









1. OUR HISTORIC DOWNTOWN

Incorporated in 1867, the city of Wyandotte is often described as the "Heart of Downriver." The site where Wyandotte sits today was, in the 1700s, a village for the Native American tribe known as the Wyandot, a part of the Huron Nation. A waterfront community, Wyandotte is rich in history and is known for its distinctive architecture, charming downtown district

and variety of cultural offerings.

2. FIND ART IN WYANDOTTE!

Wyandotte is well known for its numerous community events, festivals, and our annual Wyandotte Street Art Fair. The event traces its history to 1961 when a handful of artists from the Acanthus Art Society exhibited their work in front of a local downtown business. From these humble beginnings, the Wyandotte Street Art Fair has grown to be one of the largest and best-attended fairs in the state. ART is one of the earliest creative images representing the fair. ART's likeness was rediscovered on an early Street Art Fair poster in the archival collections of the Wyandotte Museums. Originally a stylized line drawing, ART represents a true piece of Wyandotte history! When ART first made his debut in Wyandotte, it was 1964 and the Street Fair was only three years old. ART is fun, funky, and creative, encapsulating the spirit of our fair. Every year, ART gets a new interpretation by a regional artist, so stay tuned for what he will look like this year!

3. SPLISH, SPLASH

Wyandotte is a waterfront community. Get out there and boat, kayak, or fish! Whatever you choose to do here in Wyandotte, make sure to have fun while doing it!

4. CITY OF FESTIVALS!

Wyandotte is known for our many events that take place throughout the year: The holiday festivities, Wyandotte Third Fridays, the Independence Day parade. Visit our downtown and have a fun and festive time!

A BIT OF WYANDOTTE HISTORY...

The area that became the city of Wyandotte was first settled in 1732 by a branch of the Huron Tribe known as the Wyandots. The Wyandots first arrived from Ontario, Canada when their French allies founded Detroit. The Wyandots followed the Detroit River 10 miles to the south and founded a village named Maguagua.

The first permanent non-native settler in the area was Major John Biddle. He was an officer in the U.S. Army during the War of 1812 and a mayor of the city of Detroit. His land was located in the area of Biddle and Vinewood Avenues. He named his farm "The Wyandotte" after his neighbors to the south. When other settlers came to the area they started to refer to the area as Wyandotte. It is from Biddle's farm that the city of Wyandotte derives its name.

December 12, 1854 marks the date of the founding of the Village of Wyandotte, which coincides with the founding of Wyandotte's first industry, Eureka Iron Works. On May 26, 1865, Eureka Iron Works was the first mill in the United States to produce steel using the Bessemer Process. This method was the foundation of the industrial revolution and the key to making high-quality steel in large quantities. Unfortunately, Eureka Iron Works suffered a boiler explosion and fire in 1888, from which it never recovered.

The Village of Wyandotte officially became the City of Wyandotte on April 8, 1867. A few years after that event, in 1871, the Wyandotte Shipyards started operation. The shipyards produced many hulls, including the famous and speedy passenger boat, the Tashmoo, and the Columbia, one of the Boblo boats. The Shipyard remained in operation until 1922.

In the early 1890s, a man named Captain J.B. Ford traveled to Wyandotte to investigate the reports of salt deposits found here. Captain Ford was interested in the salt to produce soda ash, a chemical necessary in the manufacture of plate glass. Having found salt in sufficient quality and quantity, Ford created the Michigan Alkali Company to process the chemicals he needed. In addition, he started the J.B. Ford Company to further process the soda ash into various soaps and cleansers sold commercially. These and other chemical plants have

formed a lasting industry in Wyandotte that continues to this day. In 1969, the chemical giant BASF purchased the Michigan Alkali Company and the J.B. Ford Company (which merged in the 1930s) when they went public with their stock. BASF continues operations in Wyandotte to this day.

As the other communities of southern suburban Detroit have grown around it, Wyandotte's riverfront and other charms continually draw people from all over the world. Over the years, Wyandotte has mirrored the rest of the country with several waves of immigrant populations moving into the area seeking jobs and community. Much of the city's culture is influenced by the German, Irish, Italian, and Polish immigrants.

The city has several festivals during the year, including the Independence Day Parade, the Heritage Event Series (highlighting culture and history), the Wyandotte Street Art Fair (the second largest in the state), and Skip Clack's Fishing Derby. Also found in the city are many art studios, galleries and boutiques. There have been many local visual and performing arts groups in Wyandotte since its inception. Currently, the Acanthus Art Society is the oldest, having been established in 1932. The City also owns a cultural campus, which includes the Wyandotte Museums. The museums consist of three homes restored to a periodappropriate look.

Wyandotte, which is located 10 miles south of Detroit along the Detroit River, is a community of about 28,000 residents. With a municipally owned water and power plant, the City has the capacity to provide all needed services to businesses and residents.

As the City moves forward, it remains committed to preserving the past and celebrating the unique culture and history that make up the city of Wyandotte.

Strong beliefs, principles guide local insurance agent in serving his own

tate Farm agent Steve Vargo has served the Wyandotte area for four years, and has nothing but good things to say about the community.

"I think it's on the rise," Vargo said. "I think they do a good job of bringing people in and promoting themselves."

Originally from Grosse Ile, Vargo has lived in Wyandotte since 1996, when he bought a lot in the city and built a house on it. He has been involved in financial services his entire career, adding up to about 20 years of experience.

"I was a stock broker for about eight years out of college," Vargo said.



After some time spent working in the family business of vending machines, Vargo got back into the financial business in 2006. He spent time as a financial advisor and as a banker, working for Chase Bank and Fifth Third Bank during that time. Six years ago, he joined State Farm. It was that opportunity that launched him on the path to where he is today.

"There was a State Farm office opening in Wyandotte, only about a mile and a half from my home," Vargo explained.



WALK, RUN, PLAY!

BISHOP PARK

Bishop Park is situated along the Detroit River and is contiguous to the Wyandotte Central Business District. The 12.2-acre park is the second largest of the 13 parks in the city. The park offers excellent fishing opportunities from its large fishing pier. The park also features a concession stand (hours vary) with an open-air wood deck picnic area, umbrellas, restrooms, two large picnic shelters, playground equipment and basketball courts. Bishop Park is the site for various city events, including the Children's Fishing Derby and various concerts throughout the summer. The picnic shelters may be used by the public. However, they may not be reserved in advance and are first-come, first-serve. Temporary event tents are permitted in the park, however, due to the sprinkler system, they may not be attached with stakes. If anchoring is required, please use sand bags or water barrels.

LOCATION:

Along the Detroit River on Van Alstyne from Elm Street to Vinewood.

PARK HOURS AND RULES:

6:00 a.m. – 10:00 p.m., year-round. Pets, bikes, skateboards and rollerblades are not permitted in the park. Alcohol is not permitted in the park. Fishing is permitted only on the pier during times noted.

BASF PARK

BASF Waterfront Park is located along the Detroit River, just south of Eureka Road. The 20-acre park is the largest in the city, and features a romantic brick promenade, lookout decks, rowing launch, trails, sand volleyball courts and an amphitheater. BASF Waterfront Park hosts several entertainment events throughout the year. Notable events include the Hebda Cup and Wyandotte High School rowing regattas.

LOCATION:

Along the Detroit River just south of Eureka Road.

PARK HOURS AND RULES:

6:00 a.m. – 10:00 p.m., year-round. Pets, bikes, skateboards and rollerblades are not permitted in the park. Alcohol is not permitted in any city park.

PUBLIC ART


The Gwen Frostic Sculpture sits in Frostic Field, located just behind the Copeland Center at 4th and Mulberry Streets. The sculpture was given to the city of Wyandotte by Western Michigan University and was dedicated on April 26, 2009. WMU has honored our city and memorialized Ms. Frostic with the gift of this fabulous sculpture, which melds Gwen's metal work with her delicate prints of Michigan's flora and fauna.

The Wyandots – A Family Tribute was dedicated to the city of Wyandotte in 2000. The sculpture sits in BASF Park, near Wyandotte Shores Golf Course. The sculpture was created by Michaele Duffy Kramer and is made of bronze. The sculpture is modeled after a Native American family, and depicts items that are essential to their survival: corn, beans, squash, as well as tobacco, sage, sweet grass and cedar.





The Wyandot Totem Pole was carved by Gordon Watkins and is constructed of cedar. It was donated by Wyandotte Savings Bank to commemorate the city's 100th anniversary in 1971. The totem pole sits at the southwest corner of Eureka and Biddle Avenues near the fountain. A large turtle sits atop the pole that represents Chief Walk-in-the-Water's family totem. Five other figures tell the story of the Wyandot that settled in this area: an Iroquois warrior, the crest of French explorer Antoine de la Mothe Cadillac, a beaver, a whitefish and the figure of a Wyandot clutching a canoe paddle.





The World War I Memorial is located on Superior Boulevard iust east of Biddle Avenue and was dedicated to the city in 1923. The boulder and bronze tablet lists the names of those who lost their lives in World War I. Two cannons also sit on the site of the memorial.





The Veterans Memorial is constructed of black granite and flanked by flags. The Wyandotte **Veterans Memorial Committee** spearheaded the construction of the memorial, located in Bishop Park. It was designed by Mike Miller, the winner of a design competition held


for the project.



The Purple Heart Memorial was designed and sculpted by Isadore DeBiasi of River Rouge. It was originally dedicated by Michigan Governor Harry Kelly in 1943. The statue is a testament to the sacrifice of Michigan servicemen and women. Wyandotte has the distinguished honor of being the first city in the country to which the National Military Order of the Purple Heart commissioned and donated a monument of this type. The Wyandotte Beautification Commission and local veterans worked together from 2007-2010 to raise funds to bronze the statue.



Count Casimir Pulaski was cast in concrete and dedicated in 1938. It was shipped to the New York World's Fair in 1939, and remained there until the Detroit Institute of Arts acquired it. It was then given to Wyandotte to be placed in Pulaski Park, which is located on 12th Street south of Walnut. The statue was re-cast in bronze in 1991 and rededicated to the city.





The Looking Forward Statue was donated as a sesquicentennial gift to the city of Wyandotte. The bronze, created by John Pappas of Ypsilanti, was installed in 2000. The sculpture is located in BASF Waterfront Park.

Wheeler's takes care of families like they're family

t's not unusual for Lee Rudd, owner of Wheeler's Complete Auto Care, to work on vehicles from a lot of people in one family. The dad tells his kids, and before you know it, their friends and their families are coming, too.

That's how Rudd's business has grown exponentially. The customers become a village of people who depend on Wheeler's on Fort Street in Wyandotte. Rudd has owned the repair shop with his wife Kathy since 2010, providing all kinds of auto repairs from brakes, shocks and struts to alignments, hoses and air conditioning issues. They also offer diagnostic services for the trickier problems. The only thing they don't do is body work.

Rudd tells stories about his customers and their cars and each one seems just as important to him as the next.

"One gentleman lives in Lincoln Park and he's a Vietnam war veteran," Rudd said. "He brings his car, his wife's car, his son-in-law's car, his son's car, his son's girlfriend's car and his granddaughter's car."

Seen it all

Second to brake replacements, Rudd said, most people come in because their vehicles just aren't running right – it's

overheating or has a leak. Having been in the auto repair business for 34 years, he's seen just about every possible problem.

His best advice to vehicle owners is to get oil changes every three months or 3,000 miles.

"If you come in for an oil change, we look it over," Rudd said. "A lot could happen, a leak could develop, anything."

The biggest mistake people make is taking their vehicles to backyard mechanics or trying to diagnose their car's

problem by going on Google, which isn't "the best place to find your answer," he added. "They can go to a backyard mechanic, but it will probably end up costing them more money," Rudd said. "Monday morning, we're fixing what the backyard mechanic messed up."

Rudd said he likes to provide his customers with the extra care, like replacing a light bulb or installing wiper blades for free.

"I'll plug a hole in a tire and they'll say, 'I'm bringing the car in next week for an oil change,' so I just add it on to that bill," he said. "I believe I do more customer service than most."

Sometimes customers will call and explain what's going on with their vehicles to try and figure out what's happening.

"I'll give them an idea and tell them it could be the radiator, a hose or a water pump," Rudd said. "But you have to look at it to be sure. I give a fair estimate. I'm not the most expensive around and I'm

> not the cheapest. I do fair quality work at a fair quality price. I'm here to take care of my customers. That way they'll trust me

and they'll keep coming back here no matter what they need."

Rudd and Kathy have been married 34 years and they have six boys and one girl. Rudd said he understands what it means to stretch the family budget. He treats his customers as if he was spending his own money.

"I try to spread their paycheck as far as I can," Rudd said. "I'll say, 'You need this now, but you can wait a month or two to do that."



TELECOMMUNICATION SERVICES

The Wyandotte Municipal Services telecommunications utility was created by local residents in 1981 when voters demonstrated their confidence in the department's ability by approving an ordinance to place the implementation, construction and operation of the new cable television system under the auspices of the Municipal Services Department.

In 1983, the department installed the cable infrastructure throughout the city and began offering basic cable television services. Since 1983, we have developed the limited basic cable television system into a full broadband telecommunications system offering a wide selection of cable television services from digital to high definition programming to full feature, internet connected, advanced cable box service as well as Turbo High Speed Broadband Internet and Digital Phone services. In 1999, the cable infrastructure was rebuilt and upgrades to existing services, enhancements and additional service offerings are continually being introduced. Today, the telecommunications utility serves approximately 5,700 cable television subscribers, 5,600 high-speed internet subscribers and 1,000 digital phone subscribers with annual revenues of approximately \$10 million.

Wyandotte Municipal Services telecommunications system (Wyandotte Cable) offers competitive television programming selections, Vu-It TiVo advanced cable box services, Turbo High Speed internet packages and residential and business digital phone service with unlimited local and long-distance calling,

all with state-of-the-art technology and outstanding customer service.

The utility contributes 5 percent of its gross revenue to the City's general fund and supports a cable television studio where public access, local access and government programming is produced almost exclusively in high definition format. In 1999, when the cable telecommunications system was rebuilt, it consisted of over 3,000 strand miles of fiberoptic lines and 72 miles of coaxial cable.

Technology and advanced equipment upgrades are continually being implemented. In 2017-18, Wyandotte Cable continued work on its systems, driving fiber deeper into our neighborhoods, installing more fiber optic nodes and upgrading via new equipment and installations in all digital Gig E and ASI signal formats. This allowed for the addition of our new Vu-It TiVo advanced cable box service, many more HD (High Definition) channels, online access to a variety of video programming services and the ability to upgrade internet speeds even more significantly.

Look for those upgrades to continue with even faster internet speeds and greater bandwidth capacity, direct access to online video programming content, additional television programming and other service enhancements that our customers have come to expect.

WATER DEPARTMENT

In early 1889, local residents created the Wyandotte Municipal Water Utility to provide fire protection and have a convenient safe source of drinking water. Today, the municipal water utility serves over 12,000 consumers, has annual revenues of over \$3.5 million and sells over 1.5 billion gallons of water annually.

Wyandotte is the only downriver community that owns and operates a potable water filtration plant. The Wyandotte Municipal Water Plant can produce up to 15 million gallons of water per day. The community's water source is the Detroit River and the treatment process consists of:

- Screening or removing debris
- Adding alum for coagulation of suspended particles
- Adding chlorine for disinfection
- Adding phosphate for stabilization
- Removing all suspended particles through filtration
- Adding fluoride to prevent tooth decay

Our water distribution system consists of 110 miles of water mains ranging from 4 inches to 30 inches in diameter. Fire protection is provided by over 850 fire hydrants located throughout the community. The municipal water system has a 500,000-gallon elevated storage tank (water tower) and 4.5 million gallons of ground level storage for peak demand periods such as fighting fires or other emergencies.

ELECTRIC DEPARTMENT

The Wyandotte Electric Light Company was incorporated on September 19, 1889, for the purpose of manufacturing and supplying electricity for light, heat and power.

In 1892, local residents voted to create a community-owned municipal electric utility, which initially provided only street lighting. In 1896, the municipal electric utility began serving retail consumers and for a number of years the municipal electric utility and the Wyandotte Electric Light Company competed locally for consumers.

Today, Wyandotte's municipal electric utility is one of 41 public power systems in Michigan, and one of nearly 2,000 public power systems in the United States. It serves over 12,000 consumers.

Wyandotte Municipal Services's electric department encompasses the power plant production of electricity and the Transmission and Distribution (T&D) side of bringing electricity to residents and businesses located in Wyandotte.

Our municipal electric system has three sources of supply to provide reliable, affordable service. Our electric distribution system consists of 69,000-volt transmission lines and 13,200-volt and 4,800-volt distribution lines. The municipal electric utility also installs, maintains and provides electricity for streetlights throughout the community.

Wyandotte, having its own electric distribution and generation facilities, gives our residents a great advantage when power outages occur. The time to bring our power back online is considerably less than in neighboring communities served by other power utilities. Reliability is our number one priority. All you have to do is ask any Wyandotte citizen about the reliability of Wyandotte electric and you'll generally get the response that there is no better provider of electric services.

> Sobell has assembled a team which includes her son. Michael. and Shelly Wellington, another real estate specialist.


Working with her 21-year-old son has been a blessing for Sobell.

This juvenile diversion program serves not just as an intervention for youth ages 7-16, but also as a prevention program. All services are free and open to Wyandotte's residents. Depending on need and availability, services may include one-to-one mentoring, life skills peer groups, counseling, parenting workshops/support, referrals for outside therapy/treatment, recreational activities, prison visits, court observation, field trips, or tutoring help. Wyandotte youths ages 7-16 years old who are having problems such as school or home truancy, drug or alcohol use, behavioral problems, family conflicts, difficulty dealing with a grief or loss and trouble with law enforcement are eligible for enrollment. Youths are generally referred to us through the schools, police, juvenile courts or parents. The Wyandotte Youth Assistance is always looking for volunteers to mentor our children. If you or someone you know is willing to make a commitment to the program by sharing an hour of your time once a week for a period of six weeks, you may contact us. You must be at least 21 years of age or older with a good driving record. All mentors must meet screening requirements and qualifications, and will be trained at no cost. RICH IN HISTORY

The Wyandotte Museum preserves local culture and helps bring history to life.

The site of this elegant Queen Anne-style mansion, located at 2610 Biddle Avenue, has an important and prominent place in the history of our city long before the current house was built in 1896. The land was originally the homestead of Major John Biddle. Registrar of the Government Land Office, Mayor of Detroit, and trustee of the Michigan University, John Biddle was the first notable American of European descent in the area. Downriver

appealed to Biddle, who thought he could live the life of a gentleman farmer.

Wyandotte was farmland and wooded areas at the time Biddle bought the land in 1818 and built his farm (or. summer estate as he referred to it) on the corner of Biddle and Vinewood. He wanted it to be a retreat from the hustle and bustle of Detroit city life. He named his estate "Wyandotte." The Georgianstyle home was completed in 1835. From 1836 to 1848 Biddle lived in Wyandotte, but ended up selling his estate to the Eureka Iron Company. When the city was established, West Jefferson

was named Biddle in John Biddle's honor, in respect to his reputation and the location of his early estate. His home was moved when construction began on the Ford-MacNichol project.

Completed in 1896, the Ford-MacNichol home was built by Captain John Baptiste Ford and his son Edward as a

wedding gift for Edward's daughter, Laura, and her new husband, George Pope MacNichol. The Fords owned and operated the J.B. Ford and Michigan Alkali Companies – pioneers of the early chemical industry in Wyandotte.

The Ford-MacNichols lived in the home for seven years before they moved to Toledo to be with the rest of their family. At that time, the house was purchased by Jeremiah

Drennan, a local lawyer. The Drennan Family lived here for 60 years, making them the longest private owners. In the 1970s, Yvonne Latta purchased the home and saved it from demolition. She was instrumental in the restoration of the structure, doing much of the work herself. In 1977, the home was purchased by the City with a grant from the Michigan History Division of the Department of State, along with funds provided by the Wyandotte Historical Society, local businesses, civic organizations, and individuals.



The Ford-MacNichol House

is a textbook example of the Queen Anne architectural style of the late 19th century, with influences of the classical revival. Designed by the famed Detroit architectural firm Malcomson and Higginbotham (also responsible for the Old Main building on the campus of Wayne State University and the Ford-Bacon House in Wyandotte), great detail and forethought was taken into consideration in the design and



construction. This is evidenced by the tower with witch's hat roof, projecting gables, wrap-around porch and elaborate decorative trim.

Much of the interior is also original. The 6,600-squarefoot home has 32 rooms and 11 closets. It was considered to be the height of technology at the time with indoor plumbing, a coal furnace with gravity duct system, speaking tubes, and both gas and electric lighting. There are 6 fireplaces, 65 windows and 53 doors. This elaborate and inspiring building represents the grandeur and promise of Wyandotte's past and future. The Ford-MacNichol House is on the State and National Register of Historic Places.

Guided tours of the Ford-MacNichol House are conducted Thursday-Sunday, 1-5:00 p.m., March-December.

Weddings in Victorian Splendor

The Wyandotte Museum provides an alternative site for small weddings and is very flexible to meet your needs.
Ceremonies can take place in the parlor, foyer, or the porch, depending on the size of your party. We also offer a dressing room for the bride and her party in our second-floor master bedroom.

Due to special exhibits installed at the museum for the Halloween and Christmas holiday seasons, the museum is not available for wedding rentals from mid-September through mid-January. However, the museum is available for photo sessions year-round, and the special holiday exhibits prove an even more unique backdrop for your photos. We advise you to visit the museum prior to booking, so staff can discuss and show you how the exhibits are arranged during that time.

Frontier Style along the Waterfront

The rustic cabin standing in Wyandotte's historic Bishop Park was built in 1942 to serve as a meeting place for the city's senior citizens. This building was the headquarters for the Wyandotte Centennial in 1954. In 1991, following a petition drive to save the historic structure, the City turned the building over to the Cultural and Historical Commission.

The Old Timer's Log Cabin is used today for families celebrating birthdays, graduations, reunions, and other festive events. It can also be rented out to various nonprofits, including scout groups, and religious and cultural organizations. The cabin is available for rental May 1–October 31 each year.



RESEARCH AND LEARNING

One of the ways that the Wyandotte Museums seeks to enrich the city of Wyandotte and its citizens is by providing access to the Museums' collection of local history archives.

Research into genealogy, historic buildings, businesses, and many other topics can be conducted at the Burns Home. Visitors can request information on specific topics, which they will then be able to view in our public reading room.

Our collection strengths are in the late 19th to early 20th century domestic items, industrial artifacts from Wyandotte's chemical boom years of 1880 to 1950, and photography documenting the city's development since the 1860s.

Who are the Stars?

The Wyandotte Stars are a group of volunteers, young

close look at this phenomenon called "Vintage Base Ball," where it's not just reenacting, it's playing a very real, competitive, nine-inning game of base ball, with no gloves! It's a "Gentleman's Game," using only 19th century rules, equipment, behavior, and language, all played on pastoral ball fields throughout the region.

The Stars are just one team in this national pursuit that is loved and played with grace, skill, and guile by thousands of passionate practitioners all across the country.

Club History

The original Wyandotte Stars Club was formed in the mid-19th century in Wyandotte, Michigan. In a letter and scorecard dated October 5, 1867, the Stars won a sweeping victory against the Monitor Club of Taylor, beating them 85 to 15!

The original Wyandotte Stars scorecard is on display at the Wyandotte Museums. This intriguing document is one of a handful of early baseball records in southeastern Michigan, and is the inspiration for the present reformed team.

September 8, 2007 was the inaugural match of the new Wyandotte Stars, 140 years after the original team took the field.

Rules

The game will be played by the rules of the 1860s as found in Haney's Base Ball Book of Reference for 1867 by Henry Chadwick. Haney's is the first official base ball rule book from 1867, and covers all aspects of pitching, batting, and fielding with full instructions for umpires and scorers.

Henry Chadwick, the sport's first great journalist, was a leading figure in the development of the game. His manual includes not just rules, but also advice on how to form and manage clubs, as well as hints on how to field, pitch, and bat. For the adventurous enthusiast, there are even several pages on how to play base ball on ice!

odern Craft Wine Tasting in Wyandotte went through 25 cases of piña colada wine in a few months - a perfect example of how the operators thrive on taking the snob out of vino.

Servers also happily mix two wines of the customer's choice or add juices, sodas and tonics to come up with custom tastes. Modern Craft wines have unique flavors that break free from the ordinary wine experience.

For the nontraditional wine drinker, Modern Craft has flights of five samples, of the customer's choice, for \$5 plus tax, which includes the glass.

It has the same up-north feel as the other Modern Craft Wine Tasting rooms in Au Gres, Bay City, Frankenmuth. Harrisville and West Branch.



That's what Tanina Foster was thinking when she started planning her November wedding last January.

And when it came time to book the venue, she knew just what she wanted. A few years earlier she had attended a friend's wedding at the Wyandotte Wedding Chapel, and she fell in love with the place. She knew she wanted to have her own wedding there.

But when she called to make the reservation, she got the shock of her life.

The owner told her no, she couldn't book the date for her wedding because they were no longer taking reservations. They were trying to sell, and didn't want to book a lot of events in advance.

Foster was devastated, to say the least.

"It was heartbreaking to me," Foster said. "I was still dealing with the hormonal changes due to a total hysterectomy after a diagnosis of endometrial cancer, so I was already emotional, and when that news came, I had a breakdown moment."

Since Foster doesn't have a regular church "home", she looked around and contacted a few churches, but found that all of them wanted her to basically do things their way. This

didn't fit into her plan, her dream or her vision of her wedding day.

It seemed it was simply not to be. But in the midst of her devastation, Foster's fiancé, Michael Moore, came to the rescue.

"When I heard I couldn't book the Wyandotte Wedding

Chapel because they wanted to sell it," Foster said, "my fiancé said, 'Don't worry honey, everything's going to be OK. Why don't we just buy it!""

Foster, understandably, was shocked at the suggestion. But it made perfect sense to Moore.

"I saw how unhappy she was, and it's my goal to make her happy every day," he said. "I thought buying the place would be the way to do it."

They discussed their options, made an offer and...nothing. The offer was too low and the owner passed. Foster and Moore went about their lives and continued planning their wedding.

But in June, a call came in from the owner of the chapel saying that he wanted to revisit their offer. Everything happened very fast after that, and by the first week of August, Foster and Moore were the proud owners of the chapel they so wanted to have their wedding in.

"We shadowed a wedding rehearsal on Thursday, signed the papers on Friday, and had a wedding on Saturday that the previous owners worked with us to provide," Foster said. "Then we were on our own."

Since purchasing the chapel in August, Foster and Moore have been busy renovating – the bridal room and bathrooms got

the most attention with new flooring and a fresh coat of paint – all while handling the events that had already been booked when they bought the place. And of course, planning their own wedding, which took place on November 23.

Through all this, they both still have their day jobs. Foster – now Mrs. Moore – works at the Karmanos Cancer Institute and Wayne State University. Mr. Moore is a tour bus driver for Trinity Motor Coach Division.

The edifice, built in 1894, is now only used as a venue, and no longer offers church services. But for those looking to do

something unique for their wedding ceremony, the Wyandotte Wedding Chapel has a capacity of 150 people, making it an exceptional setting for a small-to-midsized wedding.

There's also a Fellowship Hall in the basement that seats up to 75 and is perfect for bridal and baby showers, birthday parties, family get-togethers and more.

Michael notes that it's been used recently as a place for the bridal party to just relax on rehearsal day and have food catered in.

"It really makes it convenient," he said. "They don't feel like they have to rush off to a restaurant."

The only thing the venue is not zoned for is having alcohol on the premises.

This project has been a labor of love for the couple, and they're determined to provide the best experience they can for the clients who book the Wyandotte Wedding Chapel.

Tanina and Michael do everything themselves, from booking to helping the brides and grooms-to-be plan the service to providing the updated space for rehearsals and preparation. For those who like music with their service — and most do — they have a sound system, but no piano or organ, so if you like that type of music, you will need to bring your own instruments and musicians.

It's been a whirlwind year for the Moores, and Tanina wants to help spread the blessings she's received to others.

"Right now, I'm so thankful for my continued health, family and friends. I'm also excited and honored that couples allow us to be part of their special day," she

said. "We're just ridin' the wave," Michael added.

The Wyandotte Wedding Chapel is located at 450 Sycamore St. in Wyandotte.

They will be having an Open House on Saturday, March 2 from 1-4 p.m. Come out and receive a tour of the building and listen as Michael and Tanina share some of the history of the chapel. Refreshments will be served.

THE 27TH DISTRICT COURT

The 27th District Court has jurisdiction over matters that occur within the City of Wyandotte and the City of Riverview.

WYANDOTTE POLICE DEPARTMENT

It is the mission of the Wyandotte Police Department to provide honest, efficient and effective law enforcement services, to promote a safe and secure environment through the delivery of fair and impartial police services, and to protect life and property. It is their goal to consistently promote, preserve and deliver the highest quality of professional police services possible to all individuals who live or work in, or visit the city of Wyandotte.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SERVICE

This Department is responsible for the maintenance and snow plowing of all City-owned roads, maintenance of City-owned property and City vehicles, repairing potholes and other minor road repair, street sweeping of City roads, trimming trees in the City right-of-way, mowing in the City right-of-way, maintenance of landscaping throughout the city, installation and repair of City signage and assisting in

staging for special events in the city.

ANIMAL CONTROL

O: What do I do if I find or have lost a cat or dog?

A: Downriver Central Animal Control is the intake shelter and picks up all lost domestic animals. They are located at 14300 Reaume Pkwy., Southgate, MI, 48195, two blocks west of the Southgate post office off Dix between Northline and Eureka. Domesticated animals will be picked up by our department or can be dropped off. You may call us at 734-246-1328*9 Requests after 5 p.m. may be directed to the Wyandotte Police Department's non-emergency number at 734-324-4438. The Wyandotte Adoption Center, 1170 Grove, has been turned into the adoption center for the DCAC. They do not accept stray animals. You may also visit our Facebook page. www.facebook. com/dcacashelter and post a picture of your dog. Pictures of incoming animals are posted there also.

Q: What do I do if a squirrel, opossum, raccoon, or other animal gets into my home?

A: Traps are available to capture non-domesticated animals that are causing property damage. Please contact the Downriver Central Animal Control at 734-246-1328 or 734-324-4438 (after 5 p.m.) to obtain a trap. Most traps will need to be picked up at the office. Once the animal is successfully trapped, you must contact Animal Control for pick up. Traps are rented out Mon-Wed. There is a \$20 deposit with a \$5 rental fee in which you will receive your deposit back within 5 days, \$1 a day after 5 days. Animal Control will not pick up cages that are privately owned.

ASSESSORS OFFICE

Q: Property values in my neighborhood have been decreasing, will my property valuation be decreasing as well?

A: Unfortunately, there isn't a yes or no answer to that question. If you've owned your property for a significant amount of time, more than likely your State Equalized Value (SEV) far exceeds your Taxable Value. If this is the case, a decrease in valuation, caused by a slow real estate market, will be reflected in the SEV. The taxable value is required by the Michigan Constitution to increase each year by the rate of inflation or 5 percent, whichever is lower. In the case of a longtime property owner, the SEV could decrease, while the Taxable Value will continue to increase.

Q: If the SEV decreases, will I pay more or less in property taxes?

A: Your property taxes are based on the taxable value rather than the SEV. So, in the previous scenario you would pay more in taxes even though your SEV decreased.

Q: Why isn't my new assessment 50 percent of my purchase price?

The simple answer is that it is against the law. MCL 211.27 states that the purchase price is no longer the presumptive True Cash Value of a property. The assessment may be close to 50 percent of the purchase price but it is determined by investigating the other sales in the area and all of the SEVs are set using that sales study.

Q: Can I appeal my assessment, and when?

After you receive the Change of Assessment notice you may file a petition to make an appointment. Please see Board of Reviews FAQs and Common Assessment Terms on our website for more information.

CITY HALL

Q: When are City Offices open?

A: City offices are open 8 a.m. – 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, with the exception of the following holidays: New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Day, President's Day, Good Friday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, General and Presidential Election Days, Thanksgiving Day, The day after Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and New Year's Eve.

Q: Where is City Hall located?

A: Wyandotte City Hall is located at 3200 Biddle Avenue, Wyandotte, Michigan 48192

CLERKS OFFICE

Q: How can I obtain a birth, death or marriage certificate?

A: The City of Wyandotte only maintains records of births and deaths that occurred in the city. More information and forms are available at the City Clerk's webpage. The City of Wyandotte does not maintain records of marriages. Marriage certificates must be obtained from the County Clerk's office in which the

marriage was performed. For marriages that took place in Wayne County, you may visit the Wayne County website for more information on how to obtain a marriage license.

Q: When are City Council meetings?

A: City Council meetings are held every Monday at 7 p.m., with the exception of holidays, and certain holiday weeks.

Q: Where are City Council meetings?

A: City Council meetings take place in Council Chambers on the second floor of Wyandotte City Hall, 3200 Biddle Avenue, Wyandotte, Michigan 48192.

Q: Am I allowed to address the Mayor and Council without being placed on the agenda?

A: All citizens are permitted to address the Mayor and Council during the public comments portion of the meeting. Please be advised that when you approach the podium you will be asked to state your name and address for public record.

Q: How do I get an item placed on the agenda for the City Council meeting?

A: You must submit a request in writing to the clerk's office to be placed on the agenda. Your request must be received no later than 4:30 p.m. the Thursday prior to the Monday meeting. Requests and all supporting documentation must be submitted along with the request to the Office of the City Clerk. Printed copies of the City Council Meeting Agenda are available on the Clerk's Front Counter by 12:00 noon on the Friday before the meeting. City Council Agendas may also be found online.

Q: How do I register to vote?

A: Voter registration information may be found by visiting the City Clerk's webpage.

Q: What are the requirements to register to vote?

A: The requirements are as follows: 1. You must be a citizen of the United States. 2. You must be a resident of the State of Michigan and will be at least a 30-day resident of the City by Election Day. 3. You must be at least 18 years of age by Election Day.

Q: How do I obtain an absentee ballot to vote?

A: Absentee ballot information may be found by visiting the City Clerk's webpage.

Q: Where can I vote?

A: The District Map & Polling precinct addresses and directions may be found by visiting the City Clerk's webpage.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SERVICE

Q: How do I sign up for garbage service?

A: The City contracts with Waste Management for all curbside residential service within the city limits. When you sign up for water & sewer service, you are automatically scheduled to receive this service.

Q: What types of items will sanitation workers collect curbside?

A: You may refer to the Department of Public Works webpage for information regarding the types of items that will or will not be collected curbside.

Q: I would like to subscribe to curbside recycling. How can I get a recycle bin?

A: You may subscribe to curbside recycling by contacting Waste Management directly at 866-797-9018.

Q: How do I dispose of unused medication?

A: The Wayne County Land Resource Management Division also has information on disposal of prescription medication. Visit their website for more information.

Q: How do I dispose of electronics and computers?

A: The Wayne County Land Resource Management Division also has information on disposal of electronics and computers. Visit their website for more information.

Q: How do I dispose of used syringes?

A: You may dispose of used syringes in your trash, provided they are sealed in a puncture-proof container. For the safety of our sanitation users, please do not use milk jugs or water bottles. We recommend that you use plastic laundry soap bottles instead.

Q: What do I do in the event of a downed power line?

A: If you see a downed power line: Stay away from the lines, and keep children and pets inside. Assume that all downed power lines are energized and stay away. Report the downed lines at 734-324-7190. If you think the downed lines pose an immediate hazard to the public, call 911.

Q: Due to the recent storm, I have a lot of storm damage from my trees. Will the city pick up this storm damage?

A: The City of Wyandotte Public Services Department does pick up tree branches and tree debris after a storm. It is recommended that residents contact The Department of Public Services at 734-324-4580 to have their address placed on our storm damage listing. City crews will only pick up storm damage that is placed at the curb. Crews will not enter upon private property to collect materials. Typically, storm damage is collected within 2-3 days after a storm or high wind has occurred. However, collection will occur as time permits.

Q. How can I report a pothole or street repair issue?

A. Citizens can report large potholes or street repair issues on city or county roads by calling 1-888-ROAD CREW.

Q: Why hasn't my street been plowed yet?

A: The Department of Public Service's goal is to provide a bare pavement quality recognized by many other Snow Belt cities. The order in which the roads are plowed is: 1. Police and fire facilities, bridges, hills and curves. 2. Major road networks and emergency routes. 3. The balance of the local roads.

Q: My home does not have a driveway. Where can I park during a Snow Emergency?

A: The City of Wyandotte has numerous Snow Emergency parking lots available for use during a snow emergency.

Q: I was parked on the street during a snow emergency and my car was towed. How do I get it back?

A: Police towing is performed by Groat Brothers Towing, 1466 Eureka, Wyandotte. In order to release your car, you must first pay the fine. You may contact Groat Brothers Towing at 734-284-6232

ENGINEERING AND BUILDING

Q: What codes does the City of Wyandotte enforce?

A: Copies of the code books are available for purchase on the State of Michigan website. The City of Wyandotte has also adopted a Property Maintenance Code Ordinance #1094, which may be found by visiting our website.

Q: When do I need to pull a permit?

A: If you are doing any structural changes or building a new building a permit is required. If you are doing any electrical, plumbing or mechanical upgrades; replacing City sidewalks, driveway or driveway apron; installing a pool a permit is required. For more information about the types of permits and fees associated with them, you may visit the Engineering and Building Department website.

Q: Does a Building Permit also include electrical, mechanical or plumbing work?

A: No, separate permits are required for electrical, mechanical and plumbing. For more information about the types of permits and fees associated with them, you may visit the Engineering and Building Department web page.

Q: How long does it take for a permit to be issued?

A: In most cases, electrical, mechanical and plumbing permits can be issued right away. Building and Concrete Permits require additional time for processing and are typically issued within 24 to 48 hours.

Q: Is a permit required for a new fence?

A: No, a permit is not required. However, fences must be installed in accordance with the Zoning Ordinance Section 2406 Fences, which may be found online on our website.

Q: Can I start work without a permit?

A: No. A permit must be secured before work can begin. Work started without a permit is subject to a fine in the amount of \$125.

Q: As a homeowner, can I pull my own permit?

A: As the owner and occupant of a single-family dwelling, you can secure homeowners permits as long as you are doing the work. If the property is a multiple family or rental dwelling a licensed contractor is required for electrical, mechanical and plumbing permits. The owner may secure the building permit only.

Q: Is an inspection required if I am selling my home?

A: Yes, an inspection is required for the sale of any dwelling in the city of Wyandotte. Inspections for sale are done on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 9 – 11 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. – 2 p.m. Applications and fees associated with this may be found at the Engineering and Building Department web page.

Q: Is an inspection required if I want to rent my home?

A: Yes, an inspection is required. Also, you are required to register the home as a rental with the City Clerk's Office. Inspections for rental properties are done on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 9 – 11 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. - 2 p.m. Applications and fees associated with this may be found at the Engineering and Building Department web page.

MUNICIPAL SERVICE

Q: How can I get a street light repaired?

A: You may call the Department of Municipal Services at 734-324-7190.

Q: My cable, phone or internet isn't working, who can I call to fix it?

A: If your cable, phone or internet is provided through Wyandotte Municipal Services, you may contact Wyandotte Municipal Services at: 734-324-7190 or visit their website at wyan.org.

TREASURY

Q: When is my tax bill due?

A: Summer tax bills are mailed on or about August 1 and are payable through September 26 without penalty. Winter tax bills are mailed on or about December 1 and are payable through February 26 without penalty.

Q: Where can I pay my tax bill?

A: A return-addressed envelope is provided with your property tax bill. Please utilize this return envelope when paying your current property taxes to ensure accurate and expedient delivery. Other payment options include the following:

- City Hall, Treasurer's Office, 3200 Biddle Avenue, Suite 100. For your convenience, a 24-hour dropbox is located outside, near the drive through window at Wyandotte City Hall.
- Monroe Bank & Trust, Downriver, 467 Eureka Road
- WY/South Federal Credit Union (Members only), 269 Oak Street
- Wyandotte Federal Credit Union (Members only), 1280 Biddle Avenue

Q: Can I pay my tax bill with a credit card?

A: Yes, credit and debit card payments are only accepted at City Hall, 3200 Biddle Avenue. There is a convenience fee to customers for payments made by credit or debit card. The fee is collected and paid to the service provider, not to the City of Wyandotte. Other acceptable forms of payment include cash, check or money order.

Q: Can I pay my tax bill online?

A: No. This service is currently not available.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Q: How do I contact the Wyandotte Police **Department?**

A: For emergencies, dial 911. Contact information for the Wyandotte Police Department is found by calling 734-324-4405.

Q: How do I contact the Wyandotte Fire **Department?**





HEALTHY RECIPES

GROUND TURKEY STUFFED PEPPERS

Ingredients

- · 6 large bell peppers, any color
- · 2 cups wild rice, cooked
- 1 lb. 93% Lean ground turkey
- · 2 cloves garlic, minced
- · 1 small onion, diced
- 1 16 oz. jar crushed tomatoes
- · 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1 1/2 cups sharp cheddar cheese, shredded
- 1 tablespoon olive oil

Directions

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Prepare your rice and set aside. You will need two cups of cooked rice.
- Cut off the tops of the peppers remove the seeds, trim the bottoms to help them sit flat in the skillet and rinse thoroughly. In a large pan boil the peppers for 5 minutes, remove from water and turn upside down onto a paper towel to dry.
- In a large skillet add the olive oil, garlic and onion, saute until tender. Add the turkey and brown until thoroughly cooked.
- Add the crushed tomatoes, rice, Italian seasoning, salt, pepper and 1/2 cup of the shredded cheese and stir until blended.
- 5. Fill the peppers evenly with the mixture, place in a lightly greased 10 inch cast iron skillet, or baking dish of your choice. Bake uncovered for 25 to 30 minutes. Remove and add the remaining cheese to the top of peppers and bake for an additional 5 minutes or until the cheese is melted.

GRILLED SHRIMP

Ingredients

- · 2 lb. shrimp, peeled and deveined
- 1/4 c. extra-virgin olive oil
- 1/4 c. lime juice
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 3 tbsp. honey
- 2 tbsp. low-sodium soy sauce
- 1 tbsp. chili garlic sauce or sriracha
- 1/4 c. freshly chopped cilantro, for garnish
- · Lime slices, for serving

Directions

- In a medium bowl, whisk together olive oil, lime juice, garlic, honey, soy sauce, and chili sauce. Reserve 1/4 cup marinade for brushing onto shrimp while grilling.
- In a large bowl, toss shrimp with remaining marinade. Preheat grill or grill pan and thread shrimp onto skewers. Grill shrimp until pink and opaque, about 3 minutes per side, brushing with reserved 1/4 cup marinade before and after each flip.
- Serve hot with lime wedges.

GRILLED ZUCCHINI HUMMUS WRAP

Ingredients

- 1 zucchini, ends removed and sliced
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 tomato, sliced or handful of cherry tomatoes
- 1/8 cup sliced red onion
- · 1 cup kale, tough stems removed
- · 2 slices white cheddar or chipotle gouda cheese
- · 2 large Udi's gluten free tortillas
- 4 tablespoons hummus

Directions

- 1. Heat a skillet or grill to medium heat.
- Remove the ends from the zucchini and slice length wise into strips. Toss sliced zucchini in olive oil and sprinkle with salt and pepper.
- Place sliced zucchini directly on grill and let cook for 3 minutes, turn and cook for 2 more minutes.
- 4. Set zucchini aside.
- 5. Place the tortillas on grill for approximately one minute, or just until grill marks are visible and tortillas are pliable.
- Remove tortillas from grill and assemble wraps, 2 tablespoons of hummus, one slice of cheese, zucchini slices, 1/2 cup kale, onion and tomato slices.
- 7. Wrap tightly and enjoy immediately.

PASTA WITH ZUCCHINI AND TOMATOES

Ingredients

- 7 oz short whole wheat pasta like penne, fusilli or farfalle
- · 2 lbs zucchini, chopped in bite size pieces
- 1 lb grape or cherry tomatoes, cut in halves
- 3 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- 6 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/3 cup Parmesan cheese, grated
- 1 cup parsley or 1/2 cup basil, finely chopped
- 1 tsp salt
- Ground black pepper, to taste

Directions

- Cook pasta as per package instructions undercooking by 2-3 minutes or until pasta is all dente, cooked but firm.
- While pasta is cooking, preheat large ceramic non-stick skillet on medium-high heat and swirl 1 tbsp of oil to coat. Add zucchini and cook for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Transfer to a bowl and set aside.
- Return skillet to the stove and swirl 1 tbsp of oil to coat, add tomatoes and cook for 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add garlic and cook for 1 minute, stirring a few times.
- Turn off heat and add cooked pasta and zucchini, remaining 1 tbsp of oil, salt, pepper, cheese and parsley or basil; stir and serve. Adjust any seasonings to taste.







SWEET POTATO BROWNIES

Ingredients

- 3/4 cup sweet potato puree
- 1 cup peanut or almond butter OR allergy-friendly sub
- 1 tsp pure vanilla extract
- 1/4 cup + 2 tbsp flour (Oat, white, or spelt flour all work, and readers have reported success with almond flour)
- 1/2 cup mini chocolate chips + more for the top, optional
- 2/3 cup granulated sugar of choice
- 1/4 cup + 2 tbsp cocoa powder
- 1 1/2 tsp baking soda
- 1/8 tsp salt



Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 325 F.
- 2. Line an 8-inch pan with parchment paper or grease well. Gently heat your nut butter until easily stir-able. Then whisk it together with the sweet potato and vanilla extract in a large bowl. In a separate bowl, stir together all remaining ingredients make sure that baking soda is evenly incorporated! Pour dry into wet (not the other way around), and smooth into the prepared pan, scooping out all traces of batter and using a second sheet of parchment to really smooth it down evenly. Bake on the center oven rack 20 minutes. It will look a little underdone, but it firms up as it cools. (If, for some reason, yours is still too gooey after cooling, loosely cover and let it sit in the fridge a few hours.)

"CHOCOMOLE" PUDDING

Ingredients

- 16 Medjool dates, pitted and coarsely chopped
- 3 ripe avocados
- 1 cup unsweetened almond milk or coconut milk beverage
- 1 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1/4 cup pure maple syrup or agave nectar
- 1 tablespoon coconut oil
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- · Pinch of sea salt, plus more for garnish

Directions

- 1. Soak dates in 1 cup hot water until soft, 5 to 10 minutes. Drain.
- Process the dates, avocados, milk beverage, cocoa, maple syrup (or agave), oil, vanilla and a pinch of salt in a food processor until very smooth and creamy. Refrigerate until cold, about 3 hours. Serve garnished with a little extra sea salt, if desired.

HEALTHY CHOCOLATE ICE CREAM

Ingredients

- 3 frozen, overripe bananas
- 1/3 cup cocoa powder
- 2-3 tbsp peanut or almond butter, optional
- · Pinch salt
- Broken-up dark chocolate bars or chips, optional
- I added a few broken-up Larabar Bites

Directions

- 1. Make sure bananas are at least partially brown before peeling, chopping, and then freezing.
- Combine all ingredients in a high-speed blender or food processor—you can add the optional chocolate and the brownie bites before or after blending. Process until completely smooth, adding a little milk of choice if it's too thick for your blender to process. Either serve immediately as soft serve, or freeze for about an hour and then scoop out with an ice cream scoop. You can freeze for up to a few weeks and thaw before eating.

STRAWBERRY-CHOCOLATE GREEK YOGURT BARK

Ingredients

- 3 cups whole-milk plain Greek yogurt¼ cup pure maple syrup or honey
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1½ cups sliced strawberries¼ cup mini chocolate chips



Directions

- 1. Line a rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper.
- Stir yogurt, maple syrup (or honey) and vanilla in a medium bowl. Spread on the prepared baking sheet into a 10-by-15-inch rectangle. Scatter the strawberries on top and sprinkle with chocolate chips. Freeze until very firm, at least 3 hours. To serve, cut or break into 32 pieces.
- To make ahead: Freeze airtight between sheets of parchment for up to 1 month; let stand at room temperature for 15 minutes before serving.

A STRONG Start

Preschool, Young 5s and Kindergarten help prepare young students

ow a child's school career starts could have a huge impact on his or her ultimate success. In Wyandotte, school officials are making sure those starts are as strong as possible.

That's where the preschool, Young 5s and kindergarten programs come in.

"This age group is so important, and early intervention and support can pay major dividends later on," said Wyandotte Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Catherine Cost.

Wyandotte Schools started its Young 5s program three years ago, in response to staff members and parents who were observing that some students were having trouble adjusting from preschool to kindergarten and from kindergarten to first

For example, some children who have a September birthday, although they were academically ready, were not emotionally ready to advance.

Cost knows that the key to producing successful students later on is to provide a sense of comfort and security in an environment that's tailored to what each student needs when starting out their educational journey.

"Sometimes kids have a hard time with the rigors and routines of kindergarten," Cost said. "We think of these programs as the gift of time - giving the students more opportunities to catch up to where they should be before they advance to the next grade."

With the Young 5s program specifically, that extra year to



learn their alphabet, how to write and master their school routines is huge.

Socially, it's a big deal as well.

"What we've seen with the students that have gone through Young 5s is they are more wellrounded and could meet the demands of whatever program they were going into next," Cost said.

Since starting the Young 5s program three years ago, Cost said they've made some tweaks to the way the preschool, Young 5s and kindergarten curricula work together.

"One thing we did was we aligned our preschool curriculum with Young 5s and kindergarten," Cost said. "It just flows and it's seamless."

What this means is that these programs work for all students, no matter their level of learning or social maturity.


"Sometimes it happens that a child who had been struggling previously will just take off academically," Cost said. "In these situations, the teacher, parent, social worker and psychologist all get together to decide if the best thing to do would be to advance the student on to the next grade."

It can also happen in reverse sometimes for those students who move ahead and then realize it's too much and they're not ready.

"We take all these decisions seriously, as any move we make concerning moving a child ahead or behind absolutely impacts middle and high school later on," Cost said.

Having so many advocates for its students is one way Wyandotte Public Schools aims to help them succeed in the

hile acknowledging David Letterman as the master of the Top Ten List, the following is my own Top Ten List of insurance planning mistakes and how to fix them:

NAMING YOUR ESTATE AS BENEFICIARY

If you name your estate as the beneficiary, the probate court is involved, guaranteeing a time-consuming, public and expensive process. Consider establishing a Revocable Trust and naming the Trust as the primary beneficiary for probate avoidance, privacy, simplicity and potential tax savings.

NAMING AN EX-SPOUSE AS BENEFICIARY

While an obvious mistake, old insurance policies often designate an ex-spouse or other person that no longer has a relationship with the policy owner. In order to rectify this, a review of your current beneficiary arrangement is important. Consider establishing a Trust and maintaining your Trust beneficiaries in a manner that reflects your current wishes.

NAMING A MINOR CHILD AS BENEFICIARY

If you name a minor child (under age 18) as a beneficiary, the insurance company will require a conservator appointed to process the claim and receive the death benefit. A conservatorship is a probate court process that is public, costly and time consuming. There will be annual work (and expense) until your beneficiary attains age 18. Upon attaining age 18, your now adult beneficiary receives the money and is free to spend it as he sees fit. Consider a Trust to receive the death benefit and design appropriate payout provisions. Your Successor Trustee would supervise distributions of the insurance proceeds to your beneficiary for education and health needs and distribute the balance to your beneficiary at age 30 (for example).

NAMING A "DISABLED" AS BENEFICIARY

This error could jeopardize government benefits available for your beneficiary. Instead, provide the insurance proceeds to your Trust with appropriate provisions to maintain government benefits for your beneficiary.

OWNING A POLICY ON AN ADULT CHILD

If you own a policy, and someone else is the insured, and you die first, the insurance policy must go through probate to have a new owner on the policy. Consider either transferring the ownership to the adult child, or in the alternative, transfer the ownership of the policy to your Trust.

OWNING A LARGE LIFE INSURANCE POLICY IN YOUR OWN NAME The death benefit on an insurance policy owned by you will be counted in your gross estate for Federal Estate Tax purposes. If you do not own the policy, then the death benefit is not included in your taxable estate. If necessary, establish an Insurance Trust to own the policy and distribute the proceeds to your heirs at death completely tax free.

CASHING IN A LIFE INSURANCE POLICY WHEN YOU ARE UNINSURABLE

The rule is that you do not cash in a life insurance policy if you cannot get insurance. This simply benefits the insurance company and hurts your

CASHING IN A LIFE INSURANCE POLICY WITHOUT CONSIDERING THE TAX CONSEQUENCES

If you cash in a life insurance policy, any gain on the cash value of the policy will be taxed as income to you upon receipt. Consider transferring the cash value into a more cost-effective insurance policy or an annuity.

SURRENDERING A LARGE POLICY WITHOUT CHECKING THE LIFE SETTLEMENT MARKET

Traditionally, a policy owner could only surrender the policy if he no longer wanted to maintain it. Now, if the policy is large enough, a private market exists where a third party might purchase the life insurance policy for a far

greater amount than the surrender value. This creates substantial opportunity if you no longer wish to maintain your current insurance program.

FAILING TO REVIEW YOUR LIFE INSURANCE POLICY ON A REGULAR BASIS

Life insurance plays a critical part in your financial and estate planning. Your current life insurance program should reflect your current needs and goals. Review your life insurance regularly with your financial planner and estate planning attorney to accomplish your goals in the most costeffective and tax efficient manner.
