repair.

Mr. Mayhew indicated that notices have been sent to the property owner via certified mail and first-class mail and a show cause hearing was held on August 16, 2022, with no response from the property owner.

Mr. Mayhew indicated for the record that the owner nor a representative of the owner were present that this hearing.

The following neighbors were present:

Megan Stone, 214 Superior, Wyandotte Teri and Jim Skolasinski, 219 Superior, Wyandotte Kelly Sharpy, 2720 2nd Street, Wyandotte Barbara, 341 Superior, Wyandotte Andrew Johns, House sitter for Mr. and Mrs. Skolasinski

Ms. Stone indicated that she lives across the street from the home at 213-217 Superior and she is concerned about the condition of the home since it is open and animals are getting in it. Ms. Stone further indicated that the homes on that side of the street are very close together and she is afraid if it caught fire the whole block would go up. Ms. Stone further indicated that she is concerned that this property is bringing down the value of the properties on her block.

Ms. Sharpy indicated that she owns the property at 2720 2nd Street her rear property line backs up to the side property line of 213-217 Superior. Ms. Sharpy indicated that there is an extra-large tree in the back yard of 213-217 Superior that is dropping dead branches on her roof causing damage. Ms. Sharpy further indicated that she has seen raccoons and possums going in and out of the home and the animals are climbing onto to her roof from the tree. Ms. Sharpy further stated that she has seen holes in the rear of 213-217 Superior that look like rat holes.

Mr. Mayhew asked Ms. Sharpy if she tried to talk to the property owner at 213-217 Superior.

Ms. Sharpy indicated yes, but he is not an easy man to talk to. Ms. Sharpy further indicated that he is very confrontational. Ms. Sharpy further indicated that since she put up a camera on her property, he does not come by her property.

Mr. DiSanto asked when was the last time she has seen the property owner of 213-217 Superior.

Ms. Sharpy indicated probably 1 ½ years ago. Ms. Sharpy indicated that the tenant moved out about 2 years ago and the property has been totally vacant for at least 1 ½ years.

Mrs. Skolasinski indicated that she lives next door to 213-217 Superior. Mrs. Skolasinski indicated that there is a hole in the roof and it is getting bigger and bigger and raccoons are coming and going out of the hole day and night. Mrs. Skolasinski further stated that there is a large tree in the rear yard that she is

afraid it will come down on the power line causing a fire. Mrs. Skolasinski further stated that birds are going in and out of the holes in the roof too. Mrs. Skolasinski stated that there is a hole on the east side of home too.

Mr. DiSanto asked if she was talking about the hole by the chimney.

Mrs. Skolasinski stated that there are two (2) holes in the roof, one on the west side and one on the east side by the chimney. Mrs. Skolasinski stated that the property owner did try to fix the hole on the east side with a large patch but it did not work.

Mrs. Skolasinski stated that the rear home has been empty for about 3 years and there are big gaps in the foundation and the shingles are coming off the roof hitting their home at 219 Superior. Mrs. Skolasinski further stated that animals are getting into that home also.

Mrs. Skolasinski stated that the property owner of 213-217 Superior is very difficult to deal with and she would just like to see the property maintained and safe.

Mr. DiSanto confirmed that there has been little or no contact by the neighbors with the owner of 213-217 Superior for about one year.

Mrs. Skolasinski stated that the owner comes and cuts the grass and then just leaves. Mrs. Skolasinski stated that the property has been vacant for about 1 year.

Mr. Mayhew indicated that the City has posted the home that the structure was unsafe, unsanitary and dangerous several times but the property owner removes the postings.

Mrs. Skolasinski confirmed that the postings are gone.

Mr. Skolasinski stated that he is concerned about the safety of his home since it is only 5 feet away from the property at 213-217 Superior. Mr. Skolasinski stated that the tree limbs are in the power lines and if they snap, it could cause a fire and their home would be go up in flames.

Mr. Skolasinski further stated that the shingles on the rear home are falling off and damaging his siding. Mr. Skolasinski continued that it is a constant battle with the property owner to maintain his property, the property is being neglected. Mr. Skolasinski stated that the owner comes on Sunday to cut the grass and then leaves.

Mr. DiSanto asked if the neighbors have seen any vagrants, criminals or immoral persons around the property.

Neighbors indicated no.

Mr. Skolasinski stated that he purchased his property at 219 Superior in 1975 and since then the roof at 213-219 Superior has never been replaced and you can see that the singles are deteriorated and falling off.

Mrs. Skolasinski indicated that there has been a dead branch and a pile of yard waste in the rear yard that has been there for a while.

Barb indicated that Mr. and Mrs. Skolasinski watch her dog and she is concerned when her dog is at their home that there are rodents coming from the home at 213-219 Superior and her dog could get bit.

Andrew Johns indicated that the house sits for Mr. and Mrs. Skolasinski and over the years he can see the deterioration of the home at 213-217 Superior. Mr. Johns stated that the home at 213-217 Superior is the worst home on the block, the dormers have holes, roof is in bad shape, animals are getting into the home as evidence of the pictures Mr. and Mrs. Skolasinski have sent to the city.

Mr. Skolasinski indicated that the previous owners of 213-217 Superior took really good care of the home, but the owner now just does not care.

Mrs. Skolasinski further indicated that she talked to the tenant that use to live there and she indicated that there is water damage in the home and the basement leaked and has water in it. Mrs. Skolasinski stated the tenant would not even go into the basement to get her items when she moved out, she just left them.

Mrs. Skolasinski stated that there has always been a hole in the rear of the building, not sure what caused it.

Mrs. Roberts asked when was the last time the neighbors saw the owner of 213-217 Superior at the property.

Mrs. Skolasinski stated that she saw him a couple of weeks ago, he cut the grass, but he would never go into the home. Mrs. Skolasinski stated further that he does not stay long.

Mrs. Skolasinski stated that she does see rats coming from the home.

Mr. Mayhew thanked the neighbors for coming to the hearing.

Mr. DiSanto asked the neighbors to be patient with the city, the show cause hearing process does take some time.

Mr. Mayhew recommended that the property owner be given 30 days from the date of this hearing to correct the property maintenance issues in the letter dated August 19, 2022, which includes the trimming or removal of the dead tree in the rear yard. Mr. Mayhew continued that if the violations are not corrected, the matter would be referred to the City Council for demolition.

Mr. DiSanto concurred with the recommendation of Mr. Mayhew.

The hearing was closed at 2:35 p.m.

A site inspection was performed March 16, 2022, revealed that there are violations of the City of Wyandotte Property Maintenance Code on the exterior of the structure. A check of the records at the Wyandotte Department of Municipal Services shows little electric use and no water use since September 14, 2021. The structure appears to have been vacant for over six (6) months.

Due to the lack of maintenance of the property at 213-215-217 Superior Blvd. as noted by the attached letter, and the lack of occupancy, the undersigned deems the structures to be unsafe and dangerous.

Please be advised of the following from the City of Wyandotte Property Maintenance Code:

Section PM-202.0 General Definitions:

Dangerous Buildings: A building or structure that has 1 or more of the following defects or is in 1 or more of the following conditions:

- A. The building or structure is damaged by fire, wind, or flood, or is dilapidated or deteriorated and becomes an attractive nuisance to children who might play in the building or structure to their danger, or becomes a harbor for vagrants, criminals, or immoral persons, or enables persons to resort to the building or structure for committing a nuisance or an unlawful or immoral act.
- B. A building or structure remains unoccupied for a period of 180 consecutive days or longer, and is not listed as being available for sale, lease, or rent with a real estate broker licensed under Article 25 of the occupational code, Act. No. 299 of the Public Acts of 1980, being sections 339.2501 to 339.2515 of the Michigan Compiled Laws. For purposes of this subdivision, "building or structure" includes, but is not limited to, a commercial building or structure. This subdivision does not apply to either of the following:

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 Equal Housing Opportunity

- (i) A building or structure as to which the owner or agent does both of the following:
 - (a) Notifies a local law enforcement agency in whose jurisdiction the building or structure is located that the building oar structure will remain unoccupied for a period of 180 consecutive days. The notice shall be given to the local law enforcement agency by the owner or agent not more than 30 days after the building or structure becomes unoccupied.
 - (b) Maintains the exterior of the building or structure and adjoining grounds in accordance with the BOCA National Property Maintenance Code 1990 and amendments adopted by the City of Wyandotte.
- (ii) A secondary dwelling of the owner that is regularly unoccupied for a period of 180 days or longer each year, if the owner notifies a local law enforcement agency in whose jurisdiction the dwelling is located that the dwelling will remain unoccupied for a period of 180 consecutive days or mor3e each year. An owner who has given the notice prescribed by this sub paragraph shall notify the law enforcement agency not more than 30 days after the dwelling no longer qualifies for this exception. As used in this sub paragraph "secondary dwelling" means a dwelling such as a vacation home, hunting cabin, or summer home, that is occupied by the owner or a member of the owner's family during part of a year.

You are hereby directed to correct the noted violations, maintain the exterior of the property, occupy and/or list the structure with a real estate broker in accordance with Section <u>PM-202.0</u> referenced above. Should you elect to rent or sell this property, an Upon Sale or Rental Inspection is required according to the City of Wyandotte Code of Ordinances § 171.004 and § 181.020. The inspection and fee can be arranged and paid for at City Hall in the Department of Engineering and Building.

Failure to correct the cited violations, maintain and occupy the structure by April 18, 2022, will result in this Department proceeding with Section PM-106.0 Violations. You also have the right to seek modification or withdrawal of this notice by requesting a Show Cause Hearing.

Further, in accordance with "Abandoned Residential Structure", of Chapter 170 "Building Regulations" of the City of Wyandotte's Code of Ordinances, this dwelling is deemed to be an abandoned residential structure. You must register the property in accordance with § 170.112 and § 170.113 Registration of the Ordinance. If you fail to do so by April 18, 2022, you will be subjected to the violations and penalties as set forth in § 170.999 Penalty of the Ordinance. Forms can be obtained at Wyandotte City Hall in the Engineering and Building Department.



Mr. Atty stated yes, they feel that keeping that building and constructing outbuildings will help will attract a tenant in existing building.

Commissioner Williams asked about the inside storage that was shown on the concept drawings submitted.

Mr. Atty stated Safe Spot Storage is his company and it might go in at that location sometime in the future.

Ms. Tuxbury asked if the residents would get another notice when they have a tenant.

Commissioner Sarnacki indicated that as of now they are just asking for rezoning, they are not asking for approval of any uses. Commissioner Sarnacki further indicated that when they have a tenant the neighbors will be notified.

Ms. Tuxbury asked what is the difference of PD and business.

Commissioner Duran indicated that changing the zoning to PD will allow the city and neighborhood input. Commissioner Duran further indicated that if it stays business anything allowed in business district could go in there without any input of the residents or the city.

Ms. Linda Dinard, 4014 23rd Street, stated that she is concerned with the property values going down if a strip mall is constructed and she would like to see that the residents are considered.

Mr. Atty stated that their plan is not to affect the neighborhood in any way.

Ms. Dinard stated that a lot needs to be considered before rezoning the property.

Commissioner Duran stated that the Commission is just considering rezoning the property, not the uses.

Ms. Dinard asked why rezone if they have a plan already.

Commissioner Sarnacki indicated that they do not have a plan. Commissioner Sarnacki stated that when they do have a plan and/or tenant they will come back to the Commissioner for approval.

Ms. Dinard stated that the property has been in bad shape for years and has not been taken care of.

Mr. Atty stated that they purchased the property 3 years ago and they are having a problem securing a tenant that is why they are looking for the property to be rezoned.

Ms. Dinard stated that she is concerned on how this will affect property values, traffic in the area (23rd Street is already busy) and stated that there are a lot of children in the area.

Mr. Rakoczy, 3922 22nd Street stated that he lives behind the building and would like to see something be done with the alley and the sewers both need to be replaced.

Mr. Rakoczy stated further that he is concerned with the rezoning to add more flexibility to improve what on the property and that he did not understand construction of outbuildings on the site.

Commissioner Duran stated that their concept is to build two (2) building closer to Fort Street. Commissioner Duran stated further that tonight the Commission is just considering the rezoning of the property.

Mr. Rakoczy stated further that he feels there are 3 issues that need to be looked at; alley and sewer behind the building need to be fixed; lighting needs to be looked at, it currently shines into the neighbors back yards; some type of solid fence needs to be constructed the length of the property.

Mr. Atty stated that he wants to work with the residents and the city and when they have a tenant these items can be resolved.

Mr. Daly stated that when he developed the property on Eureka and Fort Street, it is zoned PD and they held public hearings and he worked with the City and the residents as to where the entrances would be located, requirement of a brick wall, and landscaping so the project was not intrusive to the neighborhood on 23rd Street.

Mr. Daly stated further that he knows of Mr. Atty and investors are not investing money on properties on Fort Street and that rezoning the property to PD will be the best for the city and the residents.

There being no further discussion, the hearing was closed.

No communications were received regarding this request.



Vice-Chairperson Lupo opened the hearing and asked if there was anyone present who wished to speak about this hearing.

Ferris Atty, Wyandotte Crossings, LLC, owner present.

Mr. Atty indicated that they are looking to rezone the property for more flexibility to advertise the property. Mr. Atty further indicated that they have owned the property for 3 years and have not been successful in getting any tenants.

Vice-Chairperson Lupo asked if they would be rental units.

Mr. Atty indicated yes, for business.

Catherine Tuxbury, 4024 23rd Street, Wyandotte. Ms. Tuxbury stated that they are asking for flexibility, but what exactly are they going to put in there, have they looked at how it will affect the residential properties adjacent to the property that is rezoned.

Mr. Atty stated at this time, they have no tenants in mind. Mr. Atty continued that they are planning to build outbuildings closer to Fort Street and that will make the existing building more attractive. Mr. Atty stated that they will keep in mind the neighborhoods when looking at tenants for the space.

Commissioner Williams asked if the existing building will be staying.

Mr. Atty stated yes, they feel that keeping that building and constructing outbuildings will help will attract a tenant in existing building.

Commissioner Williams asked about the inside storage that was shown on the concept drawings submitted.

Mr. Atty stated Safe Spot Storage is his company and it might go in at that location sometime in the future.

Ms. Tuxbury asked if the residents would get another notice when they have a tenant.

Commissioner Sarnacki indicated that as of now they are just asking for rezoning, they are not asking for approval of any uses. Commissioner Sarnacki further indicated that when they have a tenant the neighbors will be notified.

Ms. Tuxbury asked what is the difference of PD and business.

Commissioner Duran indicated that changing the zoning to PD will allow the city and neighborhood input. Commissioner Duran further indicated that if it stays business anything allowed in business district could go in there without any input of the residents or the city.

Ms. Linda Dinard, 4014 23rd Street, stated that she is concerned with the property values going down if a strip mall is constructed and she would like to see that the residents are considered.

Mr. Atty stated that their plan is not to affect the neighborhood in any way.

Ms. Dinard stated that a lot needs to be considered before rezoning the property.

Commissioner Duran stated that the Commission is just considering rezoning the property, not the uses.

Ms. Dinard asked why rezone if they have a plan already.

Commissioner Sarnacki indicated that they do not have a plan. Commissioner Sarnacki stated that when they do have a plan and/or tenant they will come back to the Commissioner for approval.

Ms. Dinard stated that the property has been in bad shape for years and has not been taken care of.

Mr. Atty stated that they purchased the property 3 years ago and they are having a problem securing a tenant that is why they are looking for the property to be rezoned.

Ms. Dinard stated that she is concerned on how this will affect property values, traffic in the area (23rd Street is already busy) and stated that there are a lot of children in the area.

Mr. Rakoczy, 3922 22nd Street stated that he lives behind the building and would like to see something be done with the alley and the sewers both need to be replaced.

Mr. Rakoczy stated further that he is concerned with the rezoning to add more flexibility to improve what on the property and that he did not understand construction of outbuildings on the site.

Commissioner Duran stated that their concept is to build two (2) building closer to Fort Street. Commissioner Duran stated further that tonight the Commission is just considering the rezoning of the property.

Mr. Rakoczy stated further that he feels there are 3 issues that need to be looked at; alley and sewer behind the building need to be fixed; lighting needs to be looked at, it currently shines into the neighbors back yards; some type of solid fence needs to be constructed the length of the property.

Mr. Atty stated that he wants to work with the residents and the city and when they have a tenant these items can be resolved.

Mr. Daly stated that when he developed the property on Eureka and Fort Street, it is zoned PD and they held public hearings and he worked with the City and the residents as to where the entrances would be located, requirement of a brick wall, and landscaping so the project was not intrusive to the neighborhood on 23rd Street.

Mr. Daly stated further that he knows of Mr. Atty and investors are not investing money on properties on Fort Street and that rezoning the property to PD will be the best for the city and the residents.

There being no further discussion, the hearing was closed.

No communications were received regarding this request.

Public Hearing #09202022 Request of Iven Sharrak, Owner and Appellant, has applied for Stage I Site Plan review for a new gas station and convenience store at 2000 Biddle Avenue, Wyandotte, Michigan.

Mr. Fleis further requested that the commission approve the 27 parking spaces on the site which includes 8 at the pumps.

Commissioner Duran indicated that the commission does have the authority to approve the 27 parking spots.

4. FLOCK Automatic License Plate Reader System

The FLOCK automatic license plate reader system consists of pole mounted devices which can be solar powered or hooked up directly to an electrical outlet. It is an additional law enforcement tool that takes pictures of vehicles and their license plates when said vehicle crosses its path. For example, if officers were looking for a specific vehicle with some distinct features, the FLOCK system can send an alert to dispatchers when that kind of vehicle, or license plate number, is photographed at a particular location. The dispatchers can then send out a radio broadcast for officers to follow up on / pursue.

The Chief would like to acquire 8 of these reader systems and disperse them throughout our community at key locations.

These readers are gaining popularity in neighboring communities and all of us can benefit from their installation since there can be a sharing of information amongst the communities to catch the suspected criminals.

The company that sells these devices is responsible for maintaining them.

There is already a specific line item in the current budget to cover the cost of the system / readers.

Harris moved, Heck seconded, CARRIED, to approve the purchase of eight FLOCK Automatic License Plate Reader units.

5. Request to Hire Full-Time Dispatcher – Isabella Buentello

One of the full-time dispatchers recently resigned due to relocating her place of residence. This resignation left a full-time position open, and Chief Zalewski recommended Isabella Buentello, a current part-time employee, to fill that position. She is a very good dispatcher and expressed an interest in becoming full-time.

Former Superintendent James Knopp and Superintendent Sheryl Riley discussed with Commission:

City Attorney Bill Look: In regards to discussion on vehicles in city parks. City Attorney Bill Look responded with documentation from Michigan Legislature – Section 257.626 stating if a person drives in an area disregarding the safety of persons they could be prosecuted.

Wyandotte Shores Golf Course: Correspondence on golf course comparison rates was passed out to Commission. Former Superintendent Knopp also stated a uniform rate for golf outings would be implemented for the 2023 season because there were too many price inconsistencies in the 2022 season. Shotgun starts would be 8 am which would eliminate blocking off several t-times for outings during the latter part of the morning and early afternoon which results in loss of revenue.

Meeting: On Monday, October 10th Superintendent Riley, Commissioner Merritt, Former Superintendent James Knopp & Mayor Rob DeSana met in Mayor DeSana's Conference Room at City Hall and discussed several items. Commissioner Merritt addressed a few of those items with Commission this evening. "With having a new Superintendent, now is the time to review and restart programs for the kids", Commissioner Merritt stated. He discussed pricing at Yack arena for hockey and skating. Currently Roosevelt High School does not pay for practices during any given hockey season, only games while other teams pay for both practices and games. Commissioner Merritt suggested Roosevelt High School pay for practice time, but President Desana stated "We need the schools and we have to work together". President DeSana also mentioned a verbal agreement has been in place for many, many years regarding a discount on ice time for Roosevelt High School and in return the Recreation Department would be able to access and use facilities at Jo Brighton, Elementary schools throughout the city, Wilson Middle School and Roosevelt High School pool. President DeSana recommended Superintendent Riley to research and inquire about ice time, high school usage and if recreation departments in other cities use their city high schools for recreation programs. She is to report her findings to Commission at a future meeting.

Commissioner Merritt then discussed ball fields and how much maintenance time is needed to prep ball fields during a season. He stated additional help from Wyandotte Public Schools should be provided to help Recreation crew during spring and summer months. President DeSana suggested Superintendent Riley write a financial report on field supplies and employee wages. Commission also recommended Superintendent Riley set up a meeting with Dr. Cost in the near future.

Former Superintendent Knopp closed out the discussion stating "We have been very successful as a department and as a city working together for a very long time. The pool and gyms are worth so much to us, it is an equitable deal".

Keys: Former Superintendent Knopp discussed keys are everywhere and many patrons have access to areas they shouldn't. Keys have been an ongoing issue because copies are made or someone forgets to bring them back. There has been discussion about card swipe pads being installed at Yack Arena which help to eliminate the key problem there.

November Commission Meeting: Commission discussed and changed the November 8th meeting (due to election) to Wednesday, November 9th @ 5:30 pm.

There being no further business to discuss, a motion was made by Commissioner Merritt and supported by Secretary Jagiello to adjourn the meeting at 6:28 pm.
